Teachers Asked To Get Chest X-Rays At Clinic

The Charlottetown School Board, has granted permission to set up the Prince Edward Island Tuberculosis League mobile unit at Birchwood High School during the annual convention of the Prince Edward Island Teachers' Federation, April 24-26th.

Dr. E.M. Found, provincial director of tuberculosis control, said "in consultation with Mrs. Marjorie Dover, president of the federation, it was decided that since most of the meetings during the convention would be held at Birchwood High school, it would be more convenient to the teachers to have the unit installed in the school."

"In Prince Edward Island, it is mandatory that every teacher in the province have a chest x-ray at least every two years, the reason being that tuberculosis is now most prevalent in adults and the goal of tuberculosis control is to eliminate the emission of tubercle bacilli to the young.

"A few months ago, there was considerable publicity through press and radio, regarding an epidemic of tuberculosis in Alberta, Canada, where some 90 children were infected, seven of whom had to be hospitalized and the source of their infection was found to be a school teacher.

"Teachers are reminded if they are at all in doubt whether or not they have had a chest x-ray in the last two years, that the unit is placed at Birchwood High School for their convenience, with the object of saving them trouble later on of taking a special trip to a general hospital or the Sanatorium for a chest x-ray."

Conference On Education Topic At Joint H.S. Meet

Members of West Kent, Spring Park and Prince Street Home and School Associations met in a joint meeting at Prince Street School last Wednesday, to hear a panel discuss highlights of the Canadian Conference on Education which took place in Montreal on March 4-8.

Dr. Frank Jelks acted as moderator and the members of the panel included Miss Mabel Matheson, Dr. Frank MacKinnon, Dr. L.G. Dewar, Eric Kipping and Col. Leo McDonald. These panelists had all attended the conference and the impressions they received from this mammoth gathering of over 2,000 people representing 76 organizations were varied and interesting.

The conference they said created an opportunity to discuss and exchange opinions with all the different provinces; and to develop a broader view and better

understanding toward education in Canada as a whole. It also tended to create an awareness of the need for more and better education if this country is to hold its own among the nations.

The conference was divided into seven forums for discussion on the following topics: professional status of teachers, development of student potential, new developments in society, financing education, continuing education, the citizen in education, education and employment.
