"Outward Bound" Given Fine Performance By Little Theatre Guild

The Charlottetown Little Theatre Guild performed Sutton Vane's three act drama "Outward Bound" last evening at the Empire Theatre to an audience who sat enthralled until the final curtain.

Usually in plays of this type one finds that he has a rather good idea of just how it is all going to turn out, but "Outward Bound" is far above the average.

Under the very capable direction of Mr. Frank Curtis, the cast turned in a number of outstanding characterizations. Iphigenie Arsenault turned in her best performance to date with her portrayal of the snobbish Mrs. Cliveden-Banks, and Margaret Collings showed definite flair for comedy as she brought the humble Mrs. Midget to life.

To a role which might quite easily have been over-acted, and consequently burlesqued, Miss Collings brought a sincerity and homey charm which made it a highlight of the entire season of L. T. G. productions.

Jock Lawson as "Scrubby" gave an excellent interpretation of the steward who was the only one on board the ship who really knew what was in store for his passengers, and Charles Bentley as "Tom Prior" contributed greatly to the ease with which the performance moved along.

Mary DeBlois as "Ann" came into her own when she held the audience throughout a long monologue which was the climax of the entire play, and which could easily have been monotonous.

Adding much to the production was the set, depicting the bar and smoking room of a liner, with clever lighting changing the time for the various acts. Costuming of the cast was very well carried out, especially in the clothes of the ladies. Typical examples of good costumes were shown in the first entrances of both Mrs. Cliveden-Banks and Mrs. Midget.

During a brief intermission Mrs. George Patterson gave an adjudication on the three one-act plays performed at the previous studio night, and was able to give members of the cast and their directors many hints which should be of help in future performances.

Mr. J. L. Robertson who adjudicated the finals of the P. E. I. Drama Festival last year will be on hand to perform the same duties. Many groups who participated previously have again entered, together with a number of new ones.

When the entries close on April 20, it is expected that the list will be the largest ever to compete in a Festival of this type in Prince Edward Island.

(Continued from Page 1) He described the bombing as a successful retaliation for the "cold-blooded murder of seven Israeli policemen in this area yesterday."

"Positions bombed included the El Hamma police station within the demilitarized area and also a number of fortified positions a few metres inside Syrian territory proper, from where the Israeli policemen were fired on and killed."

The spokesman did not disclose the number of types of planes participating. Syrian - Israeli relations have reached their lowest point since the end of the Palestine war in 1948. United Nations observers expressed fear that broad-scale fighting might at any moment shatter the uneasy Jewish-Arab truce.

Official sources said Israel is protesting to the U. N. Security Council against a series of border incidents climaxed by the killing of the policemen. The protest accuses Syria of violating the armistice between the two countries. The protest lists eight incidents in which it is charged that Syrians fired on Israeli police either from across the border or from inside Israel's demilitarized zone, stretching from the Huleh swamps in the northeast of the Yarmuk valley at the southern tip of the Sea of Galilee.

Although the 30-mile-long area in question belongs to Israel, it was set up as a demilitarized buffer area under terms of the U.N. cease-fire of 1948 which ended the Palestine war. It is patrolled jointly by Israeli and Arab police under U.N. supervision.

Cites Increase In Teachers' Salaries

The average salary paid the teachers of Prince Edward Island has increased \$406.51 in the past four years according to figures released to the press yesterday by Premier J. Walter Jones.

During the same period the salaries paid by districts rose to \$269,553.15 from the \$159,098 paid four years ago. The salaries paid by the Government increased to \$51,267.80 from the \$349,422.35 during the 1945-46 year. Thus the total salaries paid by Districts and Government increased \$312,300.50 in four years.

In the earlier period the 674 teachers employed received a total of \$308,520.36 for an average salary of \$754.48. During the year 1949-50 the 707 teachers received \$820,820.95 for an average of \$1,160.99.

Premier Jones Discusses Election Campaign Issues

The following address on Provincial political issues was given last night by Premier J. Walter Jones:

"The Provincial House is dissolved and the Governor has signed writs for a new election in the fifteen constituencies of Prince Edward Island. The nominations will take place on April 12th and every candidate who nominates has to post two hundred dollars which he will lose if he cannot poll at least one half as many votes as the top man. It is not likely that enough money will be forfeited to pay for the extra printing of ballots. Formerly only ten dollars was forfeited and that did not begin to pay the extra expense of printing the ballots. So the Act was changed. There are several reasons why an election is being now. The chief reason is to find out if the people of Prince Edward Island want the present Government to continue with the Dominion-Provincial Conferences, or do they want another government to do the work. In other words, if this highly important work is to go on the Government wants a mandate from the people — an order by the people of Prince Edward Island to go on with the work for four more years."

"You will recall that whereas only \$647,000 yearly was obtained from the Federal Government by way of subsidy in 1941, that ten years later the amount will exceed three millions of dollars yearly by subsidy and several millions more in Health Services, Family Allowances, Old Age Pensions, etc. In brief, whom do you want to continue to deal with Ottawa? The Liberals or the Progressive Conservatives? That is the chief issue in this election. I will only remind the people that between six and seven million dollars come to Prince Edward Island from Ottawa yearly and it might be well to carefully consider whom you prefer to negotiate for this money."

"Another change in the Constitution which has been agreed on is to give power to levy an indirect turn-over tax to the Provincial Government, including ourselves, have sales taxes which can only be collected at retail levels under our present Constitution—a very awkward method. The other method by a turn-over tax will facilitate the collection and by limiting it to not more than three per cent keep the taxes more even over the Provinces. It will also prevent the raising of the Federal Sales Tax. "We think it is a desirable amendment to the Constitution and although no plans to inaugurate a tax on Prince Edward Island are afoot, it is likely that some day some Government will institute the tax. The present Government has annual surpluses but not in a Conservative Government, with recurring deficits, which is their past record, and a turn-over tax may be what would be needed to get them out of the red hole."

"One piece of work now underway that is sure to come up for discussion in this campaign is the Trans-Canada Highway. It has been stated by our opponents that this will cost 10 millions. I would like to place the facts before the people and shall prove that it is much cheaper for the Province to build the Trans-Canada Highway than not to enter into the agreement."

"The road will run from ferry to ferry. The contract calls for the road to be completed before December 1956; thus the Province will spend about \$1,700,000 on the road exclusive of bridges, in
