"A modern image of man was the subject dealt with by Father Reid who suggested that we must return to a true conception of the human individual, and see God in man around us."

"To develop faith in God and the virtue of hope", the speaker said.

"No more people rave no purpose in life—a contribution can be made through the big virtue of charity—love for God and love for our fellow-man."

Father Reid admonished his hearers to "go out and live the Gospel, show what love is and show what kindness is."

The speaker was introduced by chairman Frank MacDonald and thanked by co-chairman Mr. Justice G.J. Tweedy.

Father Reid was born at Hope River, P.E.I., where he received his early education, then went on to St. Dunstan's where he received his bachelor of arts in 1932. He was a member of the St. Dunstan's debating team which brought honor and distinction to the college and the province in 1932 when it won the Dominion championship.

In the fall of 1932 Father Reid entered Holy Heart Seminary in Montreal where he was ordained to the priesthood. He spent two years on the staff at the Basilica and in the fall of 1938 joined the Maritime School of Social Work Halifax, where he studied for two years. He returned to Charlottetown in 1940 and was appointed Chaplain of the Charlottetown Hospital, the position he now holds.

HALFAX (CP) — The weather office says that late Monday evening rain drenched the southeastern half of Nova Scotia, but in the rest of that province, in Prince Edward Island and in Southern New Brunswick, a moderate snowfall fell, rain, snow and ice pellets were falling. Snow continued over Northern New Brunswick.

The disturbance causing this weather mixture was located about 100 miles south of Liverpool and moving slowly northeast. Slightly colder air should push over the Maritimes today, resulting in cloudy conditions with snowflurries in all regions. A further two to five inches of snow is expected in New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island and from one to three inches in Nova Scotia.

Crown Asks Harsh Penalty In Robbery, Beating Case

Crown Prosecutor Alan K. Scates yesterday suggested a 15-year prison sentence and the lash for two men who pleaded guilty to robbery with violence in the case of Mrs. John Spencer who was beaten and robbed at her West Roxbury home on Nov. 20.

Queens' County Magistrate James B. Johnston, QC, held court yesterday in the cafeteria of Prince Edward Island Hospital so that Mrs. Spencer, who is recovering from injuries received in the robbery, could give a statement.

The two accused, Lorne Vessey and Laurie William MacDonald, both of Charlottetown, were present at the special session and statements they gave were read by a member of the RCMP.

Also testifying was Charlottetown physician Dr. Harold Stewart, who told the court of Mrs. Spencer's condition when she was admitted to hospital after the robbery and her present condition.

MOST SERIOUS

In making his summation, Mr. Scates said he was recommending the 15-year term and the lash because in his opinion Mrs. Spencer "probably suffered the most cruel, vicious and brutal punishment any person could endure." He said robbery with violence is one of the most serious cases in the Criminal Code and provides for a life sentence and whipping.

He said when sentence is passed such factors as protection of society, deterrent to others and the chance for rehabilitation should be considered.
