While the nations prate of peace they are snarling at each others heels. France and Germany are almost openly preparing for a struggle, which each believes must come sooner or later. The total strength of the German army, including soldiers in service, drilled reserve and militiamen, volunteers and landsturm, is 2,830,000. The men composing this immense force are in magnificent physique, have been drilled to the highest state of perfection, are supplied with the most recent armaments, and are commanded by officers who have been for the most part through two great wars. Such an army is at once a standing menace and a powerful intimidation to the great powers of Europe.

How Latin was pronounced in Rome when Augustus reigned, and patricians vied with each other in elegant learning is the impossible quadrature of the circle of linguistic research. At present each European nation pronounces Latin according to the practice of its own language, and the result possibly is that all are equally wrong; but the present attempt at reformed pronunciations in England is not likely to tend matters, and the ordinary scholar will have difficulty in recognizing Caesar or Cicero under Kayser or Kikeano, or to comprehend that civis means citizen, when pronounced Keecives. And one can understand the surprise of the good Bishop, who, while examining some advanced Oxford ladies, had as the pronunciation and explanation of vicissim given as "we-kiss him by turns."

Considerable sensation was caused among turfmen about a fortnight ago, by the announcement that Johnny Murphy had driven James Keenan's bay gelding Frank (who has a record of 2.23 1/2 in single harness) hitched with a running mate, a mile in 2.11, over Fleetwood Park, New York. Not to be outdone, James Golden who has charge of J. B. Barnaby & Co's horses, gave their black gelding H. B. Winship (harness record 2.20 1/2) hitched with a runner, a trial, which was so satisfactory, that he immediately offered to match Winship and mate against Frank and mate for \$1,000 a side, which Keenan at once accepted. The race took place at Narragansett Park, Providence, R. I., on the 8th, and Winship and running mate won in straight heats in 2.16, 2.10 1/2, and 2.11 1/2. The time of the second heat is the fastest on record at this way of going, the best previous record being 2.11, made by Frank and mate, and also by Yellow Dock and mate.
