

AL Utilizes Homer Monday For 9-4 All-Star Victory

CHICAGO (AP)—The American League rolled out its trusty home run cannon Monday and bombed the National League with blasts by Pete Runnels, Leon Wagner and Rocky Colavito for a 9-4 victory that saved their slender lead in the long All-Star baseball series.

The Nationals finally had a chance to even the score in this often embarrassing series but the American sluggers played on a hot, sunny afternoon before 23,239 at Wrigley Field. It was only the second American

League victory in the last eight games, giving it a 17-11 edge over its favored rivals.

All but three of the American's runs came on homers. Runnels, of Boston Red Sox hit on into the leftfield seats off loser Art Mahaffey of Philadelphia Phillies as a pinch hitter in the third, tying the score 1-1.

Wagner, who had three hits in the 10-hit attack on five National pitchers, hit his with one on the fourth, also off Mahaffey.

Colavito, replacing injured red Micky Machuta in the fourth lineup, slammed one over the

leftfield wall with two on in the seventh off Houston Col. 4-5 to Dick Farrell.

BECOME ROUY
This one turned into a rout, pure and simple, in the late stages with four National League errors and a weird collection of wild pitches and sloppy plays.

Wagner was the big man for the Americans with his tie-breaking homer and two singles.

Colavito Detroit Tigers muscle man, drove in four of the runs with his three-hit homer in the seventh a sacrifice fly in the

ninth when the Americans added two extra runs off Juan Marichal of San Francisco Giants.

John Roseboro of Los Angeles Dodgers hit the only National League homer with nobody on in the ninth off Baltimore's Milt Pappas.

Ray Herbert of Chicago White Sox was the winner three scoreless innings. Herbert had been added to the club Sunday by manager Ralph Houk, replacing ailing Ken McBride of Los Angeles Angels.

Johnny Podres of the Dodgers also escaped without a run during his two-inning job as the National League starter. He was followed in order by Mahaffey, Bob Gibson of St. Louis Cardinals, Farrell and Marichal.

Both managers Houk of the Yankees and Fred Hutchinson of Cincinnati Reds for the Nationals had to scramble for the starters. Houk switched to rookie Dave Stenhouse of Washington Senators when Minnesota's Camillo Pascual, the announced starter, came up with a tender elbow.

Hutchinson picked Podres Sunday to replace his Dodger mate Drysdale who pitched Sunday. Originally, he had expected to open with the veteran Warren Spahn of Milwaukee, who reported with a sore arm and did not see action.

BEGAN SLOWLY
The day began most unappetizingly for the Americans as Stenhouse led the bases with one out in the first. He escaped

by getting Dodge Tommy Davis on a foul Kenny Boyer of St. Louis then lined a similar right at short stop Luis Aparicio of the White Sox.

The Nationals broke through for a run in the second when Podres doubled and scored on Dick Gray's single.

Runnels, a pesky hitter but never much of a home run threat, tied the score with his pinch homer leading off the third. After Earl Batiste of Minnesota Twins walked with one out in the fourth, Wagner hit a 2-1 pitch over the right field fence.

The Americans picked up another run in the sixth when Jim Gentile of Baltimore Orioles walked and was forced at second by Batiste, Tom Tresh, Yankee rookie, doubled to drive in Al Kaline of Detroit, running for Batiste.

Before Colavito's homer in the seventh the only controversy of Aaron in the clubhouse. "If I didn't catch it why would I throw to first. I could have got the man at second easy."

A double error by Eddie Mathews of Milwaukee, who fumbled pinch hitter Yogi Berra's grounder and then threw wildly, opened the door

for two runs in the ninth. The Yankees' Bobby Richardson ran for his veteran teammate and scored when Roger Maris of the Yankees doubled. Maris went to third on Marichal's second wild pitch of the inning and scored on Colavito's sacrifice fly.

The Nationals picked up a run in the seventh when pinch hitter Richie Ashburn of New York Mets straddled Frank Bowling of Milwaukee doubled and Great hit into an infield out.

The Cubs' Ernie Banks tripped in the eighth and scored while Billy Williams of Chicago grounded out.

Stan Musial, 41-year-old St. Louis veteran, added to his records by playing in his 28th game and advancing his total to 62. However, he did not get a hit.

Cookie Gilchrist Placed On Waivers By Argos

TORONTO (CP)—Cookie Gilchrist, hard-hitting back with Toronto Argonauts of the Eastern Football Conference, has been placed on waivers "subject to recall," Managing Director Law Hayman said in a statement Monday.

The Big Negro was suspended with teammate Boyd Carter by coach Lou Agate last Thursday after the pair broke the club's curfew rules following an exhibition game at Edmonton between Argonauts and Edmonton.

The waiver price is \$350 and

it is most unlikely that Hayman would let Gilchrist go for that amount.

Hayman, in a brief statement Monday, made no mention of Carter.

OPENS IN HOT WATER
Tough, controversial Gilchrist, a native of Tarenton, Pa., came in Canada in 1953 direct from high school and has been in hot water on various occasions.

He played in the old Ontario Rugby Football Union, went to Hamilton Tiger-Cats of the EFC and was peddled to Saskatchewan Roughriders in 1958 for a mere \$5,000. Hayman gave up two players for Cookie in 1959.

Cookie won the Big Four scoring title that year and in 1960 and last season signed five one-year contracts to play with Argonauts, a deal believed unprecedented in Canadian pro football.

Cookie had a reputation as a player considered too hot to handle. After Tiger-Cats sold him to Saskatchewan, Hamilton coach Jim Trimble declared "that guy will never stay around for more than two years with any club."

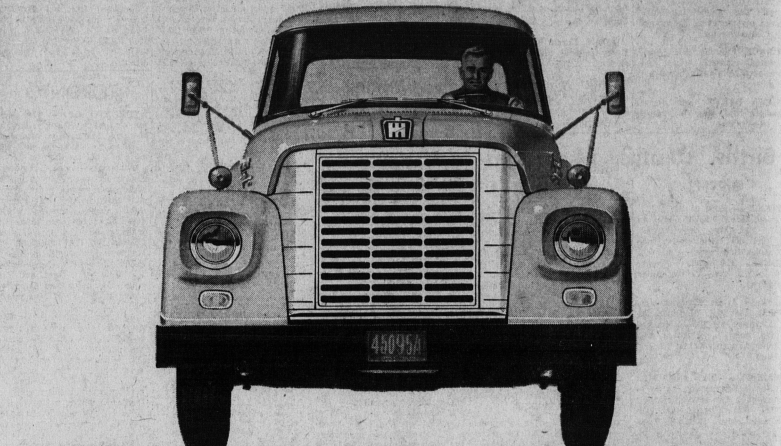
