Oddfellowship is growing rapidly in the State of Massachusetts. The semi-annual meeting of the Grand Lodge was held on Thursday. From the Grand Master's communication it is learned that since the reconstitution of the Grand Lodge half a century ago, 212 lodges have been instituted, 76,649 members have been initiated, 7,884 have been admitted by card, 7,827 have died, 73,781 have been relieved; present membership 43,187. The total receipts have been \$6,670,626, and the total relief afforded, \$2,431,118. Total number of Rebekah lodges, 106, with a membership of 16,138. The grand representatives report the extraordinary addition of 34,442 to the roll of members to all of the subordinate lodges throughout the country. The grand secretary reports cash on hand, Feb. 1, \$3,587, and special fund for support of Rebekah fund, \$344.
