

Aces Edge Parkdale 9-8 In Thriller At Stadium

The Summerside Aces edged the Parkdale Flyers 9-8 at Civic Stadium last night in the most thrilling game of hockey since the Civic Stadium since the new ice structure was built.

The score was 8-7 for Flyers with about 5 seconds to go in regulation play, and quite a few fans already on their way home. With a face-off coming in Parkdale zone, Charlie Hogan took out his goalie and put on an extra forward. Ron MacArthur took a relay from Cutcliffe and backhanded the disk past Moore to the

score at 19:58, and send the game into a 10-minute overtime session. This time with 16 seconds left, Vace Harris took a pass from Wallie Shepherd and shot the winning tally.

The first period ended 5-2 in favor of the Aces, with Moore, the Parkdale manager subbing in the net for Roper, not too sharp on a couple of tallies. But the makeshift net guardian improved as the game progressed, and was really tough to beat in the third period and the overtime session. It was all Parkdale in the middle

frame. The Charlottetown boys scoring four unanswered goals, and skating off the ice with a 6-5 edge.

Coke Grady, who shot 4 goals and won the Holman Shirt award, scored a goal which evened up the count after 55 seconds of play in the final canto, and put the Aces ahead with another at 13:05. With the Aces fighting desperately to get their lead, Dunn stole the puck from Grant Grady and tied it up again and the Carver brothers combined to pot what looked like the winning goal with a little over 2 minutes to play.

The Aces muffed two fine chances in overtime before Harris finally scored the winner.

The three Carver boys scored two goals apiece, and accounted for a total of 13 scoring points.

Rule Professional Football Subject To Anti-trust Laws

WASHINGTON (AP)—The U.S. Supreme Court ruled 6 to 3 Monday that professional football, unlike professional baseball, is subject to the anti-trust laws.

Speaking for the majority, Justice Tom Clark said the "orderly way to eliminate error or discrimination, if any there be" between baseball and football "is by legislation and not by court decision."

The three dissenting justices said they could see no difference between the two sports as regards the anti-trust laws.

The ruling was given on an appeal by William Radovich, one-time football star at the University of Southern California and later a pro player, who sued the

National Football League for \$105,000 a damages. The suit charged violation of anti-trust laws and said the league had boycotted Radovich.

SUIT MUST BE TRIED

The decision by the Supreme Court means Radovich's suit must be tried; it has been thrown out of lower courts. It does not mean that the Supreme Court is making any finding now as to whether the NFL has violated any law.

Clark noted that the court's 1922 decision in the federal baseball case held that the business of baseball was outside the scope of the Sherman Anti-Trust Act, but commented: "No other business claiming

the coverage of those cases has such an adjudication. We, therefore, conclude that the orderly way to eliminate error or discrimination, if any, is by legislation and not by court action.

"Congressional processes are more accommodative, affording the whole industry hearings and an opportunity to assist in the formulation of new legislation. Radovich's suit charged the National Football League and others attempted to monopolize interstate commerce in the business of professional football, in violation of anti-trust laws.

MONTREAL (CP)—Symptoms of a kidney infection were disclosed in the first examination of Jean Beliveau and caused concern over the condition of Montreal Canadiens centre, Dr. Yvan Dion said Monday.

The second examination surprisingly showed no symptoms at all, said Beliveau's personal physician.

Results of this second examination were a great relief both to Beliveau and the Canadiens management when his condition was pronounced okay last Saturday.

"Jean came to me last Tuesday after a team practice and was worried," said Dr. Dion. "I examined him, and an analysis clearly showed traces of nephritis, or a kidney infection that was becoming general."

"I was worried myself and was surprised at the result of the examination. I wanted to see Jean play Thursday night and after that game, against Detroit, I spoke to coach Toe Blake. I asked that he give Jean a rest until Saturday morning when another examination would be made."
