Church Paper Joins Controversy

LONDON (Reuters) — The Church of England Newspaper, a non-official but influential religious journal, joined Friday in the controversy over recent criticism of the British monarchy.
Modern methods of publicity have made the crown too exalted a symbol, it says, but there have been signs that Queen Elizabeth and Prince Philip have been feeling their way out of the difficulty.
The journal says there has been a marked relaxation of protocol during the last year or two and that recent criticism of the "reputeness and unreality" of the monarchy are therefore "singularly ill-timed."

Discordant Notes Seem The Thing In Musical World

NEW YORK (AP)—The discordant notes coming these days from Tin Pan Alley, the 10-storey collection of tiny offices and tiny pianos on upper Broadway, drawn out the old adage: "Music hath charms to soothe the savage breast."

Instead, you hear the raucous snappings and snarlings of song writers and publishers belaboring each other.

Arranged on opposite sides are the American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers, better known as ASCAP, and Broadcast Music Inc., better known as BMI. Both are engaged in collecting performance fees under the U.S. Copyright Act of 1909, which guarantees to owners of musical copyrights the exclusive right of public performance for profit. The courts have held this to mean that whenever a song is played on radio or television in a movie sound track, in a restaurant or dance hall, someone must pay both the piper and the writer of the tune the piper.

Congress and the federal courts have been busy looking into charges that BMI, set up by the broadcasters in competition to ASCAP, is engaged in a conspiracy to keep ASCAP music off the air and thereby curb the earning power of some of the leading song writers. The public has been dragged into the act with claims that it is being rock and rolled to the cultural depths by some disk jockeys playing trashy, sometimes obscene songs behind a sinisterly controlled electronic curtain. Is taste in popular music going awry?

Actors Have Better Chance Of Success In Old Country

LONDON (AP) — "Go east, young lady, east across the Atlantic."
That's the advice from actress Anna Massey to girls who yearn for a career upon the merry stage.
"If a girl is really serious about acting," she says, "England's the place. I don't mean that the acting is better here. But there's so much more chance."
"In America, there's much more competition for fewer places. It seems a miracle that anyone ever gets on the stage at all in America."
Anna, the suburban-haired, daintily built English daughter of Canadian actor Raymond Massey, ought to know. Just turned 20, she has already played star parts in London and on Broadway — in The Reluctant Debutante earlier this year — and now is starring again in London in a light-weight comedy called Dear Delinquent.
It isn't, she says, an easy life for the American or Canadian girl crashing the British stage.
"If she gets a part, it'll probably be out-of-town repertory." About £9 (\$25) a week, two shows a night and dreary theatrical boarding houses in provincial towns.
