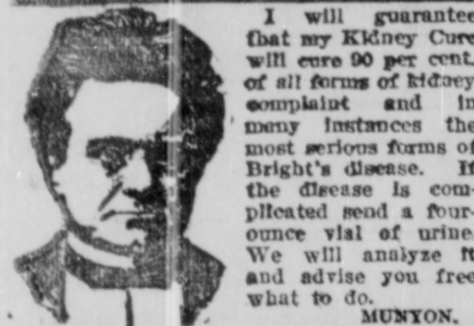

**THE PROVISION MARKET.**

Chicago Strong—Liverpool Steady—  
Montreal Trade Quiet.

The provision market in Montreal is quiet and without any new feature of note, prices being about steady all round. We quote:—Canadian pork, in barrels, \$15.50 to 16; pure Canadian lard, in pails, 7 1/2 to 7 3/4 per pound, and compound refined, at 5c to 5 1/2c per pound. Hams, 10c to 12c, and bacon, 10c to 12c per pound.

Receipts of dressed hogs in Montreal continue light, and demand is not heavy, owing to the mild weather. Prices paid (Nov. 21) were 5.25 per hundred pounds; \$5.60 could be obtained for small hogs.

The Chicago provision market was stronger and prices for pork advanced 7 1/2c, closing \$7.90 November; \$7.90 December; \$9.02 1/2 January; \$9.20 May. Lard, closed 2 1/2c to 5c higher, at \$4.90 November; \$4.90 December; \$4.97 1/2 January; \$5.12 1/2 May. Short ribs closed \$4.50 December; \$4.57 1/2 January; \$4.70 May.

There was no change in the Liverpool provision market. Pork, 50s; lard 27; boneless long cut heavy bacon, 28; long cut light, 27; short cut light, 29; and tallow, 19s 6d.

In Halifax, P. E. I. land mess pork is quoted at \$14 per bbl, and in St. John \$15 to \$15.50—prime mess \$11 to 12.

**DAIRY PRODUCE.**

Cheese and Butter Remain the Same.

The Montreal Gazette reports cheese quiet and unchanged, with no business of importance on spot. In the country trading was done on a steady basis.

**CHARLOTTETOWN MARKETS.**

Advance in Oats and Eggs—Other Prices Unchanged.

There is a fair movement of oats and potatoes, and several schooners are being loaded at this port. For oats the buyers are paying from 31 to 35c, and potatoes change hands at 25c.

For pork by the carcass from 4 1/2 to 4 3/4 is paid. There is no change in the price of live hogs.

The egg receipts are becoming smaller as the season advances. The buyers are paying 13 1/2c for fresh stock. The shipments during the week have been mostly to the provincial markets.

**GRAIN MARKET.**

Quiet and Easy in Montreal—Butter Prices in St. John and Halifax.

In Montreal, oats are quoted at 31 to 31 1/2c in store.

In St. John, the quotation for Ontario oats 36 1/2 to 37 1/2c. P. E. Island oats are not quoted.

In Halifax, P. E. I. Island oats are selling at 40c ex store.

**LIVE HOGS**

The Montreal Star, of the 21st Nov. reports. The market is slightly firmer, and \$4.40 per hundred pounds was paid this morning.

**A California Mystery.**

OAKLAND, Calif., November 22.—The supposed suicide of Lillian Brandes, a pretty 15-year-old girl, in Berkeley on Saturday, is likely to prove a case of murder. The autopsy shows that the girl had been beaten on the head until her scalp was laid open, and her skull dented. She had subsequently been tied to a bed post. Her body was covered with bruises. The girl's father, W. A. Brandes, has been arrested on suspicion of having committed the horrible crime. The step-mother has become hysterical and refuses to talk about the tragedy, which was first reported to the police by the accused man. The neighbors tell many stories of how the girl was cruelly treated and the community is greatly excited over the startling developments.

**The Bonapartes Again!**

LONDON, November 22.—A despatch from Paris to the Central News says that Prince Louis Napoleon Bonaparte left Paris for Brussels on Saturday to join his brother Napoleon Victor, the head of the Bonaparte house who is to preside within this week over an important Bonapartist conference. Prince Louis has been for some time in constant close relations with men who would hail with delight a coup d'etat resulting in the establishment of an imperialist regime. The recent presence of Prince Louis in Paris has caused the Government authorities considerable uneasiness.

CHILD BURNED.—The infant daughter of Mr Newton Pagsley, Parrsboro, N. S., was badly burned last Monday. Her little brother accidentally dropped a piece of lighted paper upon her, setting her clothes on fire. Her face and hands were severely scorched, but no serious permanent results are feared.

—The Soleil of Quebec complains that it has been boycotted by the Dominion Government. Out of a quarter of a million dollars paid to Liberal newspapers this year, it has only received \$31.50, on which it made a profit of \$9. The Soleil has not even, it appears, been paid \$1,000 it spent during the Bonaventure and Champlain by-elections; and yet, it says with truth, nobody has defamed the Government with more zeal.

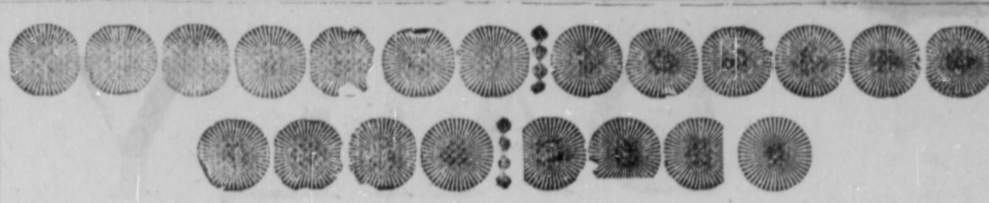

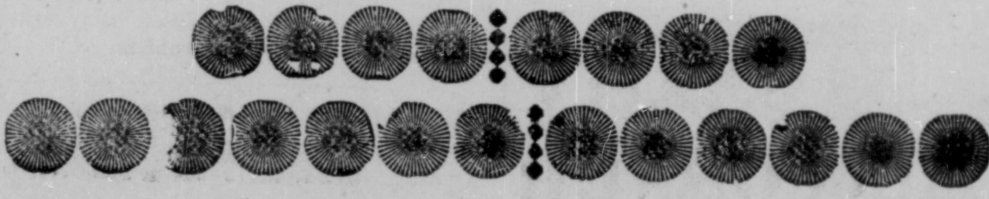
