CONTRACT BRIDGE

The bidding:

Opening lead—three diamonds
Fractional bidding is of course not permitted in bridge, yet in many hands a well-oiled partnership can achieve the effectiveness that would be obtained from a bid of two spades, in the sequence in fractional form. South's rebid of two spades, in the sequence shown, amounts in effect to a bid of two and a half spades.
It must not be forgotten that South is at liberty to pass East's intervening call if he has opened a minimum hand. This may appear superficially to be a violation of the rule that a new suit named by responder compels the opening bidder to speak again.
Actually it is not, because East's two diamond bid grants North the opportunity to bid again which his two club response demands. Hence, a voluntary rebid by South confirms not only a sound opening bid but additional values above it. North's raise to three spades, therefore, follows as a matter of course.
South's hand would qualify as a three spade bid if East had not overcalled. The jump bid was not necessary, once East intervened, because the two spade bid was given added force by its voluntary nature.
East won the diamond lead with the ten, cashed the ace and continued with the king. Declarer, alert to the presence of a doubleton diamond in West's hand, trumped, and returned a heart. South then drew trumps and made the contract, losing two diamonds and a spade.
West did not appreciate the power of his trump. He should not have overruled the jack. He has two guaranteed trump tricks coming, sufficient to defeat the contract, simply by discarding a heart or club on the third diamond. West's spade pats are such that there is nothing declarer can do to avoid defeat.
In most situations the defenders grab their tricks as soon as the opportunity is offered them. In this case there is no urgency to take a trick which is already impregnable when the rejection of it assures till another trick.

New Technique In Heart Surgery Progress Reported

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Intermission heart surgery — similar to a play in two or three acts with breaks between—is making some heart repairs thoroughly safe.
This new technique was described today at the close of the American College of Surgeons' annual congress.
It's being done after the little claws into the bark. Happy Jack made a long leap over into the very tree in which Sammy Jay was. Rusty who was part way up, dodged around the trunk of the big hickory tree. It was all done in an instant. Each knew what to do and did it without stopping to find out why he should do it. Had any one of them waited even an instant he would have been caught. As it was, Hooty almost caught Chatterer. Had Chatterer jumped or tried to run he would have been saved. It was his quick wit that saved him. Clinging to the under side of that branch he was safe. Hooty couldn't get at him there. He tried, but he couldn't.
The big hickory tree, which had been the noisiest place in all the Green Forest, was now the quietest place. Hooty flew up in a neighboring tree to watch and later one of those Squirrels would try to get away and give him a chance to catch a dinner.
man body is chilled to slow body processes and blood flow. Then the heart can be opened for direct view to make inside repairs.
Under chilling, blood flow to the heart can be stopped completely for a time. But the safest time limit is six to eight minutes. Here is where the intermission surgery comes in. If the repairs take longer than six minutes, some of the work is done, then clamped arteries are released and the heart is allowed to work again for 10 to 15 minutes. After this intermission blood flow is halted again and the second act of repairs carried out. It's finished in a third act, after another intermission, if necessary.
66-DEGREE TEMPERATURE
All this time the body is kept at the lowered temperature of about 66 degrees.
It's one example of refinements making bold techniques of heart surgery continually safer, said Dr. Harris B. Schumacker of Indianapolis, Ind., and Dr. Henry Swan, Denver, Colo., in summarizing up reported this week in heart surgery.
Dr. Swan has used the intermission technique half a dozen times. Only a few years ago it was impossible to open the heart to see directly what was wrong and how to fix it.

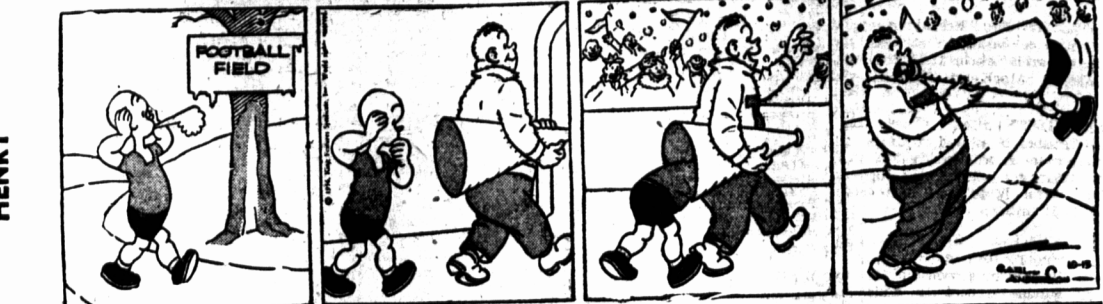
