SIR CHARLES TUPPER'S PROGRAMME.

(a) The policy of tariff protection to Canadian manufacturers and producers of all kinds, sufficient to secure them against unfair competition in their natural and rightful home market, thus ensuring diversified employment at living wages for Canadian labor and profitable employment for Canadian capital.

(b) A fast Atlantic service of steamships equipped not only to guarantee the safety and comfort of passengers but the rapid placing of the most perishable products of the Dominion upon the markets of Great Britain.

(c) The National system of oil storage and transportation, already set forth, which will not only secure to our agriculturalists the steadiest and best prices for their products and reduce the loss through waste to a minimum, but will go far towards demonstrating to the people of the Motherland that the great confederacy of nations over which the British flag floats, is easily capable of becoming independent of the rest of the world for its food supply.

(d) Mutual Imperial Preferential Trade, not a one-sided arrangement destined to failure because of its inherent unfairness, but an arrangement by which the products of the Dominion will be given preferential treatment given to us by the people of Great Britain and by our fellow colonists. The advantages which the people of Canada would derive from such an Imperial Trade Policy are self-evident. To the farmers of the older provinces a small duty levied by England on foreign agricultural produce would mean very greatly increased demand for their products in the best market in the world. It would mean to the people of our Northwest Territories—the great granary of the continent—such an almost incalculable advantage that our wild lands would be speedily populated by progressive farmers, these in turn providing manufacturers and merchants with an increased home market, and so stimulating every branch of industry in the Dominion.

B. here and to the west. The company has placed several large contracts with Nova Scotia firms, calling for immediate delivery.

NEWFOUNDLAND TOO

General Elections on and Feeling Running High.

HALIFAX Oct. 11.—The general election in Newfoundland will be held November 8. Party feeling there runs high. The government leader Robert Bond is making the issue the negotiation of a treaty of reciprocity with the United States on the same lines as the old proposed Bond-Blaine treaty and a curtailment of privileges given by the late government led by A. B. Marine, to Reid, who controls nearly all the public franchises of the colony.

Advices from St. John's announce that the Herald, the leading newspaper, is thereto supporting the Marine party and Reid, has gone over to the government side.

A HUGE CROP.

Iowa Will this Year Produce 531,430,029 Bushels.

Des Moines, Ia., Oct. 11.—The official preliminary estimates of the crop yield of Iowa for the current year show that the total of all cereals will be 531,439,029 bushels, which is ten million in excess of any previous year and 131,000,000 above the average yearly output the past ten years.

A Second Crop.

ARKONA, Oct. 11.—The continued warm weather has resulted in the ripening of a second crop of raspberries in sufficient quantity for marketing. On Saturday, a full crate of raspberries was shipped to Sarnia for sale, and another to Petrolia. If cold weather stays off for a few days longer, growers expect to have a second crop of ripe raspberries.

Bourassa's Story.

MONTREAL, Oct. 10.—J. G. H. Bergeron, who has just returned from Labelle, says Mr. Bourassa, the well known anti-imperialist M. P. for that constituency, has been telling his electors that the governor general and Gen. Hutton were responsible for sending the Canadian troops to South Africa, and that they tricked Laurier into sending the contingent. As the governor-general cannot reply to the attack, it is expected Premier Laurier will refute it.

A Liberal Refuses to Run.

MONTREAL, Oct. 11.—W. J. M. McLaren the Liberal nominee in Huntingtor, refuses to run. Huntingtor is a hotbed of old time Liberals, and McLaren after a careful canvass came to the conclusion that the straight government candidate would be swamped.

Positions Re-occupied.

BLOEMFONTEIN, Oct. 11.—The British forces have re-occupied Smithfield, Rouxville, Wepener and Dewetsdorp, Orange River Colony.

South African League.

CAPE TOWN, Oct. 11.—The Congress adopted a resolution approving the government's policy and the "splendid services" of Sir Alfred Milner, and tendering sincere thanks to the colonies for the "Imperial spirit which prompted them to send troops to South Africa."
