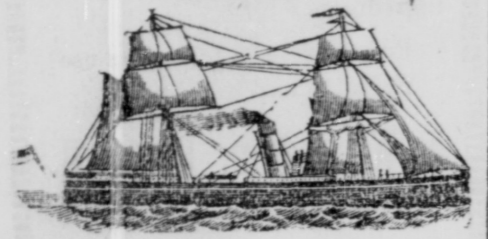

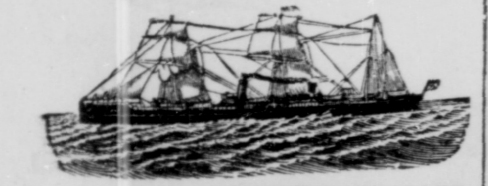

**Of Special Interest to our Farmers**

**Clipping the Stubble Fields.**

After harvest we mow the stubble fields intended for meadow next year. The swath board is removed and the cutter bar run slightly higher than when cutting grass. The growth of weeds and young clover and timothy is cut off and allowed to lie on the ground, serving as a mulch for the young grass, unless the growth is very heavy. Then it is raked off, so as not to foul the coming hay crop. Our first hay crop is always as clean and often better than succeeding ones.

The mowing has opposite effects upon the grass and weeds. The tendency is to induce a more compact and thicker growth of grass, while the weeds are destroyed. The practice may not be so profitable if the fields are to be used for pasture, especially the same season, as the stock will likely graze too close. This will leave the young plants unprotected during the winter, and much of the young clover will be heaved out if the soil is not underdrained, says an Ohio correspondent of the American Agriculturist.

**Fall Setting of Raspberries.**

The great majority of New Jersey raspberry growers start new plantations in the spring, but those who set plants in the fall claim very satisfactory results. There seems to be no doubt but that fall setting of the red sorts could be more largely practiced than at present with a great saving of time and labor, besides relieving the pressure of spring work. Young sucker plants can be set as early as the middle of August selecting a cloudy, damp day for the work, and later—i. e., last of October, old shoots can be readily transplanted. For the blackcaps spring setting is always to be preferred. Fall setting is seldom practiced.

**Improvement of Seed Wheat.**

Growers who, before harvesting, have gone into the wheatfield and selected a number of the most desirable heads for seed are now in a position to carry out the Kansas station's programme for the improvement of seed wheat. Usually the selection is upon the basis and yield of quality, in which case the heads selected will be large, well formed and with plump, uniform grains. The grain derived from these heads should be grown upon a plot of ground under the most favorable conditions. The grain derived from this plot furnishes the seed for the third year. But before harvesting a selection of suitable heads should be made from this for the next seed plot. In this way the seed is each year improved or at least maintained at its present standard. The size of the seed plot depends upon the total area of the wheat to be grown. Furthermore, the seed plot may be given much more careful treatment than is applicable to the field. It is best to have the seed plot within the main field, so as to be entirely surrounded by wheat. This lessens the loss from grasshoppers and other insects and gives the plants better protection.

The Provincial Government of Nova Scotia has made provision for granting a sum of about twelve hundred dollars to each county where a successful creamery or cheese factory is not in operation. The Dominion Department of Agriculture will undertake to run these creameries for a few years on a plan similar to that which was followed in Prince Edward Island and which has been eminently successful and satisfactory there.—Co-operative Farmer.

**Orchard and Garded.**

Any land that will grow a good crop of corn will grow berries.

Bagasse from the sorghum mill is one of the best materials with which to mulch strawberries.

In nearly all cases the price of fruit and vegetables in a package is fixed by the worst specimens, not by the best.

Onions should be harvested as soon as the tops die down. Spread them out under shelter where there is good ventilation.

The only safe remedy for the yellows is to cut out every affected tree, and this must be done systematically and thoroughly.

No plant or tree is fit for setting out unless it has made a normal, healthy growth in the seed bed or nursery. Neither extreme is desirable.

Apple and pear trees are all right for planting when two or three years old from the root graft. With these especially the planting of old trees is rarely advisable.

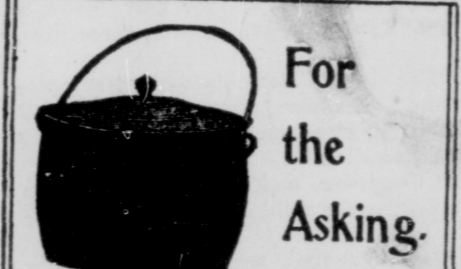

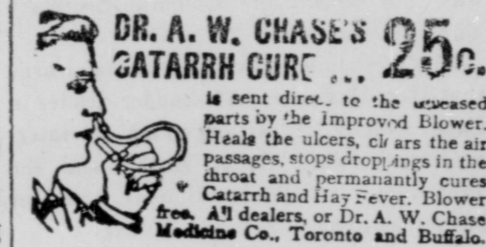
