

SUMMERSIDE GOING AHEAD!

It is our pleasing duty this week to record the fact that our citizens are determined to do all in their power to get laws passed for the proper management of the affairs of the Town. A public meeting was held, as intimated in our last, on last Thursday evening, to consider whether the Fire Act—now expired—should be renewed or not. The meeting decided that the Act, having been enacted ere Summerside had arisen to its present eminence, did not now meet its requirements. A committee composed of Messrs. James Campbell, R. McC. Staver, R. T. Holman, David Rogers, T. Kelly, C. C. Gardner, Asher Black, T. Kirwin and T. B. Hall, was appointed to draw up a series of resolutions, expressive of the wishes of the people.

An adjourned meeting was held in Strong's Hall, on Saturday evening last, to hear and take action upon the report of the Committee. James Campbell, Esq., was called to the chair, and Thomas Kelly, Esq., to the Secretary's table. The meeting was one of the most influential ever held here. Nearly all the merchants and other business men were present. The resolutions were evidently prepared with great care, and if endorsed by the powers that be will place in the hands of the people power to manage their own affairs in their own way, without the expense which would necessarily attach to an Incorporation Act—which was by them considered premature. Owing to the press on our space of legislative matter, we are unable to give the resolutions in full, but we give the substance of them in a concise form, kindly prepared and handed us by the Secretary, and our readers will be able to form as good an idea of their import as if we published them in extenso:—

That a law be enacted, vesting in the inhabitants the right of self-taxation, for such purposes as they think proper, with a view to local improvements, including sewerage, public streets, buildings, fire department, etc.

That such power be derived from the sanction of the inhabitants as may be ascertained at any public meeting properly convened.

That the tax-payers shall elect once a year seven Town Wardens, who shall have power to assess the inhabitants and property owners to any amount, not exceeding £150 in each year, for the purpose of general improvement and protection of the Town. One of such Wardens to be chosen as President or Chairman—these officers to appoint a Town Treasurer, Clerk, and one or more Peace Officers, each of whom shall be required to give sufficient security for the faithful performance of duties, &c. The Wardens shall be obliged to call a special meeting of the inhabitants on application of ten or more tax-payers.

That the Wardens shall make from time to time such By-laws as they may deem proper for the more efficient carrying out municipal requirements, such as fire companies, sewerage, and all other matters appertaining to the well-being of the whole Town. These By-laws shall be without effect until sanctioned by a majority of the tax-payers, assembled at any public meeting, and subsequently ratified by the Lieut. Governor in Council.

That the Wardens while in office, shall, within the limits of Summerside, be vested with similar powers to those of Justices of the Peace, and shall also constitute a Court for the trial of all misdemeanors and matters arising in the Town cognizable by Justices of the Peace for the County, (small debts excepted). One or more of such Wardens to preside at certain hours each day and to hear and determine all complaints within their jurisdiction. The Clerk to attend to the issuing of all necessary processes; the Peace-officers to execute all orders of said Court. No salary or remuneration allowed to the Wardens except fees similar to those taken by Justices.

That the Wardens shall exercise a supervisory control over all licensed Taverns, &c., in the Town; shall have control of all the public buildings therein; shall receive the rents therefor and pay the same into the hands of the Town Treasurer for the use of the Town; and all Revenues arising from the wharfs, licenses, fines, penalties, statute labor, commutation monies, &c., be collected by the authority of the Wardens and disposed of for the benefit of the Town. The limits of the Town to be extended so as to embrace a number of residents not at present included or liable to assessment, &c.

A protracted discussion of the different points followed, in which several gentlemen took part, pro and con. Some advocated an Incorporation Act, while a number were in favor of continuing the old Act,—an amendment to that effect being submitted by Finlay McNeill, Esq.,—but on the question of concurrence being put from the chair, the Resolutions were carried by a very large majority. A report of this meeting will be forwarded to the Legislature, and we have no doubt that in their legislating for Summerside they will be guided somewhat by the "well-understood wishes" of the people. We trust that "the assembled wisdom" of the country will, ere this Session closes, give the people of this town some improvement on the miserable apology for a Fire Act, which has hitherto disgraced our Statute Book.

It is not in the recollection of "the oldest inhabitant" in this Island such a sudden and complete transition from extreme cold to the very opposite, as we have experienced lately. The ice on our bay already gives indications of a speedy dissolution. A very early Spring may, we think, be expected. This will relieve those who have suffered from want of fodder all winter.

Summerside Debating Society.

Dr. Homer lectured to a large audience before this Society on Monday evening. His subject being as announced, the "Special Senses." The learned lecturer treated the several heads of his subject at a considerable length, and in consecutive order; but dwelt more fully on the senses of hearing and seeing, the mechanism of whose organs he rendered intelligible to the audience by means of pictorial illustrations. The lecture which was delivered extempore, was wound up in a graceful and easy style by a short digressive address.

By request of the President, Dr. Casey, T. Kelly, T. Kirwin, and N. J. Brown, Esq., made a few remarks, all concurring in eulogium of the Dr.'s effort, after which the usual vote of thanks was proposed to the lecturer.

The members of the Society will meet for debate on Monday evening next.
