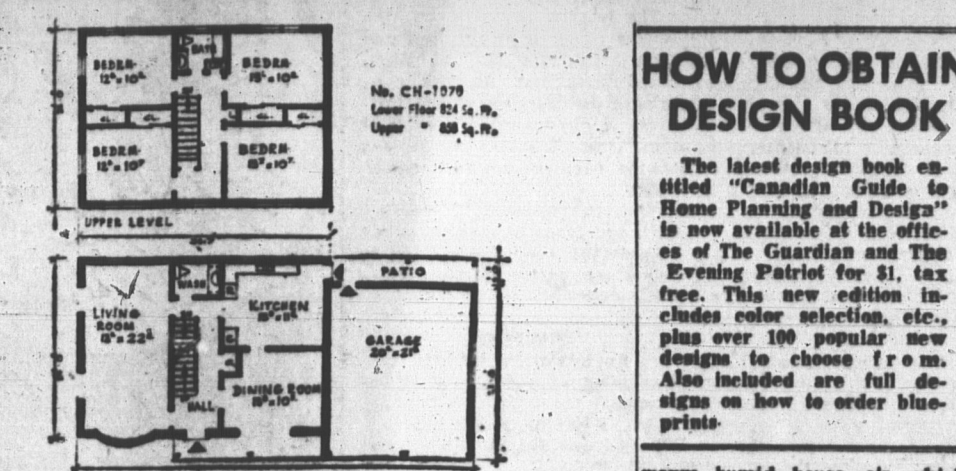
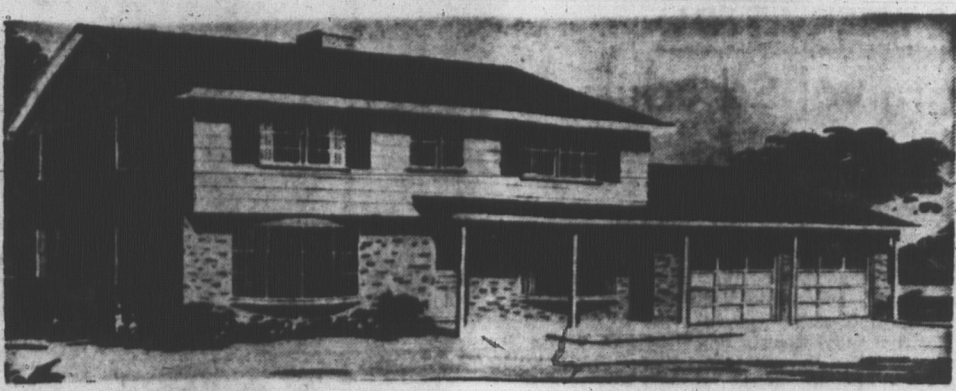

First Aid For Ailing Houses

By ROGER C. WHITMAN. QUESTION: What causes low water pressure in the upstairs bathroom. It is all right in the rest of the house. ANSWER: If all faucets in the bathroom have low pressure this is probably due to clogged supply lines to these outlets; pipes probably require replacement. I suggest having a reputable plumber inspect and make necessary repairs. STAINED FLOORS. QUESTION: My kitchen floor has spots where home permanent were given and where oven cleaner has been dropped. Can you help? I also have a problem with the bathroom floor. The area in front of the sink is yellowed from what I believe, tennis shoes and rubber soles. Is there anything to remove this? ANSWER: Not knowing the composition of either the floor or the stain, it is almost impossible to make any suggestions. In general, one of the all-purpose household cleaners and fine steel wool will remove any floor stains and discolorations. IRON IN WELL WATER. QUESTION: We use well water at our vacation home. The water contains a lot of iron, so much that yellow spots develop on laundry. How can this discoloration be prevented? ANSWER: Plumbers and the plumbing supply dealers have a variety of iron removal units. An inexpensive type, only a few inches long and containing a chemical that is tasteless and harmless, is installed in the main supply pipe leading from the well to the various fixtures in the house. Or the yellow laundry spots can be prevented by adding a water conditioner, widely available at supermarkets, to the laundry water, following label directions carefully. SURFACING DRIVEWAY. QUESTION: The house we recently purchased has a gravel driveway. We don't like this as it also serves as the walk to our kitchen door. Is there any kind of binding or surfacing we could put over this for a firmer top? ANSWER: Various makes of asphalt emulsions are available for the purpose and are available. Your local street and road commission could furnish you with names of firms handling such materials; or consult the classified telephone directory under "Paving Contractors" or "Paving Materials". CHURCH FURNISHINGS. QUESTION: I want to get a catalog for religious items for church furnishings. Where can I send for one? ANSWER: Consult your classified telephone directory under "Religious Goods", "Church Supplies" and "Church Furnishings"; many firms have mail order departments and catalogs. QUESTION: From time to time you mentioned the use of dry ice for the removal of old floor tile. Would this application work on nine by nine inch linoleum tile laid over felt with linoleum paste? ANSWER: No reason this technique won't work just as well for removing various types of tile (not ceramic, however). Only probably difficulty could be if you were trying to remove an entire large sheet of linoleum. This could become very cumbersome, unless you have some willing helpers. VINEGAR REMOVED FINISH. QUESTION: Vinegar or some strong liquid was inadvertently dropped in my kitchen linoleum floor. The finish must have been taken off, as wax will not cover the spots. Is there anything that will? ANSWER: Probably the linoleum has deteriorated in these areas, because the vinegar attacked the gums and oil in the linoleum. The only suggestion short of replacement which I can offer is to patiently apply thin successive coats of wax to the spots, hoping to build up these areas. LOOSENED LINOLEUM SEAM. QUESTION: In a rented house I have linoleum in the kitchen, with a seam down the middle, which became loose and was kicked around until there is an opening one to three inches wide. Is there anything I can get to fill in here that will fill this gap and last a