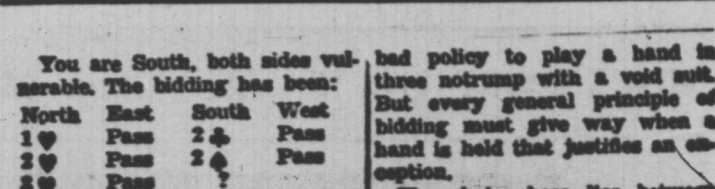

CONTRACT BRIDGE

You are South, both sides vulnerable. The bidding has been:

North	East	South	West
1♥	Pass	2♠	Pass
2♥	Pass	2♠	Pass
3♥	Pass	3♥	Pass

What would you now bid with each of the following four hands?

1. ♠A764 ♣J3 ♣Q6 ♠AKQ82
 2. ♠KQ764 ♣95 ♣6 ♠AKJ853
 3. ♠KQ62 ♣AK82 ♠AKJ864
 4. ♠KJ53 ♣AK5 ♠AKQJ9843

1. Four hearts. There is a natural reluctance to raise partner's suit with only two trumps, but the J-3 constitute ample support after a suit has been bid three times. No other bid should be seriously considered. With 15 high card points facing an opening bid, there is no question about reaching a game contract, even though partner sounds woefully discouraging. A three notrump contract should not be undertaken in view of the diamond weakness.

2. Three spades. North cannot yet be aware of the 5-5 distribution. The two club bid, followed by the secondary spade bid, normally indicates 5-4 distribution, with clubs being the longer suit. But the three spade bid shows that the spades are rebidable, and hence must be based on a five card suit. It also follows that the clubs are at least six long, since, if the distribution had been 5-5, the spades would have been named first.

3. Three notrump. It is usually

bad policy to play a hand in three notrump with a void suit. But every general principle of bidding must give way when a hand is held that justifies an exception.

The choice here lies between bidding four diamonds or three notrump. While a four diamond bid would represent the distribution as exactly 4-0-4-5, the information volunteered might do more harm than good. If the proper station is three notrump, as appears likely with partner signing off repeatedly, the four diamond bid prevents that contract from being reached. There are enough high cards to make nine tricks in notrump very probable, even though a misfit is known to exist.

4. Five clubs. This powerful hand, facing an opening bid by partner, is greatly reduced in value by North's sign-off bid. The original outlook of a probable slam hand is considerably weakened by the apparent lack of a suitable trump suit. But game, of course, must be undertaken, and the indicated best trump suit is clubs.

The clubs are virtually self-sufficient and can be played satisfactorily as trump even if it turns out that partner has a singleton club or a void. It is unlikely more than one trump trick will be lost. North is not prohibited from going on to six clubs, and is, in fact, being urged to do so if possible.

Atlantic Port Use Is Stressed

OTTAWA (CP) — The Senate Wednesday rejected a resolution which urged steps to increase use of Atlantic ports and a five-month winter closure on St. Lawrence harbors to lessen the impact of the St. Lawrence Seaway on East Coast operations.

The upper House generally agreed with any efforts to increase Atlantic harbor traffic but balked at the second section of the resolution sponsored by Senator William Isnor (L — Nova Scotia).

Any such measure "looks very much like feather bedding," said Senator Arthur M. Peacock (PC — Saskatchewan).

"INCREASE EXPENSES"

The closure — from Nov. 15 to April 15 — would not stop grain shipments via Vancouver, he said, and would increase expenses for Prairie grain growers.

Nova Scotia should seek to better its economy by industrial and other development — he had heard it lacked beef cattle for example — in various ways.

Senator Walter Acland, government leader in the upper House, said the United States would take a dim view of any St. Lawrence closure. He added that Atlantic grain traffic would suffer.

Senator Isnor fell in an attempt to amend the resolution so that the closure period would apply to all St. Lawrence ports upstream from Quebec City.

Church Boards Are Criticized

OTTAWA (CP) — National United Church boards and executives have been criticized by the Ottawa United Church Presbytery for comments and statements made on behalf of the church.

Spokesmen among some 100 clergy and laymen at the presbytery meeting Tuesday at near-choise, Que. made special reference to United Church pronouncements on the Newfoundland labor dispute, pacifism and the banning of nuclear weapons tests.

"Church executive officials are assuming a responsibility they really should not undertake," said retired minister Rev. A. I. Bookstead.

"The pronouncements which have come out from secretaries and boards do not reflect the feeling and convictions of the majority of United Church members. Executive officials and boards should seriously consider whether they are not presuming too much."

Reds Refuse Mother's Visa

CORNER BRO'K (CP) — The Soviet government has refused Ernest Langins' request that his mother be allowed to leave Latvia to join him here.

Mr. Langins said he has been notified by the Soviet government that his plea for an exit visa for his 86-year-old mother has been turned down. He made the request to Anastas Mikoyan through an interpreter when the Soviet deputy premier's plane made an unscheduled landing at Argentina, Nfld., in January.

