# The Transvaal War

## GENERAL FRENCH.

Julian Ralph says that though General Kitchener is not second to Lord Roberts in success in this war, there is a general who must soon receive at home the credit and the plaudits which he has gained from the army. His name is French—Major General J. D. P. French.

As to his personality, the phrase "the square little general" would serve to describe him in any army circles without a mention of his name. He has the shape of a brick as well as the best characteristics of one. He is a short, thick junk of a man, who always stands with his feet and legs well apart, and sits up on his saddle like a Red Indian squaw. A view of his back suggests the thick-set, neckless shape of General Grant, and I suspect there is a great deal of Grant's doggedness in him. Like Grant, too, he shows no concern for externals.

He is quiet, undemonstrative, easy and gentle. When you are with his command you don't notice him, you don't think of him—unless you are a soldier, and then you are glad you are there. He is perfectly accessible to any one, but speaks very little when addressed. He must be a fine judge of men, for he has a splendid staff around him—splendid in the sense that they are soldierly like himself and all active and useful. Judging from the way his men live in the country when they are swarming over it, he must be easy, as true soldiers are in those situations, though the discipline of the rank and file is excellent. You do not notice his dress, but if you should it would be seen to be more serviceable than smart.

When we went over to Thaba N'Chu from Bloemfontein on a bill-sticking expedition (as the distribution of Lord Roberts' proclamation was called) he showed by his treatment of the Boers that he had a very kindly nature. He stopped at night in the Boer houses, and got on very well with the families, with all of whose members he shook hands, while saying pleasant things to them.

That Britain's patricians are of the right stock is shown by the fact that 36 members of the House of Lords are with the troops in South Africa. Besides these 36, there are hundreds of the brothers and younger sons of peers serving with their regiments.

## THE HORSE IN BATTLE.

When it comes to a battle a horse shows no fear of death, no sign of being overcome by panic in all the wild tumult of the battle's roar. A horse in one of our batteries in the Murrumbidgee fight was hit by a piece of shell, which split his skull so that one side was loosened. The driver turned him loose, but when he saw the team he had worked with being driven back for ammunition he ran to his old place and galloped back with the rest. When an officer pushed him aside to have another horse put in he gazed at the new one with a most sorrowful expression in his eyes. Then he seemed to realize that the battle was no more for him, and he walked away and lay down and died. The officer declared that it was a broken heart that killed him.

Kind words, a gentle voice and a little petting will accomplish vastly more in the management of horses than any amount of yelling.

"Hamlet" Produced by the Lyceum Company.

"Hamlet" was seen at the Academy of Music last evening for the first time in seven years. A good sized audience was present and enjoyed the performance, which throughout was meritorious. The company is not a large one, but some of the members are talented and give intelligent readings of the leading characters in Shakespeare's immortal tragedy.

Mr. D'Oize had the initial role and was latter perfect. His impersonation was in many respects worthy of the highest commendation. He did not overact, and his reading of some of the long speeches was most enjoyable. He has a musical voice and good appearance.

Miss Effie Hext, in the character of Ophelia, made a pleasant impression. She is an attractive lady, and will undoubtedly appear to advantage tonight when she assumes the part of Desdemona.

Other members of the company gave excellent support.

"The Merchant of Venice" will be produced this evening and "Othello" tomorrow evening.

The Rev. Dr. D. J. Stafford lectured about Hamlet at the National theatre, Washington, recently, before a large audience that included many distinguished persons.

Of the ghost scene Dr. Stafford said "Hamlet knew, from the fact that the ghost of his father had drawn him into seclusion to impart his dread tale, that the communication was not to be divulged. So when Horatio rushed up to him after the departure of the ghost he grasps without premeditation at the idea of feigning insanity as affording an easy method of evading the questioning of his friend. The success of his plan induced him to continue to act the part as affording a facile means to provide him with opportunity, without fear of interruption, to consider the course he must pursue in avenging the death of his father."

Concerning the soliloquy of Hamlet, the lecturer observed: "It is a complete philosophy that Shakespeare has presented to us—his own consideration of future life. He has given to us a solution of the great mystery."—Halifax Herald
