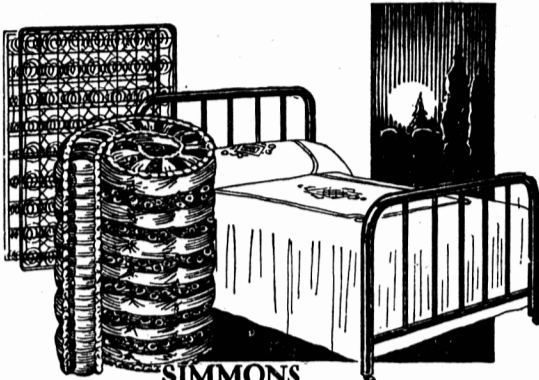

IN MEMORIAM

MRS. THOMAS DOYLE

Verily a good and just woman has left us. These were the indelible thoughts that entered the minds of her neighbors, when the news flashed over the telephone wires that Mrs. Thomas Doyle had passed away.
The deceased was incapacitated for some time from enjoying good health by the occasional attacks of a cardiac weakness. Of late her condition seemingly improved so well, that her family entertained high hopes that she would be spared to them for some years to come, but in this they were cruelly disappointed for on the early morning of Friday, April 24th, after a short illness, her soul went forth to receive its reward, strengthened and sustained by the grace of the last rites of the Catholic Church and administered by her attentive pastor, Rev. Phelan McKenna.
Throughout her illness she received competent medical supervision at intervals the service of a trained nurse, and the ceaseless and unflinching attention of her devoted family, while the frequent visits of her pastor were a source of comfort not only to her, but to her grieving husband and children.
Mrs. Doyle was born in Kinkora in 1864, being the youngest daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Hammell. After graduating from Prince of Wales College, she taught school very successfully in various districts of this Province. Her intelligence and pleasing and cultured personality, merited the respect of her pupils, who remained through life among her greatest friends and admirers.
After her marriage to Thomas Doyle she resided on the prosperous Doyle homestead at Campbellton, Lot 4. Here she entered with zest into the performance of her household duties. She endeavored herself to her new friends by her Christian character and unswerving principle, which were exemplified in her daily life, and by the kind and sympathetic interest she took in the welfare of those about her.
As a devoted wife and loving mother she created a beautiful home life around her. Endowed with the happiest dispositions, coupled with absolute sincerity in

word and deed, she set a lasting example by her perfect domesticity and true motherhood. She considered no sacrifice too great when her children's happiness was concerned; and this solicitude was in a measure repaid by the affection and obedience they bestowed upon her. To her friends her hospitality was proverbial. She had the happy faculty of invariably extending a most wonderful welcome and it is hard to think that the intimate relation formed between her and them must now end.
A woman of deep and unassuming piety she was an exemplary member of the Catholic Church. The fickleness with which she practiced her religion was an inspiration to those near and dear to her. She gave much of her time and contributed liberally to all charitable causes both in the church and in the community and consistently befriended the poor and those in distress.
She leaves to mourn their loss, her sorrowing husband, three sons, Peter, Reggie and Vernon, all at home; five daughters, Mrs. Edward Griffin, Burdon, Mrs. Frank Butler, Glemgarry, Mrs. Thomas Walsh, and Josie, Boston, Anna, who came home from Boston to attend her mother and a number of grandchildren to whom she was devotedly attached. Two brothers, Patrick and Thomas Hammell, Freetown, and one sister, Mrs. Thomas Laughlin, Rev. Thomas Hammell, Alberta, is a nephew.
Living in close proximity to the church, she was always on terms of genuine friendship with the parish priest and the visiting clergymen, who often partook of her generous hospitality. How well they appreciated her kindness was evidenced by the number who congregated to be present at her large funeral which was held on Monday morning, April 27th to St. Marks Church, Lot 7, and to assist at the solemn Requiem Mass which was celebrated by the pastor, Rev. Phelan McKenna, assisted by Rev. W. E. Monaghan, Seven Mile Bay, a Deacon, and Rev. John A. Gaudet, Bloomfield, a sub-deacon. Rev. John A. McDonald, Tignish, and Rev. P. Walsh, Palmer Road, were in the Sanctuary. The service at the grave was performed by Rev. John A. McDonald, a former pastor. The choir was under the direction of Mr. Patrick Butler, while his

brother, Mr. Frank Butler presided at the organ.

The pallbearers were: Messrs. Wilfred Hammell, Raymond Laughlin, Russel Hammell, Walter Laughlin, Frank Callaghan, all nephews, and Frank O'Halloran.

The numerous messages of sympathy, telegrams and Mass cards, that covered her beautiful casket, spoke a silent message of love.
To her disconsolate husband and family we extend most sincere sympathy. Their grief as they stood at the open grave on that lovely April morn to watch their saintly wife and mother laid away from them forever, was such as to make one imagine that they could hear her saying "Weep not for me, dear children, for my happiness is great." May her soul rest in peace.

