

Anchors In 3-0 Win Over Stars In Opening Game Of Semi-finals

Johnny Stanley's West End Anchors scored a 3-0 verdict over Fred Whalen's East End Stars in the opening game of their best of three semi-final playoff series at Memorial Field last evening in what was by far the snappiest and best game of ball played in City Baseball League play this season.

The game was called because of darkness after six full innings.

Playing tight, classy ball for five innings that saw both teams retire the opposition in straight order in all but two of six trips to the plate, the Anchors pulled the big bust-up in the bottom of the sixth for three runs on four hits off losing hurler Lefty McAleer, combined with three Stars' errors in the field.

Coming through with a good two-hit performance on the mound for Anchors, Merlyn "Red" MacKenzie got solid backing from his club to emerge the winning pitcher. McAleer also had the same support for five innings to chalk up a two-hitter up to that point, but fell slightly apart in both departments in the fatal last of the sixth.

Getting to McAleer's offerings for four sharp ground hits, Anchors made the most of it and combined with three errors by Stars, pushed the only three runs of the game across the plate.

The batting sections of either team were anything but weak, with some long hits and hot line drives being snared by clever fielding to cut scoring chances to a minimum.

Getting on base with a sharp ground hit, his second of the night, Jack Burke was the man to score the winning run. Getting down to

second on catcher Arnold McCallum's poor throw to second on a steal play. Maurice Flynn's single sent him to third with Eddie Pincau batting him home to get on himself on a fielder's choice.

Pitcher MacKenzie scored with the only strikeouts of the game, two, but gave up the only walk of the game as well. McAleer had no strikeouts and gave up no free passes.

Local boxing fans who witnessed the excellent four-bout card staged at the Forum here on Tuesday night by manager Bill Brown, certainly couldn't have asked for better ring entertainment and the large crowd in attendance expressed their pleasure by their liberal applause throughout the evening. From the main event between Tommy Spencer and Harry Poulton in a Maritime welterweight title match to the four round curtain raiser between Bobby Gallant and Ralph Fitzsimmons, the program produced an action-packed night of good, exciting boxing entertainment, one of the finest to be seen in this quarter for a long time. The promoter and contestants were a credit to their professions for the excellent program.

The Spencer-Poulton title scrap lived up to every bit of its advanced billing to give followers of the sport a real treat in smooth, finished boxing and plenty of fireworks. Boxing better than he has done throughout his career in the ring, the local challenger, Poulton, provided most of the thrills in the field of clever boxing while Spencer, still the champion, was the boy who put the belting angle into the bout. The combination made an excellent formula for a top-notch fixture.

Surpassing any of his previous appearances in a local ring, Poulton proved to be a master of the art of bobbing, weaving and counter punching that had his opponent, on a number of occasions throughout the match, completely baffled as to how to cope with the situation. Trying to get set to land those damaging punches that put Poulton on the canvas twice in a previous fight a month ago, Spencer was being continually kept off balance by that educated left hand of Poulton's that was ever flicking in and out in light blows to the head and face which eventually had Spencer's left eye cut and bleeding.

But it wasn't quite enough. The aggressor, Spencer, kept moving; in all the time in the typical style of a champion and at every opening was throwing hard right and left hands to the face and head of his opponent. He never stopped boring in and, although he was held off expertly at times by Poulton's long-range, shifting tactics, it paid off for him in the eyes of the judges. Two voted in identical counts by rounds in favor of Spencer while the other favored Poulton by a round to round count.

One heard a lot of complimentary remarks over the show following the card last night with most agreeing that it was one of the best all-round cards to be witnessed here in a long time. But there were also a lot who were not in favor of the final decision of the judges. Many felt that the decision was Poulton's, but then they weren't the judges. It is easy to sit back and just view the fight on a general overall plane, but it is yet another thing to criticize those who are there for the purpose of watching and taking notes on every little detail of the fight to cast a final decision.

These judges are picked for their knowledge of the game and although the layman may see it differently, one must remember that the judges may see many things or tally their score on details of a fight that others may not think are important at all. For instance, aggressiveness is a big factor in favor of any fighter and the damaging result of a well-placed blow is rated much more highly than a lightly thrown one. These and many other features are the things that a judge takes into account in his scoring. While the average spectator might marvel at some particular feat of skilled maneuvering, the judge is probably noting several unsensational but effective body punches that are probably even more important to the final result of a fight. And so it goes, and although it may be a drop in one's own pride as a judge of a fighter, by picking the "wrong" winner in individual opinion, remember that two of three judges, all chosen for their ability and knowledge of determining the winner, saw it in favor of Spencer and their word is final and must be respected.

