

Islanders Score 5-4 Win Over Halifax

Robert Gets Four Points As Islanders Come From Behind In Third Period

HALIFAX, (CP)—Charlottetown Islanders, sparked by a new player, dumped league-leading Halifax Atlantics 5-4 in a Maritime Major Hockey League game here Tuesday.

Claude Robert, a Montreal native who came to Charlottetown from the Pacific Coast Professional League, supplied the third-period spark that netted Islanders four goals and the victory.

He scored two goals and assisted on two others. Peanuts McLaughlin scored the winner with a slap shot from just inside the blue line at 16:7 of the period. Elwood Ritchie scored in the second and Orin Carver in the third for the other Islander goals.

Halifax scorers were Ross Watson, Pete Wywrot, Bill Ford and Muckle Hollett.

About 1,900 fans, one of the season's smaller crowds, saw Atlantics chalk up a 2-0 lead in the first period and add another in the second to lead 3-1.

Then in the third Robert, who had been only mediocre earlier in the game, started clicking with Paul Sandon. He assisted as Carver scored at 7:58, scored himself at 8:10 and again at 11:08.

Then, with Halifax a man short, he and Sandon assisted as McLaughlin shot the winning goal.

Glac Bay Miners In 5-3 Win Over Sydney

GLACE BAY, N. S. (CP)—Two unanswered goals in the second period gave Glac Bay Miners the lead they needed to win 5-3 over Sydney Millionaires in a Maritime Major Hockey League contest here Tuesday.

It was 2-2 at the end of the first period and each team had one goal in the third. The game was late starting because the Sydney bus broke down.

Ray Lacroix scored two for Millionaires and Roger Guay shot the others. For Miners, Bobby Brown shot two and Hughie Campbell, Johnny Lumley and Neil Amadio had singles.

Sydney drew first blood when Lacroix scored his first goal at 2:56 of the first period. Then Campbell knotted the count and Amadio made it 2-1 for Miners at 12:50. Guay equalized at 19:20 to make it a 2-2 deadlock at the whistle.

Brown scored twice in the second as Millionaires were held scoreless. Lacroix scored again at 1:35 of the third but Sydney failed to get the equalizer. Lumley's 8:35 goal gave the Glac Bay squad a two-goal bulge.

TORONTO, (CP)—Frank Selke Tuesday declined comment on the refusal of the Ontario Hockey Association to transfer players from the junior Kitchener Greenshirts to teams in the Quebec Amateur Hockey Association.

"I could say a lot of things but I'm not going to," said the National Hockey League club manager.

Canadiens bought the Kitchener team more than a week ago and assigned nine of its members to the Quebec Junior League and one to St. Catharines in the Ontario Hockey Association.

Brian Lewis Signs With Brooklyn Dodgers; To Play With Oklahoma Next Year

Brian Lewis, 20 year old centerfielder from Charlottetown made baseball history yesterday when he signed a Brooklyn Dodgers contract and became the first Island born athlete to join a Major League Baseball organization.

The fleet-footed fly chaser will be assigned to the Shawnee Hawks of the Sooner State League in Oklahoma. He will report direct to Shawnee next spring.

"I believe in my own heart that I can make the grade in the Brooklyn chain," stated the brilliant young ball player yesterday afternoon shortly after he had signed the contract. "I will be out there trying all the time and will practise from dawn to dark."

Lewis, who is a born outfielder can also play the infield, as he demonstrated here during the past few seasons when he filled in at second base and short stop for sick or injured team-mates.

He has been playing ball for nearly a decade and first attracted the attention of Brooklyn scout Bill O'Connor three years ago. Since then he has come along rapidly and blossomed into a big league prospect last summer with Maritime Central Airways.

He sparked M. C. A. to the Island Intermediate Baseball championship with a lustrous 532 batting average during the play-offs. He also played with the Curran and Briggs Juniors against the Lewisville Cubs in the N.B.P.E.I. Junior playdowns and came up with a sensational performance.

Bill O'Connor knew he had a big league prospect in the person of Lewis in the summer. He told Charlie Stevens of the Glasgow News that Lewis was Big League material and apparently Brian proved himself with his play-off performances.

At any rate Johnny Carroll, the Duke University graduate who has coached Curran and Briggs, told O'Connor that Lewis was ready for the jump to pro ball. Several weeks later the Brooklyn offer arrived in Charlottetown.

Young Lewis did not know that he was being scouted by the Dodgers although he was told that O'Connor had his eye on Bourgeois and McClennaghan of Lewisville. Bourgeois also got a Brooklyn contract and will report to Shawnee with Lewis.

