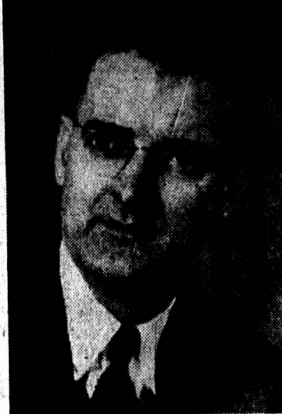

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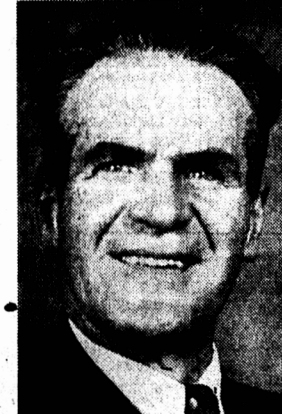
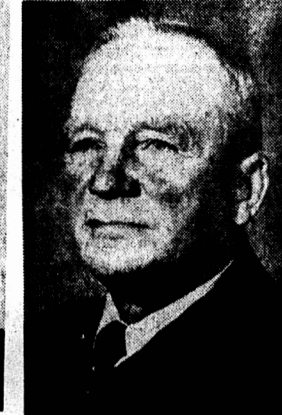

### Hymn Festivals Held In O'Leary Church

—As the result of the very fine "School for Rural Church Organists and Choirs" conducted by the Rev. Lewis M. Murray of Kensington United Church in the O'Leary United Church in the fall, to which meetings all the Protestant organists and choirs of Western Prince were invited, there has been renewed interest in the importance of the organist and choir in our services which have culminated in two very successful "Hymn Festivals" held in Western Prince County.

The first one was held on Dec. 17 in the O'Leary United Church and the large sacred edifice was taxed to the utmost to accommodate the large congregations. Four choirs participated at his Hymn Festival, each singing two special hymns: Knutsford Baptist, St. Luke's Anglican at O'Leary Corner and O'Leary United and Bloomfield United. Murray in his school said concerning the Rural Church Organist: "You are probably one of the most devoted people in the congregation. You are always in your place ahead of time and without fanfare or bustle you carry on your glorious task of leading the praise of God. Every year at the congregational meeting you are given a vote of thanks and that is perhaps all the expression of appreciation you hear. You seem to be the most neglected worker in the church, but many people say 'thank you' in their hearts and are inspired by your devotion". An organist needs to be a person of deep religious experience and with a sense of reverence and discrimination. She will be a church member professing her faith and living it. The speaker stated that a good motto for the rural church organist is, "Something new every week, a hymn, an anthem, a voluntary" and he concluded by saying, "Church organization as we know them in rural churches are the salt of the earth. Their loyalty, enthusiasm and faithfulness are an inspiration. God bless them."—O

Chandler told a reporter: "I'm satisfied we made a wonderful deal for baseball."
