LETTERS TO THE EDITOR.

"Blasted before its Bloom"
—BURNS.

Sir—If ever it were "lawful and right"
to quote four words from Robert Burns, and
apply them to the "blasted" of an
apathetic community, the "blasted" Hotel
question suggests the opportunity, and
Charlottetown the occasion.

Some may feel indignant, and tell me to
"shut up," but that would that would only
prove another "blasted" mistake, for I am
not disposed to "shut up" before I have
made one more effort on behalf of first class
accommodation for such of the touring
world as wish to paddle to P. E. Island. Is
it "none of my business?" Well that it is
cheeky considering that I belong to the out-
side touring world, and came here because
I had been here before, and wanted to come
again. Coming here I am surprised to find
that Charlottetown is far dirtier than when
I was here before, while the people seem to
be only about half as wide-awake, with an
evident relish for the perfume of gutter
cologne. As I am in a position to know
something of the expectations of travellers
when they "take an outing," I will ask
the liberty of slightly ventilating the old
subject of the New Hotel which seems just
now to be getting "blasted before it
blooms."

The reason why tourists give P. E. I. a
wide berth is patent to all; it is the un-
cleanness and disorder that prevails in
Charlottetown. Some attempts have been
made to beautify with verdure and give a
green look to the landscapes, but there has
been no effort to first remove the slime and
filth, so offensive to those sensitive organs—
the nose and eyes, and as all tourists carry
such with them on their peregrinations,
they would not want to have to hold the
one and shut the others to make living
agreeable. Let us suppose, however, that
the ancient miracle has been performed and
Charlottetown once more becomes clean,
and that Charlottetownians are again in their
right mind. What further attraction has
nature in reserve for the coming tourist?
Well, that depends upon the site of the
near metropolitan quarters for tourists.
I wish I could remember what Lord Sel-
kirk's agent said to me of the prospect
from his family porch facing the harbor's
mouth, of the fishing, fowling, sailing,
rowing, bathing, and parking within a gun
shot, and of the delightful and bewitching
scenery as far as the eye can reach, but I
cannot. All I particularly remember was
our unanimous verdict: "What a perfect
situation for a first-class hotel!"

Recently, I took the notion to have
another look at the old and well-
remembered porch. I was kindly received
by the present owner, and having lit a
cheroo, and taken in the loveliness of the
same old sea views of former times, I could
not help emphasizing and repeating the old
verdict, "What a perfect situation for a
first-class hotel!"

I have been to every other proposed site
for such an enterprise, but had turned
away from them all, disappointed; but here
was the very and only place in Charlottetown
for it. Here was a location so fit for
it that, were it once discovered by a true
born and bred Yankee speculator, there
would be a Santa Barbara construction run
up there, and so equipped that it would be
certain to pay. Live men would build it,
live men run it, and live men and women
from all the centres of civilization fill it up
all summer.

VERBUM SAP.
Boston Markets.

BOSTON, July 18.

Eggs.—The market is firmer on fresh
stock, and Eastern extras have been selling
at 15c, and firsts at 14c. The best Canadian
and Island command 14c. Western are
neglected. We quote P. E. Island at 14c.

FISH.—The receipts of mackerel at Bos-
ton for the week foot up 6,172 bbls, in-
cluding 1,037 bbls from foreign and 5,135
bbls from domestic ports and fleet. Total
receipts at all ports from the fleet were
14,995 bbls against 10,539 bbls same week
last year. This makes the total New Eng-
land catch to date 47,718 bbls against
60,571 bbls for the same time last year, a
decrease of 12,853 bbls. Trade has been
slow and with the increased receipts,
prices are easier. Sales from pickle early
in the week were at \$3.50 to \$4 per bbl,
with bbl, and one fare of 250 bbls sold
yesterday at \$3.25 per bbl, without
bbl. Some of the former run about
half No. 2, and the latter will probably
inspect about seventy eight No. 2.
Inspected lots have been selling at
\$4 for medium No. 3, and \$7 to \$8,
for No. 2. Old medium No. 3 are cleaning
up at \$3.25 and \$3.50 per bbl. Nova
Scotia large No. 3 are dull, and \$6.50 per
bbl. is a full selling price. A lot of Prince
Edward Island Mackerel, unculled, first of
the season, sold at \$4. Dealers are hold-
ing off for lower prices. Codfish are in
limited supply, and large dry Bank command
\$3.75, and medium \$2.75 per qtl. Very few
pickled Bank offering, and we quote
large nominally \$2.75 per qtl. Georges are
selling at \$3 for large, at outports. Hake
are quiet at \$2, and Pullock at \$1.50 to
\$1.62 per qtl. Nothing of consequence
doing in Pickled Herring or Alewives.
Smoked Herring are pretty well cleaned up
and prices are steadier. Sales of prime
medium scaled at 12c, and tucks and No 1
at 6 to 8c per box. Canned Lobsters are
steady at \$1.55 to \$1.60, duty paid.

Eggs.—R. K. Brace has been giving for
some time 10 cents cash and 11 cents in
Creamers or Crockeryware for Eggs, and a
lot of prizes for the largest number of Eggs
sold him during the summer. There is no
doubt but he is the farmer's friend, and we
are glad to see so many farmers patronizing
him. They are helping themselves in
doing so. He always gives all the foreign
markets will allow.

The prospect of the immediate issue of
the new Egyptian loan of \$9,000,000
secured by the British Government, has
infused new life into business and Govern-

A homing pigeon liberated from the
steamship Wieland on her last trip from
New York, when 313 miles from Sandy
Hook, at 1 p. m., reached her roost in New-
ark, N. J., by nightfall.

The return of traffic on the Canadian
Pacific Railway for the past week is as fol-
lows:—\$300,000 for 1885, and \$153,000 for
the corresponding week of last year, show-
ing an increase of \$157,000.

The painter Watts, who has declined a
baronetcy, gives as his reason for refusing
the title this statement: "I am unable to
help feeling the incongruity between the
proffered title and my very restricted
means."

Negotiations are pending with two great
German banking houses for a loan of \$100,-
000,000 to China for the construction of
railways, telegraphs, wharves and other
trade improvements throughout the
Celestial Empire.

With a view of allaying public anxiety
the French governor of Cochinchina has
telegraphed that the situation in Cambodia
was really never dangerous, and that the
French losses since January amount to but
seventeen killed and thirty-four wounded.

Bill Arnop sagaciously observes:—Man
that is born of one woman and tied to an-
other is of few days and full of trouble.

Servants in England are very exacting in
the matter of their rights and duties, but

any remark addressed to them.

English, because there was in English an
ample vocabulary of clear and definite
diplomatic terms which were possessed by
neither the Chinese nor the Japanese.
