A GOOD TIME TO SELF.—Seamen are very scarce in St. John at present. As a consequence the rate by the run to the United Kingdom or Continent has gone up from \$20 to \$35. The other rates remain as before. ANARCHY IN CHICAGO. CHICAGO, Nov. 13. The Times this morning says anarchy is even more thoroughly organized at present than at the time of the Haymarket Square riot, and the membership is larger than ever. It prints an interview with Inspector Bonfield, who says he has detectives looking up their meetings who have the names and addresses of the leading and most radical anarchists; so they can be reached in case of trouble. The Inspector thinks trouble will come sooner or later, as they have set a day for it at headquarters. Inspector Bonfield also has positive evidence of the organization officers' plans of the International, the central point of which is London. They have agreed on the 100th anniversary of the Bastille as the day for concerted uprising. RAILWAY RUMBLINGS. OTTAWA, Nov. 13. Mr. Vanhorne has given a direct denial to the statement going the rounds of the papers to the effect that the Canadian Pacific Railway is preparing to build wharves and elevators at Portland, Me., in anticipation of making that city its Atlantic seaboard port. He says the construction of the Short Line is progressing satisfactorily. There are about seven miles of trestle work to be completed at Shipton, and a considerable amount of ballasting to be done before the line is fit for traffic. MORE ANNEXATION. WASHINGTON, Nov. 13. Hon. Joseph Chamberlain and Miss Mary Endicott will be married on Thursday at noon, before the altar of St. John's Church, the most fashionable Episcopal place of worship here. The wedding will be very quiet, with neither bridesmaids nor best man, and no guests save a few near relatives of the bride, the President and Mrs. Cleveland, and some of the higher officials in Washington. GEN. WARREN'S RESIGNATION. LONDON, Nov. 13. In the Commons this afternoon Home Secretary Matthews stated that the resignation of Sir Charles Warren, as Chief of the Metropolitan Police, was solely due to his refusal to submit to the rule which forbids officials to publicly criticize the Government's services. TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER. The Parnell Commission. NEW EVIDENCE TAKEN. LONDON, Nov. 13. At the meeting of the Parnell Commission to-day, presiding Justice Hannen intimated that the court's decision in the matter of the disclosure of documents was that all documents which the Times possessed, including even those which the Times' solicitor thought spurious, should be disclosed to assist in the search for the truth. Sir Charles Russell, counsel for the Parnellites, stated that he had received several threatening letters. Justice Hannen remarked that he also, and probably others engaged in the case, had received similar letters. The intimidation of witnesses, he said, was so certain that precautions must be taken not to allow the premature disclosure of their names. The taking of evidence relating to outrages was then proceeded with. James Mann, one of the witnesses called, declared himself both a Fenian and a member of the National League. He said he had taken part in several outrages and had gone on moonlight expeditions. He knew no moonlighter who was not a member of the League. Peter Flaherty, a farmer of Galway, testified that he was a moonlighter and was not ashamed to acknowledge it. He was perfectly ready to act with the moonlighters again. Edward Flannahan said he had been in America since 1879 and had been present at numerous League meetings at Pittsburg and New York, at which Stephen G. Meany presided. He said Meany collected funds for the purpose of buying firearms for use in Ireland.
