OTTAWA LETTER

Devlin's Home Rule Resolution.

[CONCLUDED.]
 (Special Correspondence of The Examiner.)

After again quoting from Mr. McCarthy as to the independent position of the Irish Party between the Tory and Liberal parties of Great Britain, Mr. Curran concluded thus: Mr. Speaker, far from desiring to see either of the great parties triumph to any large extent in the forthcoming elections, but I sincerely hope that they will be so evenly balanced that the power between them will remain with the Home Rulers themselves, so that they will secure that measure of Home Rule for which they are striving, that measure of justice for which they have so long contended, and contended successfully; because they have made advances which are really wonderful. When we consider that one point after another has been won from a party that long resisted the aspirations of the Irish people, and when we look at what has been achieved by a united people, led as they have been for some years past, I say that great and rapid strides have been made in the cause of true liberty. All that they want, all that they ask, is constitutional liberty. They feel that they know that the interests of the Irish people are bound up with the Empire. They have contributed too much blood and treasure, too much of their energy and their genius to build up that Empire, to sever themselves from it. They feel that that Empire is as much theirs as that of any other section, no matter what the claims of that section may be. We are all satisfied that in the early future there will be a great triumph for those who are battling on constitutional lines for constitutional liberty, and I say, God grant that that day may so-n come.

Mr. Dalton McCarthy was, of course, opposed to the motion. The Crimes Act had left Ireland almost free from crimes, and the act was withdrawn in nearly every district by proclamation. The laws of Ireland were merciful laws. If any one looked back on the history of Ireland and saw the Government remove the grievances from which Ireland suffered it would be a piece of impudence for them to pass such a resolution. Ireland could be placed in the position of Canada without causing disreputement of the Empire. He did not understand what the mover meant by Home Rule. He understood the Home Rule of Redmond, which was also the Home Rule of McCarthy, but no one yet knew what kind of Home Rule Gladstone desired to give to Ireland. He was against the resolution and would not pass anything which would be an insult to Lord Salisbury. Were we going to insult Lord Salisbury, who had so carefully looked after Canadian affairs? Ireland was not unrepresented in the British Parliament. There was a strong and able representation there from Ireland. He said that Balfour was the best secretary that Ireland ever had, and believing that the Parliament had made a mistake in 1887 and again in 1886 in 1887 in passing such resolutions he would move in amendment to the amendment.

That all after "that" in the motion be struck out and the following be substituted instead thereof: "That this House is of opinion that it ought not to interfere in questions not within its jurisdiction save only in matters of exceptional and extraordinary character; that the question of home rule in Ireland, being one in which the great political parties in Great Britain and Ireland are divided, is a matter on which it would be inadvisable for this House to take sides; that regard being had to the peace and prosperity which now exist in Ireland owing to the wise and firm administration of the law, beneficial changes which have been made in the agrarian laws and the material aid which has been afforded to the impoverished portions of the kingdom, the course adopted by it in the years 1882 and 1886 in offering to advise the Imperial Parliament as to the course it should take with reference to Ireland and in expressing an opinion as to the wisdom of the policy in favor of home rule for that portion of the United Kingdom."

It had been arranged, I have been told, that the Ministers should take no part in the debate, leaving the discussion perfectly free to both sides, and themselves at liberty to vote as they pleased. But Hon. John Costigan could not stand it. He got the Irish up and when McCarthy sat down he took the floor and spoke as follows. I had never heard Mr. Costigan make a speech before. I had heard him speak in the Department, but I had never seen him aroused. As six o'clock was approaching his remarks were necessarily short, but they were pointed and sincere. There was no clap-trap in his speech, no playing the role of a demagogue, no appeal to the galleries, for the galleries were largely against him. This is what he said:

I have perhaps been identified as closely with the question of Home Rule before this country as any member of this House, and I have no objection that my hon. friend of Ottawa should make any motion on the subject before this parliament which he may think fit. I moved the resolution in 1882, according to the expressed views of the Irish people of Canada, views that were expressed through their different organizations. At that time this parliament received the proposition of an Address to Her Majesty very kindly, and the resolution was passed unanimously by this Chamber and with only six dissenting voices in the Senate. In 1886 I was asked to move again in this matter. I asked my friends who approached me at that time if they thought anything would be accomplished by bringing the question before the House again, if they thought we could get a more favorable expression of opinion than we got in 1882. They said: No. Then I said: You are running the risk of doing an injury to Home Rule and of undoing the good which has already been done. I would give the same advice to my young friend who has mov-

ed this resolution now, and I say that I regret that he or the friends who advised him in the matter thought fit to bring this before the House, because I am afraid that the vote which will be taken will be used across the Atlantic as an indication of a reaction from the views expressed in 1882. At the same time the principle of Home Rule is here, that the principle of Home Rule, which this parliament committed itself to in 1882 so completely, and in 1886 so strongly, is there, no matter how my hon. friend (McCarthy) may feel a regret for the generous vote he gave on that occasion, and I will vote for the resolution of the hon. member for Ottawa (Mr. Devlin). I have every confidence that this resolution will not be voted down, as has been stated by the hon. member for West York (Mr. Wallace) that hon. gentleman appeals to this House and attempts to justify rebellion in the old country if Home Rule should be carried. Rebellion by whom? The men of Ulster? Why, the majority of the men of Ulster are Home Rulers, and these people speak only for the minority in Ulster. The majority of the Ulster people are speaking and working in favor of Home Rule. It is unfair to ask the people of Canada who are enjoying the blessings which we ask for our unfortunate countrymen at home, to vote down such a resolution, and no fair man here can fail to give an expression of sympathy in favor of that system of Government which we in Canada enjoy and of which we are so proud. Why should we not express an opinion in favor of that system? They talk about the danger of handing over Ireland to the control of the majority. The whole history of Ireland shows that the minority have been the trustees of the country. Mr. Lecky, the great Unionist writer, quoting the remarks of the Duke of Portland, said:

