Boston Markets.
Boston, June 29.
Eggs.—Strictly fresh Eastern are in demand at 16c, but other grades are slow and range from 14 1/2 to 15 1/2c. We quote P. E. Island 15 to 15 1/2.
POTATOES.—Old potatoes are irregular and nominal. Sales of good stock at 40 to 60c per bushel, but some will not command over 25c. New Southern rule at \$2 to \$2.50 per brl. We quote P. E. Island mixed lot, 40 to 50; Chenangoes, 40 to 50.
Fish—Mackerel continues in light receipt and prices are firmer, particularly on medium 3s, which are in good demand. Sales in fare lots have been made in at \$8 and \$8.52 per brl, sea packed. Large 3s are rather slow and \$8.75 and \$9 is a full quotation. Receipts of mackerel for the week foot up 1,927 brls of which 1,540 brls were from domestic and 387 brls was from Provincial ports. Codfish continue rather scarce and prices are well maintained. Pickle cured Bank rule at \$3.50 to \$3.75, and Dry Bank at \$4 to \$6.25 per qtl. Georges and Shore rule at 3.75 to \$4.25. Very little doing in hake, haddock or pollock. Pickled herring continue dull and prices are nominal.