He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Lewis, Bayfield Street. Following his signature of the contract yesterday he expressed gratitude to his parents for the encouragement they had given him to play ball.

"Most parents would complain if their kids wanted to play ball all the time. But mine just encouraged me to go ahead and did everything they could to help me," he stated.

Brian also had great words of praise for Ev MacNeill, his coach in junior ball. "Ev is the best coach I ever saw in baseball. He knows what should be done and he keeps making you do the right thing. If it weren't for him I would have quit long ago."

"He's a great man to go to if you have any problems, continued the young player. I don't know why they import baseball coaches when there's such a good man as Ev around." It was through the results of MacNeill's coaching that Lewis was grateful to Maritime Central Airways for the chance they gave him last summer to play baseball and also work at the same time. With M. C. A. he was able to practise every day.

Brian came home from Trenton to sign the contract. He will return to Trenton today or tomorrow to play hockey with the Scotians in the A. P. O. League.

He is playing on a line with Frank Dorrington and going well. The Dodgers have allowed him to complete this season's hockey but will restrict his hockey activities in full if he advances along the Dodger chain.

Washington-Boston In Major Player Trade

(By Jack Hand) NEW YORK, (AP)—Washington traded Jackie Jensen to Boston in a major three-man deal Tuesday. Commissioner Ford Frick awarded 18-year-old Ralph Terry to New York Yankees and the major leaguer clammed up on the pension plan hassle.

Jensen, a fleet, strong-armed outfielder with good power who hit 10 homers and drove in 84 runs for Washington despite a disappointing .266 average, went to the Red Sox for left-handed pitcher Maury McDermott 18-10 and outfielder Tom Umphlett, Umphlett surprised with a .283 rookie season.

The Washington-Boston swap was expected to break the log jam that has blocked trades during the winter baseball meetings.

Philadelphia Athletics sold second-baseman Cass Michaels to Chicago White Sox.

Commissioner Frick decided Terry, the youngster from Chelsea, Okla., who was reported to have agreed to terms with both the Yanks and St. Louis Cards on the same day, belonged to the Yankees.

Elect Officials Of North River Rink Club

Bruce MacKinley was re-elected president of the North River Rink Community Club yesterday afternoon at the annual meeting of the directors.

Other officers re-elected were Fulton Warren, vice-president; Mrs. Bruce MacKinley, treasurer; and A. C. MacEachern, secretary.

The directors decided that the gate percentage to junior and senior teams would be the same as that of last year. They also deep up a hockey program for the season.

According to this program school kids will play hockey from seven to eight Friday night and will skate from eight to ten. There will be skating for the kids on Saturday morning provided that the ice is fit. Saturday afternoon there will be skating for one hour with the time to be announced.

On senior hockey nights the doors will open and the sale of tickets commence at 7:30. In the event of a double-header the doors will be opened at seven o'clock.

The Hockey League will be conducted under the chairmanship of Fulton Warren. He will select a committee to assist him.

Goalie Marcotte May Fight CAHA Ruling In Court

QUEBEC, (CP)—Goalie Jacques Marcotte may fight in court an order from the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association to report to Quebec Citadelles, it was reported Tuesday night.

The CAHA Monday ruled that the 18-year-old goalie, now playing with Quebec Frontenacs of the Quebec Junior Hockey League, is the property of Citadelles of the Junior "A" Ontario Hockey Association.

Paul Dumont, Frontenac's manager, said the club will submit to the CAHA ruling. However, he said the club supports Marcotte in his decision "to fight for his right to play where he wants."

Marcotte was quoted as saying in Montreal Monday night he will take the means necessary to protect his rights.

A Frontenac official said this is believed to mean Marcotte may ask Quebec Superior Court for an injunction to prevent application of the CAHA ruling. He may also petition the court to annul Citadelles claims on him from last year's contract.

The CAHA ruling reversed a previous decision by the CAHA granting Marcotte's request for release from Citadelles for whom he played last year. Marcotte later signed with Frontenac and has been playing regularly for them this season.

Turpin To Appear Before Board Today

LONDON, (AP)—Randy Turpin goes before the British Boxing Board of Control Wednesday to tell why he cut such strange capers before his world title fight with Bobo Olson.

Many London fighter writers and followers expect the former world middleweight champion to get only a light wrist slapping from BBBC stewards.

Turpin lost to Olson in a 15-round bout to fill the vacant middleweight throne in New York in October.

Turpin's ability to finish against Olson however, was attributed more to Olson's lack of knockout power than to Turpin's good health—he was three pounds inside the 160 pound limit—and tough chin. But before the fight Turpin spent nearly a month at this Catskill camp in a sulking mood and he did very little boxing.
