

Local and Other Items.

The Civic Elections take place to-day. The polls will be opened at 9 o'clock, a.m.

LARGE CATCH.—On Friday last Mr. Vincomb, of this City, caught one hundred and six very fine trout in Dunk River.

A LIBERAL RAILWAY KING.—Mr. W. H. Vanderbilt has made a gift of \$100,000 to the employes of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroads, in acknowledgment of their good conduct in the late exciting period.

CONFIRMATION.—His Lordship Bishop McIntyre left for the Magdalen Islands yesterday morning, where he will administer the sacrament of Confirmation to those who are prepared. He was accompanied by Father Von Bleik, who will enter upon his duties as parish priest of that place.

NEW BRUNSWICK LEGISLATURE.—The New Brunswick Legislature will meet on Tuesday, 28th inst. The session will be a special one, to last only a few days, the object being to pass certain bills that the City Council of St. John have in preparation regarding street improvements, restriction of wooden buildings, etc.

BEFORE the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court yesterday morning, the trial of the parties arrested for burglary on the store of Mr. James Byrne, was completed. The evidence produced was not sufficient to hold Goodman and McKenna for trial at the Supreme Court, and they were released on \$100 bail to appear at said Court as witnesses. There being evidence sufficient against Kelly, McCarthy and Purcell, were held for trial at the Supreme Court.

CHICAGO'S LOSSES BY THE STRIKE.—It is estimated that the loss to Chicago by its three days' experience of the Commune amounted in gold to about \$2,000,000. A considerable number of persons were killed during the reign of the rowdies, and in the movement that upset their rule. But in reference to this fact a Chicagoan journalist jauntily writes: "The loss of life is scarcely any loss; for the persons who were killed can well be spared, with one exception." From this it appears that a sense of that sacredness of human life is not deepened by contact with communistic operations.

At the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court yesterday morning John McIsaac was fined \$2 or eight days, for drunk and disorderly; paid. John Peterson, drunk and disorderly; fined \$1 or six days; paid. John McKenzie, drunk and incapable; \$2 or eight days. Queen, at the prosecution of James Byrne vs Michael Purcell, Frank McCarthy, James Kelly, Malcolm McKinnon and James Goodman, for burglary. In this case Purcell, Kelly and McCarthy were held for trial at the Supreme Court Goodman and McKinnon were held on bail to appear at the Supreme Court as witnesses in the matter.

The funeral procession of ex-Mayor Rankin took place from his late residence yesterday evening at half-past three o'clock. It was one of the largest and most respectable funeral processions we have seen in this city for a long time. Mr. Rankin having been Colonel of Militia, an old and respected Mason, and a member of the Caledonia Club, his funeral was attended by a large number of Masons of St. John, Victoria and King Solomon Lodges, the members of the Caledonia Club, two companies of Volunteers, and one company of Artillery. Galbraith's Band played the Dead March as the procession moved slowly towards the Railway Depot. On arrival at the Depot the corpse was transferred from the hearse to a special train, thence to the Cemetery, where it was interred with all the military and Masonic honors.

The American schooner "Edward B. Phillips," of Gloucester, Mass., Captain Nute, arrived at Halifax from the Grand Banks, bound home with a full fare of 1400 quintals of codfish. The Captain reports that the other vessels on the Grand Banks had slim fares when he left. On the 1st of May two of the crew of the "Edward B. Phillips," both Nova Scotians, named Harry Powers, of Spry Bay, and Edward Coleman, of Halifax, left in a dory to attend their their thralls, and were lost. The boat was picked up that evening without the men. On the 15th of July, on Grand Banks, he picked up a dory containing two men named Allen O'Brien and Lawrence Meagher, belonging to the American schr. "Tragabizanda," of Gloucester, who had lost their vessel in a fog on Banqueruea. They were for three days in their dory and when taken on board the "Edward B. Phillips" were so weak that they could not stand. The "Tragabizanda" arrived at the Strait of Canso several weeks ago and reported the loss of these two men.

WAR DESPACHES.

Dissensions have arisen at the headquarters of the Russian Army. The Czar is to return to Moscow and has resigned the conduct of the war to Grand Duke Nicholas, who asserts that the recent failures are due to making the war political instead of military.

LONDON, Aug. 4.
Egyptian troops are reported to have advanced to Bermerde, and to be threatening Gen. Zimmerman's Corps. This movement is meant to protect the rear of Mehemet Ali, who is near Rasgroud.

The operations of Russians in Dobrudscha have come to a standstill. While one of their columns stands on the high road from Medjidji to Silistria, the second and main column, which had advanced toward Bazardjik, has again retired to Medjidji. It is reported that the Austrians' military attaché left Biela with a confidential mission to the Emperor of Austria.
It is stated that Redif Pasha has been suddenly taken ill, and the physicians think he will not live a week. The suddenness of his illness causes various rumors.
Six thousand more Egyptian troops are going to Krudener. Reinforcements are being pushed forward from all points north of the Danube.
