NOTICE RE PRIVATE BILLS LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY

53. (1) All petitions for Private Bills must be presented within fourteen days after the commencement of the session exclusive of adjournment.

(2) No petition for a Private Bill shall be presented unless two weeks' previous notice shall have been given;

(a) by filing with the Clerk of the Executive Council, or the Clerk of the Legislature, a copy of such petition and a draft of the Bill proposed; and

(b) by advertisement in at least two issues of the Royal Gazette, setting forth in general terms the scope of the proposed Bill, and the name of the corporation, if any, intended to be created or affected thereby.

59. No Private Bills shall be brought into the House, but upon a petition first presented, truly stating the case at the peril of the petitioner for such Bill, and such petition must be signed by the said parties.

63. No Bill having for its object the vesting in or conferring upon any person or persons, Municipality or Body Corporate the title to any tract of land, shall be received or read in the House, unless before the opening of the Legislature at least four weeks' notice, containing a full description of the land in question, has been published in the Royal Gazette and one other newspaper in this Province of the intention of such person or persons, Municipality or Body Corporate to apply for such Bill. A copy of this order shall be published in the Royal Gazette and one other newspaper over the signature of the Clerk of the House or four consecutive weeks in November and December in every year.

Russia Taking Big Bite Out Of Asbestos Market

MONTREAL (CP)—Free world currency restrictions and the Russian trade offensive are eroding Canada's position as the world's major supplier of asbestos fibre.

Paradoxically, the outlook for Canadian mines and mills is also being clouded by the sizable increase in this country's capacity to produce. This mineral in the asbestos-rich region 150 miles east of here.

But mining companies are hopeful the demand for this fire-resistant material will grow enough to make it possible for them to retain their traditional 60-per-cent share of the world market.

LOWER DEMAND "There has been a lower demand for fibre because of the recession in the United States," said President A. R. Fisher of the Johns-Manville Corporation.

"But the biggest falling off has been in our export market. "We are experiencing stiff competition from the Russians in certain grades of fibre."

Asbestos marketing experts say Soviet sales so far have not been at prices much below those for

Canadian fibres. But they are apprehensive about future Russian sales efforts which, say Western experts, could jeopardize the existing marketing structure.

Some Western countries, among them France, are openly encouraging traders to buy asbestos from the Soviet Union in an effort to conserve dollars and to promote their own exports.

France recently sold the Soviet Union a shipment of diesel locomotives. Part of the payment in this bilateral barter deal was in asbestos.

Russia has been supplying the Iron Curtain countries and is beginning to sell in Belgium, France, other northern European countries and in the near future may even be selling in the United Kingdom.

Last year half of Canada's production of roughly 1,000,000 tons of fibre was sold in the United States.

The balance—and this is the portion endangered by Russian competition—went principally to Europe, Latin America, Japan and Australia.

Karl V. Lindell, vice-president and general manager of the Canadian Johns - Manville Company Limited, said Canadian mines starting operations this year have contributed to the oversupply problem.

"With this... over-supply which seems to be apparent at this time, our customers are in a position to demand higher quality for the same price," he said.

"In other words, the buyers market we have been in for several years has been further aggravated in favor of the buyer."

Gov't. Conversion Bonds Dip More Than \$2.00 Below Par

OTTAWA (CP)—The Bank of Canada apparently has reduced conversion bonds.

Prices have dipped more than \$2 below par. Brokers Monday quoted prices for a \$100 25-year and 14-year bond at a range between \$97.25 and \$97.75.

They said the central bank was not providing any strong support of prices which showed decided drops in the last week. Trading in these bonds started in mid-September.

The Bank of Canada has a decided influence on the bond market through large-scale buying and selling. Federal officials emphasized that the government had not guaranteed that bonds would remain at par.

SOME FORESAW DROP When the conversion loan campaign was launched last July, there was some speculation that the bond prices might eventually drop below par but federal advisers argued that they also might rise above par.

The bonds were sold as a conversion of wartime victory bonds. Experts in the field suggested

that the decline on bond prices may have resulted from the fact that the central bank was operating on a policy of making no further increases in the country's money supply and that it did not have much money available to buy up large offerings of the conversion bonds.

Another theory is that the public is demanding higher yields for money loaned and is rejecting the conversion bonds in favor of more lucrative investment fields.
