Fire completely gutted the store and a half frame house of Mr. Preston Sorrey, Montague, early yesterday morning. The firemen quickly responded to the alarm given about 4:20 a.m., by Mr. Fred Vuozzo, who first noticed the smoke. Flames were shooting out of an upstairs window when the firemen arrived a few minutes later, the fire quickly spreading throughout the building. It is understood that Mr. Sorrey left home shortly before to go lobster fishing, after having started a fire in the kitchen stove to prepare breakfast. In some manner, after his departure, the partition adjacent to the stove caught fire, the flames ascending to the ceiling and spreading through the upstairs.

Firemen fought the blaze for some time before bringing it under control, but by that time everything, including a new wash and stove, was a complete loss. At the time Mrs. Sorrey was visiting her daughter, Mrs. Carl Graham, at Gasperaux, while another daughter, Rhodie, was visiting friends at Mount Stewart.

It is unknown whether the loss is covered by insurance. The house was located on the corner of Central and Patrick Streets.
