Island Ayrshire Third In Canada

Pine View Robelia, a cow owned by Agriculture Minister Andrew MacRae and Fred T. MacRae, Union Road, stood third in her class in Canada in production, for the period reported in the current issue of the Canadian Ayrshire Review.

She produced 10,034 pounds milk, 466 butterfat for a breed class average of 132 in milk, 149 in butterfat as a junior three-year-old. Another cow from the same herd, Raedale Classic Belle, produced 9,553 pounds milk, 452 pounds fat for BCAs of 128 milk and 146 fat.

Also from the same herd were Raedale Classic Lady Sovereign with 9,700 milk, 427 fat for BCAs of 140 and 148, and Raedale Landlord's Lullaby with 8,585 milk, 376 fat, for BCA of 129 and 136. Both were junior two-year-olds.

Two records came from the herd of Col. F. I. Andrew, Charlottetown. Royalty Burton's Norma produced 9,148 pounds milk, 402 butterfat for BCAs of 129 and 136 and Royalty Burton's Nina 8,725 milk, 368 fat for BCAs of 128 and 129. Both were junior two-year-olds.

Charlottetown Gay Terry produced 9,589 pounds milk, 405 fat for BCAs of 144 and 146 as a junior two-year-old and Charlottetown Gay Phyllis 42,131 milk, 514 fat for BCAs of 144 and 148 as a senior four-year-old. Both are owned by the Experimental Farm, Charlottetown.

Ayrstead Merry Julia produced 9,162 pounds milk, 383 fat for BCAs of 129 in both milk and fat as a junior two-year-old and

Ayrstead Merry Iris produced 10,259 pounds milk, 427 fat for BCAs of 143 in milk and fat as a senior two-year-old. Both are owned by the Estate of Brenton Stead, Souris RR.

East River Sheila produced 12,552 pounds milk, 508 fat in the mature class for BCAs of 143

in milk and fat and East River Patsy produced 10,707 pounds milk, 426 fat for BCAs of 125 milk, 123 fat also in the mature class. East River Trudy produced 12,561 pounds milk, 461 fat for BCAs of 145 milk, 132 fat as a senior four-year-old. The three animals are owned by A. I. M. Wood and Sons, Little York.

Fairvue Jewel produced 10,917 pounds milk, 468 fat for BCAs of 128 milk, 135 fat for owner D. Fred MacRae, Hunter River, in the mature class.

Sunny Bay Patricia produced 10,322 pounds milk, 422 fat for BCAs of 125 in milk and fat in the 10 years and over class for owner R.A. White, Rollo Bay West.

Cloviewview Marilyn, a mature cow, produced 10,431 pounds milk, 435 fat for BCAs of 123 milk, 127 fat for W.A. Moase and Son, Kensington RR.

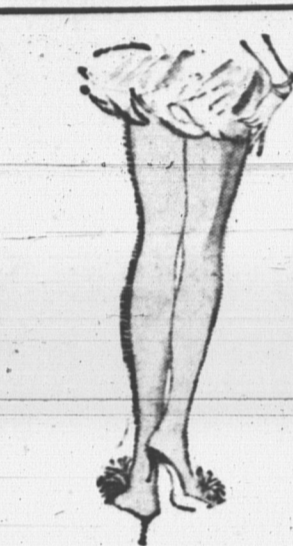
