

Local and Other Items.

ABOLITION.—In the Nova Scotia House of Assembly, a few nights ago, Premier Fielding intimated that it was the intention of the Government to introduce a bill providing for the abolition of the Legislative Council.

ANOTHER BIG SCOOP.—The St. John Sun says it has learned on good authority that the Whitney coal syndicate have secured an option on the New Glasgow steel works and blast furnaces, and it is said they have deposited \$10,000 as a forfeit if they decide not to accept.

ST JOHN.—Orders have been wired to P. E. Island for shipments of oats to this market as soon as the steamers get on the route. There are enquiries for them for seed purposes. P. E. Island firms have had representatives in this market in the last day or two offering park. They offer to meet American prices for pork laid down here.—Sun.

FEELS BETTER NOW.—A lad named Willie Taylor, living at St. John, swallowed a toy whistle about a year ago, and since that time the obstruction has caused the little fellow a great deal of trouble. He went twice to the hospital and was once operated on, but without success. On Saturday last while the little fellow was playing ball near his home he was suddenly seized with a fit of coughing and up came the whistle.

THE TURF.—At a special meeting of the New England Trotting Horse Breeders' Association held a few days ago, the question of extending the territory within its jurisdiction, it was unanimously agreed to admit members from six northern counties in New York state and from the provinces of New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, Quebec and Prince Edward Island. Such members are eligible to the stakes closing May 1, 1891.

TEMPERANCE MEETING.—A public temperance meeting under the auspices of the W. C. T. U., was held last evening in the Second Methodist Church. Rev. Mr. Palmer presided, and there was a good attendance. Earnest and practical addresses were made by Rev. Mr. Hamlyn and Mr. J. D. Seaman. Miss Mitchell gave a reading, and the Loyal Legion and the choir furnished music appropriate to the occasion.

STEAMERS' MOVEMENTS.—The Steam Navigation Company's steamers are now running regularly between Charlottetown and Pictou, and Summerside and Point du Chene. On Monday the mail special connecting with the steamer at Summerside will be put on, leaving Charlottetown at seven o'clock a. m. (local).

THE MARKET.—To-day the market was fairly well attended, and prices were pretty much the same as on last market day. Butter (fresh) sold for from 20 to 22 cents per lb., and butter (tub) for from 17 to 19 cents per lb. Eggs were in good supply and brought from 11 to 12 cents per doz. Wild geese were plentiful and sold for from 70 to 75 cents each. Grant were also on sale, selling for from 70 to 75 cents per pair. Ducks, in moderate supply, sold for from 30 to 35 cents per pair. Outside—Hay was very scarce, what was on sale bringing from 65 to 75 cents per cwt. Oats, also scarce, sold for from 34 to 35 cents per bushel.

TARIFF READJUSTMENT.

Ministerial Movements.

OTTAWA, April 21. Hon. Mr. Foster speaking with regard to the programme which Hon. Mr. Bowell and he will follow in consulting manufacturers on tariff matters said that the secretary of the Montreal Board of Trade was written to for co-operation by arranging for representatives of every important industry in the city to appear before the ministers next week, and also ask the Board to place rooms in its building at the disposal of members of the Government in which to receive deputations. Conferences are to be entirely informal, and representatives of the newspapers will be allowed to be present. The Toronto Board of Trade is being asked to make a similar arrangement. After the conferences at Toronto are concluded, Hon. Messrs. Bowell and Foster will visit other large cities in Ontario and Quebec, and Mr. Foster proceeds to the Maritime Provinces about the middle of June.

Tragedy in New York.

Sad Suicide of a Halifax Druggist.

HALIFAX, April 21. Mrs. James Shannon, New York, who lets out furnished rooms, while cleaning up house yesterday morning, saw a light burning in the basement room, which she rented to a young man who refused to give his name. She knocked at the door, but getting no answer, forced her way in and found the man lying on the floor. She went up to him, and touching his forehead he was dead. A bullet hole was in his head back of the right ear. The woman ran out and called a policeman. A .38 calibre revolver was lying by the dead man's side. One chamber was discharged. A letter dated "Halifax" was found on him. The suicide is Joseph Archibald, a young druggist of this city who conducted a business at the north end. He went to the States on visit about three weeks ago. The cause of the suicide is supposed to be despondency on account of illness.

Schooner Missing.

DIGBY, April 21. The schooner Mabel, Captain Dakin, sailed from Centreville, Digby, early on Tuesday morning, bound for St. John, and must have encountered Tuesday's gale. She has not since been heard from, and it is supposed that she foundered.

Another Australian Failure.

LONDON, April 21. The failure is announced of the Australian Joint Stock Bank, with liabilities amounting to £13,000,000.

OTTAWA, April 19.—The demand for samples of seed wheat received at the Experimental Farm is unprecedented this spring. The supply is now exhausted. Director Saunders is obliged reluctantly to decline to fill further applications. Over 13,000 samples have been sent out to date. 3,709 applications were received at the Farm during the present month.

A Fatal Charivari.

A NEWLY WEDDED FARMER KILLS TWO OF HIS ANNOYERS.

According to a despatch from Topeka, the frontier idea of celebrating a wedding by the beating of tin pans and firing of guns was responsible for three deaths one night last week at a charivari near Ness City, Kan. A young farmer by the name of Anderson was married, and brought his bride to the little cottage he had provided for her. A number of hoodlums in the community thought it would be proper to give them a reception.

About fifty gathered around the place at midnight and commenced making deafening noises. One cowboy had borrowed a double barreled shotgun which was loaded with buckshot. He was drunk, and instead of shooting in the air, fired both loads at the frame cottage. Anderson and his wife narrowly escaped being killed.

Anderson grabbed his shotgun, opened the door and fired both barrels into the crowd, killing two of his neighbors and seriously wounding a third. The dead men were taken to their homes, and the third, who will die, is being cared for by Anderson.

The twin mill of Benjamin Moran at Washington Village, sixteen miles from Providence, R. I., was demolished by a boiler explosion on the 18th. Emory Clarke, 45, and Samuel Perry, 40, were killed outright. Two others were badly injured. Loss \$20,000.

Hyacinthe Lanthier, one of the very few survivors of the Canadian rebellion of 1837, died recently at Smith's Falls, Ontario. Lanthier was at the battle of St. Eustache, and was present near the church where the famous Dr. Chenier fell, after which he escaped across the line.

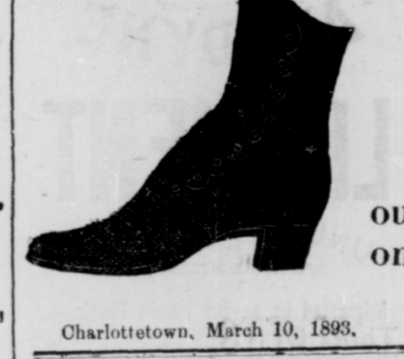
