PICK-POCKETS.—The attention of the proper authorities is directed to a gang of juvenile pick-pockets who ply their calling on market days. Yesterday a poor country-woman was robbed, by one of this gang, of a purse containing over three dollars.

MILITARY.—Capt. Davidson, of the Royal Military College, Kingston, will arrive this evening and inspect the Charlottetown Engineers on Monday at Victoria Park. The Company will parade at the Drill Shed at 10 o'clock on Monday morning.

DESTROYED BY FIRE.—The Dorchester (N. B.) bark, Bertha Anderson has been destroyed by fire, together with a portion of her inward cargo. The vessel was owned by Wm. Hickman and was insured for \$5,200. The freight was insured for \$1,500.

COUNTERFEIT.—Counterfeit Dominion of Canada, \$2 notes are in circulation in the city. Several of them have recently been detected at the Banks. The difference between the genuine note and the counterfeit is so small that it is very difficult to distinguish.

SAVINGS BANK RETURNS.—The returns of the Moncton agency of the Government Savings Bank show deposits in June amounting to \$4,500 and withdrawals of \$9,500. In many cases withdrawals are made for investment in real estate. The total amount to the credit of depositors at the end of June was \$299,428.—Times.

CRICKET.—The Canadian cricketers followed their innings in the international match, on the 5th. All were retired for 39 runs, leaving the Americans victorious by an inning and 87 runs. Jones of St. John made 6, which, with Brewster's 6, were the highest made on the Canadian side. Henry, of Halifax, got out for a ciper.

TEA PARTY.—The Tea Party at Dundas, on the 5th inst., was a most enjoyable one. A large number of persons were present, and all seemed to enjoy themselves to their hearts' content. The cake and fancy articles were auctioned off by Mr. H. L. McDonald, Esq., the popular representative of the District. About \$300, in all, were realized.

FALL OF AN ELECTRIC BOLT.—A Point du Centre correspondent of the Moncton Times writes: A heavy thunder and lightning storm passed over here this (Thursday) afternoon. A thunder bolt fell and made a hole about five feet from the corner of U. Z. Keith's store and dwelling. The hole was about five inches wide; it cannot be ascertained how deep.

AN OWNER WANTED.—An empty dish which had evidently contained strawberries was left at THE EXAMINER office yesterday. Will the owner kindly call for it. FOUND IN A CLAM.—The Moncton Transcript reports that Dr. N. McLean, of the I. C. R., while taking a stroll through the woods near the upper part of Robinson's Creek, discovered a fresh water clam in the bed of the stream, and on opening it was surprised to find a pearl, about the size of a large pea, egg shaped and of a pinkish hue. The pearl is evidently of considerable value.

PUGILIST.—Jack McJoe, of East Boston, and Jim Kendrick, who signs himself middle-weight champion of England, have been matched in a contest of 15 rounds with two ounce gloves, according to the Marquis of Queensbury rules for endurance, within three weeks in Boston, for a purse of not less than \$500, of which 70 per cent. shall go to the winner and 30 per cent. to the loser.

A NARROW ESCAPE.—On Tuesday last a two-year-old girl, daughter of Mr. John Parlee, Perth, near Grand Falls, while playing with some children on the track of the N. B. railway, was struck by a flat car, thrown down and passed over by the train, but as she fortunately lay between the rails, was not crushed. The child, however, received such a heavy blow as will probably prove fatal.—Ez.

LAUNCHED.—On the 4th, at Souris West, was launched a two-topmast schooner, of 99 tons measurement, called the Nutwood, after the celebrated trotting stallion of that name. This vessel is intended for mackerel sealing, and is equipped for the business in every particular. No expense has been spared in building her by her owners, Messrs. Matthew, McLean & Co.; and she is pronounced to be one of the handsomest and best constructed vessels ever built in the County. The foreman, Capt. Lord, deserves credit for the work done. Mr. James Keefe, of Rollo Bay, was the contractor, and although he has built many fine vessels in his time, this one is said to be the prettiest of them all. Judging by her appearance, she is likely to make a record among her competitors as famous as was that of her namesake among his.

Ottawa News.

OTTAWA, July 6. The net debt of Canada at the 30th June was \$227,242,000, being a decrease of three quarters of a million during the past month.

The revenue, according to the statements received to June 30th, was \$35,000,000 and the expenditure nearly \$32,000,000, showing a surplus of \$3,000,000.

A supplementary statement will shortly be issued showing the returns which have not yet been received, but which are properly chargeable to the last fiscal year.

The Canada Screw Co., of Hamilton, are applying for leave to increase their capital from one hundred thousand to half a million dollars, the additional capital being invested in Canada by the American Screw Company of Providence.

The Marine Department has awarded a binocular glass to Capt. Gabala, of the Spanish steamer Espana, who rescued the crew of the bark Billy Simpson, of Windsor, in the China Sea, last September.

Matrimonial Complications.

MONTREAL, July 6. An interesting case has just been decided by Archbishop Fabre and will probably come up for sanction before the civil courts at an early date. In 1864 one Adelaide Masse was married in Quebec to P. E. Labbe and in 1876 she again married to H. P. Labelle, of this city, the first husband being supposed to be dead. The Archbishop having obtained sufficient proof that Labbe was living at the time of the second marriage, has annulled the latter, and Labelle is now a free man before his Church; but his position has still to be legalized by the Court and a regular action must be instituted to obtain this.

Counterfeiter Arrested.

TORONTO, July 6. Charles Johnston, the last of the gang of counterfeiters, who had been sending out counterfeit \$5 bills of the Bank of British North America, \$2 Dominion bills, and \$5 American silver certificates, was arrested here to-night, after he had been hunted through Michigan. The officers, however, failed to get counterfeit plates. He was taken to Sarnia to-night. His two confederates, Vance and Knight, were arrested here two or three months ago.

Severely Punished.

MONTREAL, July 6. Judgment was given to-day in the case of the Cote St. Louis quarrymen who took possession of the polling booth and prevented the public from voting for the water-works system. The three worst, F. Desaudry, E. Piarraut and M. O'Brien, were sent to jail for six months. Desaudry was fined \$50 or another six months, having brutally struck a constable when he was down. Four others received light sentences and one was acquitted.

Nominated.

AMHERST, July 6. There was a large gathering to-day at the nomination proceedings. A. R. Dickey, Conservative, and C. R. Casey, Prohibitionist, were nominated.
