TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER. A Question of Precedence. OTTAWA, June 6. The Montreal Methodist Conference, which is to-day in session here, after a most exciting debate, unanimously adopted the following resolution, moved by Dr. Douglas, of Montreal: Whereas, The constitution of Dominion of union of church and state recognizing all sections of state as standing on the ground of equality; Whereas, In the table of precedence we have the following order: Governor-General, Lieutenant-Governors, Archbishops and Bishops, Members of the Cabinet, etc., thus ignoring the existence of the great Protestant Church which represents the majority of the Dominion; Whereas, In the aforesaid order of precedence prominence is given to an Arch bishop who is the appointee of the Primate of Rome and the official degradation of the clergy of all Protestant churches. Resolved, That we hereby utter and declare our protest against the aforesaid order and declare our purpose to employ all legitimate means to secure its abrogation as creative of invidious distinctions between religious bodies to the disadvantage of the Protestant minority. Resolved, That we memorialize the General Conference to take such means as it seems best to secure such abrogations. The Newfoundland Trouble. HALIFAX, June 6. Rev. Father Guillo, who arrived from St. John's, N. F., this morning, said that the fishermen at Sandy Point, St. George's Bay, are very much excited over the way in which they have been treated by the French. A day before the steamer Caspian sailed, the schooner Rover, Capt. Graham, while fishing off St. George's Bay, was hailed by a boat from a French man-of-war and ordered to take in her nets. The captain deliberately pulled the fishing gear from the water. Rev. Father Howley interviewed the commander of the French vessel and got him to refrain from further action until the arrival of the St. John's delegates, who are now on the other side trying to effect a settlement of the question. A number of fishermen had a meeting at St. George's on Friday night at which resolutions were passed to the effect that if the French came inside the shore limits and floated their nets they would be fired on. British Parliament. LONDON, June 6. In the Commons yesterday the bill for the construction of a tunnel under the British Channel, from England to France, was rejected by a vote of 234 to 153. In committee on the Tithes Bill a proposal for the equitable revision of tithes in accordance with the altered conditions of husbandry, was rejected, after the enforcement of the closure Rule, by a vote of 240 to 197. Mr. Goschen announced that he would proceed with the Land Purchase Bill on Monday. Canada's Financial Position. OTTAWA, June 6. The debt of Canada decreased \$175,000 during last month. The revenue for the eleven months just ended shows an increase of \$150,000 as compared with the same period of the last fiscal year, and the expenditure a decrease of nearly a million. The surplus on June 1st was over seven millions. Mowat's Majority. TORONTO, June 6. The election returns show Mowat's majority to be at least 20, and may reach 24. It was a great victory for the little Premier as against the Protestant cry raised by the Empire and the Meredith party. So say Mowat's supporters. The Exchequer Court. OTTAWA, June 6.
