

# Vancouver Radio Station Head Hits At CBC Powers

MONTREAL (CP) — A radio station manager from Vancouver Wednesday attacked the CBC regulatory powers with the suggestion that they are discriminatory.

George C. Chandler, manager of CJOR Limited, dipped into the past to give one example to the royal commission on broadcasting of what he termed an unfortunate result that arose from the CBC's regulatory powers.

The example involved recommendations 20 years ago to a transport department, the federal broadcasting licensing agency, dealing with technical allocations of frequencies and power of radio stations.

**AREAS LOST**  
The result, Mr. Chandler told the commission, was that Canada was "robbed" of large broadcasting areas.

That would not have happened if a separate regulatory body, instead of the CBC, had made the regulations.

A separate body would have accepted technical opinions of the

broadcasting industry instead of relying on its own staff, as had been done by the CBC, he said.

Chairman R. M. Fowler suggested that perhaps there had been a difference of technical opinion in the matter.

"A technical mistake," Mr. Chandler said.

**NO REGULATIONS NEEDED**  
Mr. Chandler in his request for the establishment of a separate regulatory body over broadcasting said there is no real need for regulations over private broadcasting. But if any regulatory such body were to exist, it should be separate from CBC.

Public reaction to the operations of private broadcasters would be sufficient to correct any operating methods that would be against the public interest, he said.

Mr. Chandler, who indicated he regards the CBC as "the real licensing authority" instead of the transport department, charged that the publicly-owned corporation interferes with the private broadcasters' freedom of speech.

**QUESTIONED**  
Mr. Fowler asked on this point whether there is anything that private broadcasters would like to

say on the air but cannot say or are not free to say.

"Nothing," Mr. Chandler replied.

Mr. Fowler then asked if there is anything that cannot go on the air but could be put in a newspaper.

"Not very much," the West Coast broadcaster said.

John Coyne, commission counsel, then asked Mr. Chandler to explain his claim of "rising pressures for restrictive controls" over private broadcasting.

Mr. Chandler said there were left wing pressures to nationalize all broadcasting. No such evidence had been presented to the commission, Mr. Coyne said.

The pressure has been less severe during the last five or 10 years, Mr. Chandler said.

**OTHER VIEWS**  
In other representations before the Fowler commission:

1. A group of parliamentarians from Montreal's Roman Catholic parish of the Immaculate Conception stressed that the sanctity of the home and family life must never be ridiculed on television.

2. Murray T. Brown, general manager of stations CPPL and CPPL-TV, London, Ont., said that for the present time, at least, a separate regulatory body over broadcasting appears to be unnecessary and unwarranted.

3. The Quebec section of Labor-Progressive (Communist) party said government controls over broadcasting must be maintained if radio and tv are to help develop Canadian culture.

4. The Montreal publishing house of Les Editions De L'Hexagone suggested a separate body to regulate both publicly- and privately-owned broadcasting and between the two.

5. The association of French-Language Librarians of Canada asked that the CBC give more time to the development of the public's taste for books. The association's brief said that television viewers often ask librarians for the complete texts of plays presented on TV.

## Reviews Activities Of Atlantic Economic Council

"This is what APEC is doing" was the subject of an address by Nelson Mann, executive manager, Atlantic Provinces Economic Council, before the Provincial Government's Trade and Industry Council at the Charlottetown Hotel yesterday.

"We are severely handicapped in the region by lack of agricultural economists," Mr. Mann said. "We are putting together the situations that exist in the three provinces — the various forms of assistance available to farmer, grants, loans, policies, etc. — statistics on production and consumption of most vegetables and meat products produced and consumed in the region.

"We are doing a study on what and where vegetables may be grown commercially and a livestock survey to determine population, distribution, and what is being done and can be done to develop it further. Knowing the market available, we propose to study immediately the implications involved and work out plans for meeting the demand."

A survey of the consumption of containers, glass, cans and paper substitutes has been started. Adequate service facilities are essential — cold storage units, warehouses, efficient transportation, etc.

ists and the services provided. Once our analysis if the region is completed, we should be able to determine the gaps that exist, and formulate ideas and plans to develop the industry further.