Kid Gavilan Retains Welterweight Title By Narrow Margin

NEW YORK, Aug. 29 (AP) — Welterweight champion Kid Gavilan retained his title by the thinnest of margins tonight as he gained a split 15-round decision over Billy Graham of New York before 8,137 fans in Madison Square Garden. A storm of boos greeted the verdict.

The kid from Cuba, making the first defence of his crown since he won it May 18, defeated Graham by three points — just about as close as any decision can be in this state.

Referee Mark Conn's decision in favor of the 25-year-old Gavilan, after the two judges had split, brought a resounding chorus of objection from the heavily pro-Graham crowd.

Ohio Swimmer Wins Of C.N.E. Marathon

TORONTO, Aug. 29 (CP) — Jerry Kerschner, 29-year-old Columbus, O., swimmer now living in Toronto today beat off the challenge of an untried Winnipeg youth to win the world's professional swimming championship at the Canadian National Exhibition.

Kerschner covered the punishing 10 miles along the C. N. E. waterfront in four hours, 26 minutes and 32 seconds to win \$5,000 plus \$150 in lap prizes.

For the first eight laps it appeared the big swim would go to young George Bevan, 18-year-old Niagara, making his first appearance as a professional. Last Monday Bevan copped the Canadian amateur two-mile title at the C. N. E.

In today's race he set a blistering pace to lead until the ninth mile. Meanwhile Cliff Lumsden of suburban New Toronto, expected to win his third successive C. N. E. marathon title, was well back. He finished strongly to overhaul Steve Wozniak, Buffalo, N. Y., truck driver, for third place.

Only 12 minutes and 27 seconds separated the first and sixth-place finishers, unprecedented in C. N. E. marathons.

Bevan's four hours, 31 minutes and 25 seconds with Lumsden one minute and three seconds behind.

Soldier Survives 180 Ft. Drop Into Gorge At Niagara

NIAGARA FALLS, N. Y., Aug. 27 (CP) — A Canadian soldier, who fell 180 feet down the steep bank of the Niagara gorge late Saturday night, was rescued yesterday afternoon by police and firemen when a passer-by saw him and turned in an alarm.

He is Pte Sheldon Henshaw of Camp Borden, Ont., who is listed in "good" condition in Memorial Hospital here. Attendants said he suffered a back injury, broken ribs and shock.

Henshaw told police he did not know how he happened to fall into the gorge south of the whirlpool rapids bridge just before midnight.

Henshaw a native of Nova Scotia and a private in the Royal Canadian Armored Corps, Meaford detachment, said he shouted himself voiceless trying to attract attention.

He said he lay in the bushes in the long hours of the night with the sounds of hundreds of people and automobiles passing above him and yet, he said, he was "the most completely alone man in the world."

"I tried to pull myself up on a little path where people might see me. I pulled myself along with my arms, but I fell back. I could not make it. I had lost my voice 'crying for help.'"

First-aid men from the frontier ambulance service got Henshaw into a Stokes stretcher, which is specially designed for such cases. A human chain of 25 men carefully passed him from hand to hand up the narrow, dangerous path.

REPORTED MISSING MOFFITT FIELD, Calif., Aug. 29 (AP)

Roland caused the biggest surprise by defeating Gerry Kesseling of Kitchener, Ont., in the afternoon round and 1.

In the morning he had an even tougher time getting rid of big Johnny Dukelow of Montreal, the match going to the 19th.

Mawhinney won 3 and 2 over Allan Boes of Winnipeg in the morning and 5 and 4 over Glenn Gray of Edmonton in the afternoon.

Still in the Vancouver procession, but with a quarter-final cut-throat match tomorrow, are Percy Clogg and Walter McElroy. Along with them are Phil Farley or Toronto Scarborough, who has twice been runner-up in the Canadian amateur; Don Doe, Quebec amateur champion from Granby; Roy Kepron of Winnipeg, and Fred Kammer of Detroit.

Clogg, never under par in his play so far in this tournament, disposed of Colin Brown of London, Ont., 5 and 4 in the morning and then walloped Pete Kelly of Fredericton, N. B., 7 and 6 in the afternoon, a match in which Kelly played his poorest in any round.

Maritime golfers made a tough battle of it but were all out at the end of the fourth round.

Tom Stewart of St. Andrews, N. B., Walter Reed, Jr., of Aroostook Valley, N. B., and Pete Kelly of Fredericton had the longest life. They were fourth-round eliminations but four other Maritimers kept up with them until the third round.
