B. C. Visitor

Mr. Frank E. Woodside, chairman of the British Columbia and Yukon Chamber of Mines is visiting relatives in Hamilton and Kensington.

Mr. Woodside may be termed one of our successful Islanders abroad. He gave many years of public service as chairman of the Board of Aldermen and could have entered the political arena. He so desired. He has made the trip to Prince Edward Island several times within the last decade.

He says, "It sets me back about seven hundred dollars cash, but I get seven thousand dollars worth of pleasure and rejuvenation." He is considered the dean of mining lore and knowledge in B. C. Intending prospectors and explorers are often advised to interview him. In this connection it is expected that an interview with a young Canadian Press reporter will be published in the near future, featuring the famous Pitt River "lost mine".

Mr. Woodside has been over most of the better known trails in Central and Northern B. C. in his younger days. Mr. Woodside will perpetuate his name in British Columbia. He says in regard to mining and minerals, that not nearly as much attention is given to prospecting for gold and silver now that the discovery of the so-called base metals is the desideratum.

The immensely affluent "Aluminum Co. of Canada", backed by almost unlimited American and Canadian capital, is installing a fifty million dollar plant in the mountain-enclosed valley of the Kitimat River in Northern B. C., near Prince Rupert and about forty miles from Terrace on the C. N. R. There are tunnels, dams, and all requisites for the production of hydro-electric power in the course of construction. This plant, on account of its position, will be a near atom bomb-proof as is humanly possible.

Mr. Woodside reports the largest deposit of asbestos ever discovered is at McDame Creek, a tributary of the Liard River. It is in a hitherto almost inaccessible region, but if the need is great and investment promises dividend, a railway will be built. Building railways in supposedly impossible places offer no insuperable difficulties (as Churchill said about crossing the Rhine) to present day railway construction engineers.

Mr. Woodside will remain on the Island for a few weeks. After fifty-five years in B. C. he is still very active mentally and physically.