Mr. Langins said the Russian note informed him that there was no reason why he could not visit Latvia and see his mother whenever he wanted. There was no possibility of a change of decision.

The 59-year-old technical director of Bowater's (Newfoundland) pulp and paper mills here has been trying for three years to get his mother to Canada. He last saw her 15 years ago. Mrs. Langins lives in Sloka, about 25 miles from the Latvian capital.

Air Compressor Plug Is Deadly

READING, England (CP) — A plug blew out of an air compressor inside Britain's main atomic weapons research centre near here Wednesday and killed a young engineer working nearby.

Officials of the Aldermaston atomic weapons research establishment, west of London, said no radioactive material was housed in the laboratory where the accident happened.

The engineer, 25-year-old Norman Adams, died of severe head injuries.

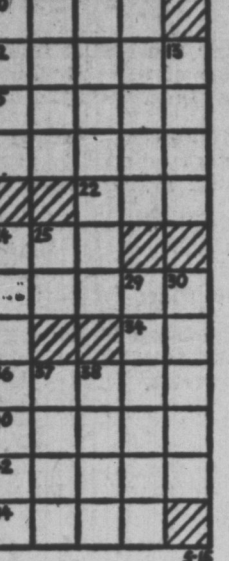

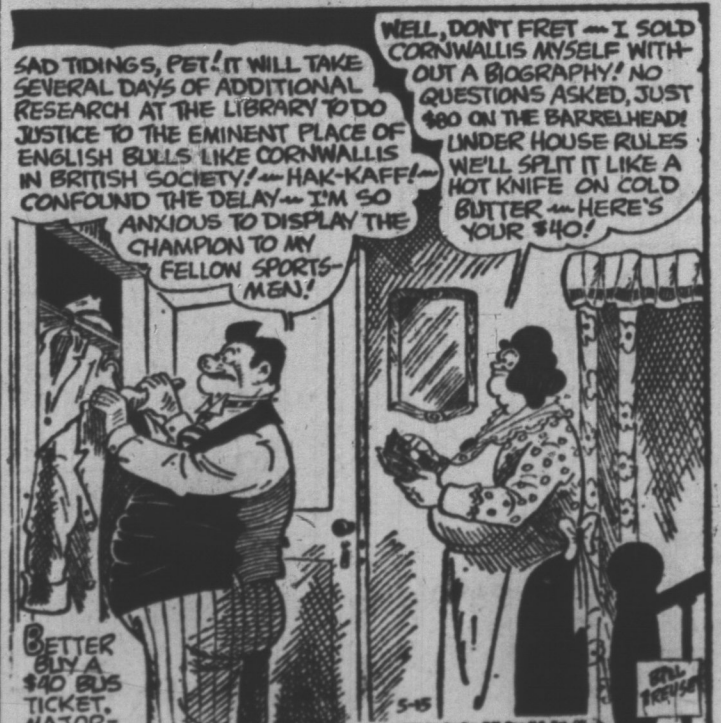

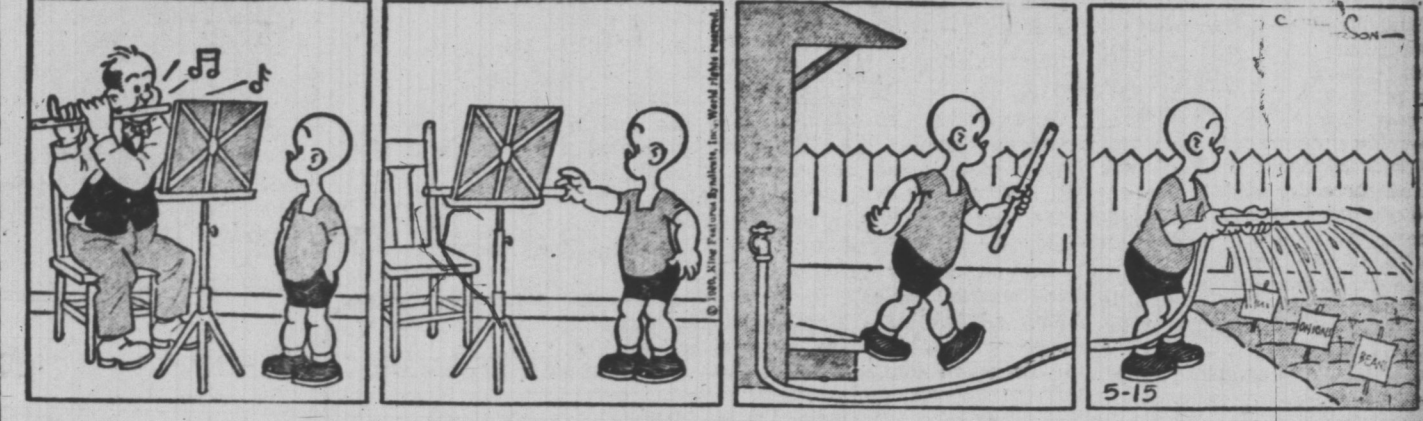