while. ANSWER: If you mean that the linoleum has been torn off, the only solution is to insert a strip of closely matching linoleum. If you mean that the sides of the seam have been loosened from the floor underneath, try the following method of refastening: Work linoleum cement into the seam by lifting the loosened linoleum and pushing the paste underneath with a flat, thin screwdriver or spatula. After spreading the adhesive, press down the linoleum, place heavy weights (pails of water, large rocks, etc.), on top and allow to remain until all the cement has thoroughly hardened. Wipe off any excessive adhesive on the surface immediately with a damp cloth or sponge later removal is very difficult. "MOVED" HOME WALLS. QUESTION: We purchased a "moved" home three years ago and the walls looked newly plastered. A good quality paint was applied two years ago. Now the walls are peeling-not cracking-in a number of places in all of the rooms. Evidently fresh coat of plaster was applied directly over the old plaster. What can be done to stop the peeling from spreading? Is there anything we can apply to the walls to prevent this from happening in other areas before we repaint? ANSWER: Plaster, less than a year old, may contain lime that will attack oil in paint. To prevent this, the lime should be neutralized by brushing the plaster liberally with a solution of one pound of zinc sulphate dissolved in the gallon of water. For average-size rooms, 10 to 15 pounds is sufficient. Allow three days for drying. Probably this treatment was neglected when the paint was applied. Sorry to say but the only satisfactory solution is removal of the present paint coating and re-plastering the walls. OUTDOOR KNOTTY PINE. QUESTION: I had some knotty pine furniture, outdoor, which through neglect became too bad to refinish with varnish. I painted it with good quality paint; looked nice, but got discolored from sap dropping birch and poplar trees (at my lake cottage). Could I repaint these or wash them well and then varnish over the paint? Or could I use shellac? The furniture must be left out over the winter. ANSWER: Thoroughly clean trace of grime, soot, grease, wax, etc. Then repaint these with top-quality paint and apply two finish coats of top quality spar or marine varnish; other types of varnish won't withstand outdoor exposure. Suggest covering furniture with sheets of heavy polyethylene plastic during winter for extra protection. QUESTION: I am planning on remodeling a bathroom. Where can I get information and instructions on planning, lay-out and applying plastic wall tile? ANSWER: Large plumbing supplies houses or the dealer from whom you purchase plumbing fixtures may have this type of information available. Popular Mechanics Press (200 E. Ontario St., Chicago 11, Ill.) publishes a booklet, "How to Remodel Kitchens and Bathrooms (price 75 cents); available at many paper back, newsstands, hardware and building supplies dealers, or from the publisher. Your plastic wall tile dealer should have installation instructions available; or write to the manufacturer. MILDEW IN CLOSET. QUESTION: We have a 4' by 10' closet in one corner of the house; two outside walls. Under the house we have a two foot crawl space, with a concrete floor. Two years ago we had hot water radiant baseboard heat installed and since then we have noticed mildew only in this closet. How can we correct and prevent the mildew? ANSWER: I suspect you have a brick house and that the wall plaster in the closet was applied directly to the siding without an insulating air space between; the plaster becomes as cold as the outside siding and when the warm, humid house air which leaks into the closet comes in contact with the colder wall it condenses; mildew develops only in the