

Commons Okays Committee To Probe Consumer Credit

OTTAWA (CP)—Moving with unusual speed, the Commons has approved a government report establishing a joint parliamentary committee to study the laws controlling consumer credit in Canada.

Opposition speakers said the main reason for the move is to probe legislation to outlaw harsh interest charges and unscrupulous money-lenders.

By prior arrangement, only four speakers rose to place all their remarks on the record before the proposal. The debate first since the resolution was passed in the Commons over consumer credit law, took less than 10 minutes.

Solicitor-General J. Watson MacNaught said there has been growing public concern about the unethical credit practices reported in the press regarding consumer credit.

David Orlikow (NDP—Winnipeg North) and Gilles Grogan (Credit—Lapointe) cited two examples.

Somalia To Use Red Arms; Rejects Offer From West

WASHINGTON (AP)—Somalia has rejected a \$20 million offer from the United States it will accept a Soviet arms offer and has no use for military hardware from the West.

U.S. administration officials said this decision makes Somalia the first of the Soviet-leaning countries in Africa.

The officials said they were less disturbed by the Russian weapons that will reach Somalia than by the fact that Mogadishu, the country's capital, is becoming a Communist "hot advisers."

The Somalia disclosure came after the United States of talks between Horace G. Torbert, Jr., U.S. envoy, and the Somali government. Torbert tried to convince the Somalis that a non-aligned status is more attractive than the Soviet proposal.

The United States, Italy and West Germany proposed a package of military assistance worth of \$18,000,000, consisting mainly of small arms. Moscow has offered \$20 million in arms.

The Somalis are understood to have asked for more than the Soviet offer and questioned the feasibility of arms coming from three countries.

Start Is Made At Unloading Older Butter

OTTAWA (CP)—A start has been made on unloading Canada's surplus of older butter, stored in a warehouse in western Canada, an agriculture department official said here.