"He was much struck with the fact that Protestant Ulster was the most disaffected of the four provinces; that five-sixths of the leaders and United Irishmen were Protestants; that Munster, though now profoundly loyal, had shown itself perfectly loyal during the French expedition at the end of 1796; that Connaught, the most purely Catholic province in Ireland, was the one province which was still almost untaught."

What indication is there in the old country that the majority professing the Catholic faith are less loyal to the Crown than the minority? At least that Catholic majority have never proclaimed openly that they would rebel against the decision of the Parliament of the country. There is just one more point to which I want to call the attention of the House. My hon. friend from West York (Mr. Wallace) states that while we have been pleading for Home Rule and the sympathy of this Parliament has gone out in favor of it, not a tittle of evidence has been given to show that Ireland has ever been misgoverned. Why, it is the admission of all governments, Liberal and Conservative alike, that Ireland has been misgoverned for centuries, and it is the fact that both political parties in the old country have been endeavoring to afford a remedy for these evils of late years. My hon. friend drew a contrast between this discussion and that which took place in this House before, and said how tame were the speeches of the mover and seconder of this resolution, compared with the speeches of the hon. member for Bruce and others when this matter was up before. I think the member for Montreal Centre (Mr. Curran) must be satisfied that the hon. gentleman, if there is any lack of eloquence in this House to defend this measure, I can assure the hon. gentleman that the same feeling, the same hope and the same longing throughout this country remain as firm as ever and in fact are increased today. I have nothing further to say but that, this motion being before the House, I am wedded to a principle which commands my best and deepest sympathies, and wherever I speak as a Home Ruler.

When Mr. Costigan concluded it wanted only three minutes to six o'clock. Mr. Fraser, of Guysboro, who had twice failed to catch the Speaker's eye, succeeded better on the third attempt, and had only one time to express sympathy with the motion when the Speaker left the chair.

It is not probable that the motion will be reached again this Session. Curran's and Costigan's speeches have created quite a sensation. If the Opposition encouraged Mr. Devlin with the anticipation that they had got the Irish supporters of the Government in a corner, they never made a greater mistake.

A Hard Profession.

World's Columbian Exposition,
 Chicago, 1893.

THE Government of the Dominion of Canada has accepted the invitation of the Government of the United States to take part in the World's Columbian Exposition, to be held in Chicago from 1st May to 31st October, 1893. As it is important that a very full display of Canadian produce be made on this occasion, a general invitation is extended to Canadian producers and manufacturers in agriculture, horticulture, products of forests, fisheries, minerals, manufactures, etc., etc., to send to the Dominion Government, by the natural resources and industrial products of Canada, as well as a credit to the country.

An Executive Commissioner for Canada has been appointed, who will have the general charge of the exhibition and the selection of specimens and the several Provincial Governments have been invited to co-operate with the view of making the exhibition such a display of the Dominion as possible.

The Dominion Government will pay the transportation of exhibits and the cost of the building of the Dominion Government.

Entries must be made not later than 31st July. The receipt of articles at the Exhibition building will commence 1st November, 1892, and all exhibits, excepting live stock, must be in place by 1st April, 1893.

Forms of application for space and general information can be obtained on applying to the Dominion Government.

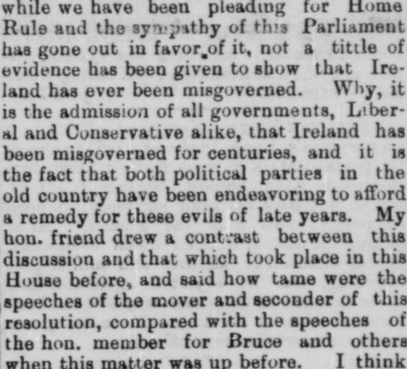
P. E. I. Stock Breeders Association.

A public meeting of this Association was held at the rooms, Queen Street, on the 10th inst., as advertised. There was a fair attendance of members. Leading farmers from different sections of the country were also present and were unanimously elected members of the Association. The president, Dr. J. J. Jenkins, presided, and briefly pointed out the leading features of the Association, its advantages to farmers, and in fact to all who were interested in the breeding of improved stock.

The meeting was also addressed by Albert Boswell, Wm. Mutch, Geo. Tweedy, Mr. D. McKay M.P.P., A. Macdonald, Chas. Duckendoff, James Guard, W. Crane and Richard Bagnall, jr., Esquires— all of whom approved of the formation of the Stock Breeders Association, which to farmers especially could not fail to be of great importance. The recent importation of valuable cattle by the Board of Commissioners for the Government Stock Farm was alluded to, and the Secretary was instructed to ask for a copy of certificates of registration and other particulars relating to those animals.
