Holy Week Was Observed In Summerside Churches

SUMMERSIDE — Special Summerside services were held during Holy Week with Rev. M.R. B. Lovesey, B.Sc., M.A., M.Th., professor of New Testament literature at Acadia University, as preacher.

At the opening gathering the preacher stressed that he was addressing himself to the people of the household of faith. His aim was to invite believers to meditate with him upon the redemptive sufferings of Jesus Christ.

At the first service in the Nazarene Church the worship was led by the Rev. Sampson, and a duet was sung by Mrs. Mellich and Rev. W. O. Weale.

The preacher, using as text, "Christ died for our sins according to the Scriptures", sketched the gospel account of the Lord's passion and showed that he died in fulfillment of prophecy.

On Tuesday evening the service was in the Church of Christ with Rev. W. O. Weale in charge and his fine solo "Gethsemane" was a splendid aid to the worship. His text "Our Lord Jesus Christ, by whom we have received the atonement", was used as a reminder of the theories of atonement that have been put forward by the theorists of the church.

BAPTIST CHURCH
The Rev. Keith Hobson led the worship in the Baptist Church on Wednesday evening. J. Leaky singing the hymn "Jesus The Crucified Pleads for Me". Guided by the beliefs of the Swedish theologian, Dr. Gustaf Aulen, the preacher suggested the cross was not so much a tragedy as a triumph.

On Thursday, the congregation gathered at the Presbyterian Church of Canada, for the service conducted by Rev. J. D. MacKay with the choir singing "Bless Thou the Lord of My Soul". The sermon was guided by another eminent theologian, the British congregationalist, Dr. P. T. Forsyth.

The Good Friday service was held in Trinity United Church. The preacher spoke of the two great martyrdoms that have moved mankind, the death of Socrates and Jesus. He proceeded to show that the death of Jesus was unique. It was more than martyrdom, he said. It was God making atonement for sin. Socrates is honored, he said, but Jesus Christ is worshipped.

Worship was conducted by Rev. Cecil Webber and the choir sang "All on an April Evening".

of the junior college to the effect that it broke a progression through high school. This criticism has long since been proved wrong, not only because the junior college provided the still more logical progression outlined above, but also, because a break in the traditional progression was found valuable.

NEED A BREAK
There is a certain comfort and convenience in staying in the one building with the same teacher from grades 1 to 12 or 7 to 12. But aside from the fact that this arrangement is most uneconomic, pupils can be in the same place with the same atmosphere with the same teachers for too long. The break brings new surroundings, stimulation of new teaching and experiences, and association with new friends — all valuable in the educational process.

For all these reasons, it is predicted that junior colleges will be established in every part of the country in the next few years. They will be, of course, just one of many changes, because it is clear that Canadian education is going through an encouraging
