## Millionaires Romp To Easy Win Over Miners For Fourth League Title

SYDNEY, N.S., March 26 (CP)—Sydney Millionaires tonight romped to their fourth straight Cape Breton senior hockey championship by piling up a 12-3 win over Glace Bay Miners in the fifth game of their best-of-seven series.

Although Miners took an early 2-0 lead over the schedule winners, there was little doubt of the outcome from the first period.

Once Millionaires tied it up it was a goal-scoring frolic. It was also the first time this season that a Cape Breton team scored 12 goals in one game.

The triumph sent coach Bill Dinning's team into the Maritime finals for the fourth straight year. Millionaires won it all in the last three outings.

Miners who lost Skippy Frezell and Paul Korneck through injuries at home Saturday night, were dispirited in the closing stages, but old pros like Gordie Bruce, Stan Robertson and Paul Mundrick kept them in the fight, along with winger Connie Bonhomme and Bob Leger.

Shots on goal were Sydney 53, Glace Bay 27, but the margin of play was bigger, although Sydney's Nick Pidsodny had his busy moments in the first half of the rout.

## Down St. Mary's 7-1 At Forum To Capture Best Of Seven Series 4-1

The Leo Lamoureux-coached P. E. Islanders copped off the Maritime Major Hockey League championship in glowing style here last night when they blasted Halifax Saint Mary's down to a 7-1 defeat in the fifth game of their best-of-seven series, played before a capacity crowd at the Charlottetown Forum.

The victory gave the Islanders the title over last year's champions by a four to one game margin. They will now meet Sydney Millionaires for the All-Maritime crown in a series which begins at Sydney on Friday.

Led by a brilliant night's performance on the part of defenceman Frank Bathgate who belted home four goals, the Islanders caught fire with a terrific third-period performance to skate Halifax right into the ice for five goals without a reply after holding the edge on the play by a 2-1 advantage in the first two periods that produced a style of rip roaring hockey that eclipsed anything seen over Forum ice this season.

Walter Pawlyshyn picked up Islanders lone marker on a clever attack in the first period, played by Wes Trainer and Johnny Dutchak. Frank Bathgate chalked up the second in the middle session with Mac Beaton and Clements with Bob Digger being the trigger man in the same frame for Saints only tally of the game on a play with Don McLaughlin and Bill Ford. Sending the Islanders away on a sustained barrage in the final session, Bathgate fired home three markers in a row on picture plays, two of them coming within 37 seconds of one another and the other less than eight minutes later. Marcel Clements and Beaton were in on the second one. Beaton and McLagan on the third with Bathgate getting the early one all alone.

Following up quickly on Bathgate's powerful performance, Trainer belted home Islanders sixth tally on a beautiful effort started by Walter Pawlyshyn at 13:53, while Johnny Horeck added the final marker at 16:09 on a roaring attack around the net with Hub Beaudry and Danny Horeck.

Only Five Penalties

It was one of the cleanest games to be witnessed here this year, with Leo Murray, the Halifax Charles Deziel holding a tight grip on the game at all times to necessitate only five minor penalties being awarded.

Both goalies, Hal Gordon and Eddie D'Aoust reached peaks of greatness in the way of goaltending during the game to come up with some scintillating saves at times. D'Aoust being the most overworked of the two in handling a total of 49 shots, against 24 on Gordon. D'Aoust had to be sensational at times to withstand the barrage of rubber set up by the Islanders to keep the scoring as low as it was.

Going all-out in an aggressive display of hockey right from the opening whistle, Islanders thrice Halifax right on the defensive to hammer away at the Halifax cage that never let up until it netted them their first goal at 2:14 of the frame. Turning in a miraculous performance, D'Aoust blocked shot after shot until Pawlyshyn finally got to him on a hammering attack around the net with Trainer and Dutchak. Continuing to apply the pressure, Halifax were making most of their scoring attempts on break-away plays, but Hal Gordon held firm on some really close-in attacks. Halifax showed to better advantage in the closing half of the frame and gave Islanders plenty of close calls, that turned the period into the fastest and most crowd-pleasing single period of hockey to be witnessed here this season. Both teams exchanged rush for rush that was almost too hard to follow at times.

Once again the Islanders forced the attack in the early stages of the second frame that produced the second marker of the night and Frank Bathgate's first of four. It was a tough tally on D'Aoust that went in off his skate from behind at the 6:33 mark on Bathgate's sliding shot during a rousing battle around the net with Beaton and Clements, the former centering it out to Bathgate from behind the net after Clements had worked the puck in there on the play.

But as in the opening canto, Halifax rallied back strongly as the period progressed with Digger coming up with the tally that left Islanders holding only a slim one-goal advantage. Digger binged in his own rebound off Hal Gordon during a close-in attack with McLaughlin and Ford at the 12:59 mark that ended the scoring for the frame. Holding their biggest margin of the game, it was the last half of the frame, Halifax ripped through on a number of smart-passing attacks that near pipped off in goals except for some smart defensive work and goaltending by Hal Gordon.

"We were very much impressed with the calibre of hockey played in the final series between Islanders and Halifax," were the words used by Messrs. Charles Deziel and Leo Murray, the two referees from Quebec who made such a splendid job of handling the whistles during that series.

The two referees dropped into the sports department of this paper following last night's game to express their pleasure and thanks of the fine treatment they received both here and at Halifax during their refereeing duties in the Maritime.

Both expressed their regret that business obligations did not permit them to remain for the Maritime playoffs between Islanders and Sydney Millionaires.

The refereeing duties of Deziel and Murray was one of the highlight features of the series from the viewpoint of players and fans alike. They were strict, but fair and impartial with their decisions and that added much to the interest and pleasure of the series. It is with regret that they must leave today on return to their homes in Quebec, but at the same time they will be taking with them the well-wishes and thanks of the sporting public of the Maritimes for a job well done.
