HAMLET AT THE OPERA HOUSE.

We have to thank "The Lyceum Company" for playing "Hamlet" in Charlottetown. This masterpiece of Shakespeare, and other plays by the same author, are better worth the people's money—even when badly enacted—than most of the plays rendered here even when well enacted. Of course the company laboured under a disadvantage in respect to scenery. But we should not have minded this defect, if the passion of the play had not been rendered to "split the ears of the groundlings." In the quieter parts of the play the acting of Mr. D'Oize, as Hamlet, and Miss Hext, as Ophelia, was passably good; and the character of the Queen was fairly well sustained throughout the performance.

A COMING ATTRACTION.—"Joshua Simpkins" will be the attraction at the Opera House on Friday night. The situations are said to be strikingly realistic, with an overflow of fun and amusement. There are seven comedy parts in addition to that of Uncle Josh, which character is really a whole show in itself. C., whose great ability as a lawyer was greatly appreciated by the members of this bar; and that they feel deeply the loss of a personal friend to the members of this bar."