MR. JOSEPH MATHESON

In the passing of Mr. Joseph Matheson, which occurred at his home April 10th, (Good Friday), 1936, the community of Oyster Bed, P.E.I. has lost a highly respected and life long resident. He was born seventy nine years ago, in the vicinity in which he lived, a son of the late Captain John and Mrs. Matheson. His father and another son were lost at sea on a voyage up to Newfoundland. Joseph, at that time a young lad, had often sailed with his father and on this occasion was making ready to go aboard, when luckily something prevented him from taking the trip. The ship never returned and the father and brother were never heard of after. This incident happened in the sixties shortly following the time when chipbuilding was carried on along the shores of Wheatley River and Oyster Bed, when the pioneer seamen went into the virgin forests, hewed down the timber, refitted the logs down the rivers, built sailing vessels and manned them out to sea. Such was the ability, perseverance and self-reliance of many of them that many early settlers who braved the perils of the sea.
The late Mr. Joseph Matheson, however, chose farming as his life occupation, and being as he was, a provident, industrious man, his labor was crowned with success.
About a year ago he began to fail in health and last Fall he entered the P.E.I. Hospital for treatment. It was found that medical skill could only help and not cure his

ailment, and eventually he returned to his home where he was tenderly cared for and nursed by his daughter Coia who is a trained nurse.

He bore his suffering with patience and Christian resignation, and was mostly able to be up and about and to enjoy seeing his friends until the day previous to his death, when he was stricken with a paralytic stroke from which he rapidly sank and passed peacefully away on the above mentioned date.

In religion he was an adherent of the Church of Scotland. In politics a Conservative. He was a kind and loving father, a friendly and hospitable neighbour, sincere and upright in his business dealings, and was highly esteemed and will be greatly missed and long remembered.

He is survived by five daughters, Mrs. Milton Rackham, Wheatley River, Mrs. John A. MacDonald, Milton, Mrs. Raymond Ling, Cora, R.N., and Hazel at home; also two brothers, Kenneth and William Matheson, both of Oyster Bed and one sister, Annie of Monmouth, N.S.

His wife (nee Catherine Matheson) predeceased her husband eight years ago, and a son Roland died in childhood.

The funeral was held on April 13th and despite the bad condition of the roads, and inclemency of the weather was largely attended.

The service at the house and grave was conducted by Rev. Carlyle Webster, who fittingly based his address on "The hope of the Resurrection," taking as his text the words, "If a man die, shall he live again?" Christ Himself being the first fruits, and proof of the Resurrection and His words, "Because I live, ye shall live also, and whosoever liveth and believeth in Me shall never die." John 11:26.

Hymns sang were, "The Lord is my Shepherd, Abide With Me, and A-Keep in Jesus. Beautiful flowers were placed on the casket by relatives and friends, silent but loving tributes. The pallbearers were: Messrs George Matheson, Howard Axworthy, Joseph Matheson, Henry Matheson, Collin Higgins and Howard Carr. Funeral directors Cutcliffe & Andrews, Interment in the Portage Cemetery.

Questions Sale of Government Ship

OTTAWA, May 14—(C.P.)—Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen, Conservative leader in the Senate, told the Upper House the Government recently sold the remaining surplus of the Canadian Government Merchant Marine and then called upon the Canadian National Railways board to approve.

To the reply of Senator Raoul Dandurand, government leader, that this declaration was a surprise, Mr. Meighen retorted he had the information from a member of the board, not the chairman.

If a member approved and now renounced the act, that indicated his unfitness, Senator Dandurand replied.

Action of the government in selling these ships was debated in the Senate last week following an inquiry by Senator C. C. Ballantyne (Cons., Montreal) and more was heard of the matter today.

The price received by this government for the ships was much higher than what the former administration obtained when it sold units of the fleet, Senator Dandurand said. On the recent sale the Government had been paid an average of \$41,992 a ship, compared with an average of \$17,328 a vessel paid between 1930 and 1935. The recent sale had been approved by resolution of the Canadian Government merchant marine board before authority of the government-in-council was taken to accept the offer, he said. If the 10 vessels had been scrapped they would have brought only \$10,000 each.

Senator Ballantyne replied the comparison made in the government leader's memorandum on prices received by the two governments ignored the type of ship.

Death Causes Break In N.B. Legislature

WOODSTOCK, N.B., May 14—(C.P.)—The first vacancy in the present New Brunswick legislature was caused today by the death of Stewart E. Durling, 63, one of four Liberal candidates elected in York County last June when that party routed opposing forces. The house

standing now is Liberals 42, Conservatives five and one vacancy.

Mr. Durling, prominent lumber operator of Canterbury, died in the Fisher Memorial Hospital here this afternoon after an operation early today. Survivors include his wife, parents, two sons, three brothers and two sisters.