Dealings with the question of trade, he pointed out that some 40 firms are involved in the production of wearing apparel and boots and shoes. From the information we hope to develop from our survey a practical plan to enable these firms to capture a larger share of the market available, whenever it is available.

**ELECTRIC POWER**  
Touching on the question of electric power in the region, Mr. Mann said "we have confirmed the fact that there is no shortage of power. There is ample power for general commercial and industrial use. In fact, we have an excess supply of power immediately available for use and it has been available for a long time. We have been selling ourselves short by saying we lack sufficient electric power. The same story is generally true in respect to power rates.

Blocks of cheap power are required for natural resource industries, a different situation exists. This is a particular problem with a particular application. Anyone who wishes to verify this statement should get in touch with the council office in Moncton."

Speaking of the meeting of the four premiers in Fredericton in July, Mr. Mann recalled that the executive manager of the APEC was named secretary of a continuing advisory committee of the Premier's Conference. The subjects being studied are transportation, Federal surveys of natural resources, special adjustment grants, and defence orders here. The effects of tariffs, marketing with special emphasis upon fisheries and agricultural products, and promotion of closer trade relations with the new federation in the Caribbean area.

"The problem of our region, among other things lies in the building of a confident, community-minded group of people. Community-minded as regards commercial and industrial development, who have the pride, the sense of the moral strength and knowledge to work effectively together, Mr. Mann concluded.

**TURIST INDUSTRY**  
The tourist industry, as an industry within the region, has not had an opportunity in the past of working together and "doing its own share," Mr. Mann said. "Up until now the various governments agencies has carried most of the load. Through APEC, industry itself can now make a contribution. Good roads, good accommodation and food are the three essentials that tourists can rightfully expect from us.

"Roads are the responsibility of government, but accommodation and food are the responsibility of the owner. We are doing a study of the tourist market, its origin, its volume, its value. We are studying the facilities available for tourists."

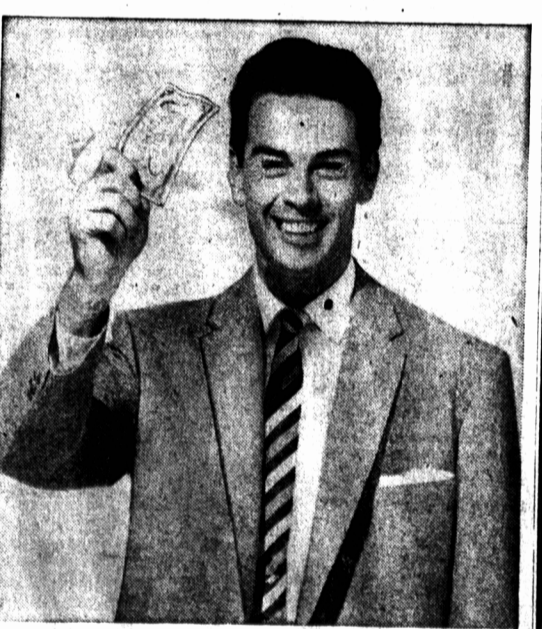

## Board Receives Report On P. E. I. Hospital Campaign

The regular monthly meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Prince Edward Island Hospital was held on Tuesday the 11th instant. There was a full attendance of the members of the Board.

After routine matters had been disposed of, the treasurer's report was that the total cash and unconditional pledges received on the building campaign to date was approximately \$307,000.

This will be augmented by returns and donations still to come in as it will be a month or more before completion of the final returns.

It was reported that the consulting engineer, representing the architects for the new wing, is now in Charlottetown making a preliminary survey of the alterations necessary in the present building in connection with the erection of the new wing.

Arising out of the report of the medical staff was a recommendation for the establishment of an out-patient department of the hospital. This was favourably considered by the Board members and the proposal was referred to a committee to investigate and report.

Dr. J.H. Shaw and Dr. H. Nell Boyd, Provincial Pathologists, were added to the active medical staff of the hospital.