presence of moisture and warmth. Installing insulating sheath of insulating board on one inch furring strips, against the two outside walls, will help prevent the development of mildew. In addition, installing an electric covered rod-shaped appliance, merely plugged into a convenient outlet, will help warm and dry the air and keep it circulating; available some large hardware dealers. WORKBENCH PLANS. QUESTION: We are planning on building a workbench along one wall of the basement, approximately 12 feet long. Are there any workbench plans available? ANSWER: Many building supplies and hardware dealers may have this type of information available some large tool manufacturers also have this kind of plan. Or send for free copy of AE-312 "Work Bench and Tool Rack," available from Masonite Corporation, 111 W. Washington St., Chicago 3, Ill. SCUM ON SHOWER TILE. QUESTION: Is there any way besides using strong acid and scrub brush, to remove the scum on shower tile? Our house is 30 years old; I have a feeling the poor tile is just tired, but it gets so dirty and most unattractive. I have tried cleanest commercial tile cleaners, to no avail. ANSWER: Remove the soap accumulation on the tile with a paste made of powdered whitening and bicarbonate (be careful of the fire hazard), rubbing it on the surface and allowing to remain for about 20 minutes, then rinsing off with warm water. When the surface is clean and absolutely dry, apply a cream, clean-up wax, made by a nationally known manufacturer and widely available in supermarkets, hardware stores following label instructions. Then continue to use the clean-up wax which leaves a protective coating on the tile surface and makes future removal of scum easier. BLISTERS IN WALLPAPER. QUESTION: What causes blisters to form in newly applied wallpaper? ANSWER: Blisters or air bubbles, sometimes are caused by working too quickly and applying the paper to the wall before the paste is properly absorbed. LIPSTICK ON MARBLE. QUESTION: Lipstick marks were scrawled over the marble walls in the entrance foyer to my building. How can these be cleaned off? ANSWER: Scrape off as much of the lipstick as possible with a dull knife blade. Then cover the marks with a mixture of powdered whitening and a non-flammable liquid spot remover, placing thin plastic over the paste to retard evaporation; leave the doors open while working with the spot remover, to insure good ventilation. When dry, brush off and repeat treatment if necessary. For stubborn discoloration, wipe the area with a solution of six ounces of oxalic acid dissolved in a quart of hot water; allow to remain for about an hour, then rinse thoroughly with clear water. ANTI-BIRD CAGE. QUESTION: We have a vacation place which we very rarely use during the winter. Is there any kind of wire or cage we could put over the chimney top to prevent birds from getting into the chimneys? ANSWER: Yes: Some manufacturers of incinerator equipment make a chimney screen intended to prevent the escape of burning embers. This screen has the appearance of a cage and projects well above the chimney to permit a good draft. ALUMINUM MARKS CLOTHES. QUESTION: My husband built a new kitchen counter, using an aluminum trim all around the edge. This trim leaves marks on clothing when one rubs against it. Is there any way to prevent this? ANSWER: Clean the metal with scratchless cleanser, wipe it with benzine, then coat with a clear lacquer. Be very careful of the fire hazard when handling both these liquids, because they are highly flammable. If the counter is ever rebuilt, use a stainless steel trim instead of the aluminum. Note: Lacquer only temporary; when it wears entire coating should be renewed. Much better to replace with edging of enameled aluminum.
