ELECTIONS.—The Manitoba local elections will probably take place about the end of July.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

THE BIG STORM. FURTHER PARTICULARS.

TORONTO, June 7. The destruction caused by yesterday's storm is terrible and widespread. Enormous damage has been done to the crops. Roots just peeping forth have been literally blown out of the ground. Orchards in nearly every locality in the Ottawa district are destroyed. Hundreds of barns were blown down, and houses unroofed or otherwise damaged. The loss cannot fall short of half a million dollars. At Billingsbridge the Roman Catholic Church was blown to pieces. There were 21 persons and a priest in the building at the time—a 12 year old girl named McVeg was killed and several other persons were injured. At Rochesterville a man named Gray was killed. A brick schoolhouse in Osgoode township was blown down and the teacher and 20 children buried in the ruins. None were killed, but all were injured, some fatally, it is believed.

THE ANGLICAN SYNOD. UNION OF THE CHURCHES.

The Report Adopted.

TORONTO, June 7. The Anglican Synod of Toronto diocese to-night adopted the report of the committee on the union of the Church in British America. The report recommends that power be given to the dioceses within the civil provinces of the Dominion to form themselves in provincial synods or councils, the bishops of the province to constitute the Upper House to be presided over by an Archbishop elected by the bishops of the various dioceses concerned. The report further recommends the formation of a Dominion Synod to meet every five years, and to be presided over by the primate and metropolitan elected by Archbishops. The legislation of the Provincial Council as set forth in the report is confined to matters affecting the provincial affairs of the church. The Dominion Synod, in addition to being concerned with the standards and discipline of the church, will act as a court of appeal in cases affecting the general interests of the church. The committee was instructed to co-operate with other dioceses of the Dominion, with a view to practical legislation.

THE CUMBERLAND ELECTION. The Candidate Selected.

HALIFAX, June 7. A. R. Dickey, barrister, was selected to-day by the Liberal-Conservative convention as the party standard-bearer in Cumberland. The nomination was unanimous, and the choice a most judicious one, as Mr. Dickey has both ability and popularity. The Liberals of the County do not want to fight, but the Halifax Grits are bringing pressure to bear on the local men to put up a man. The third party are bent on having a candidate in the field, but want to get rid of Bulmer.

Forest Fires.

MONCTON, June 7. Forest fires caused great damage in all this vicinity. They have been raging all along the northern division of the I. C. Railway, causing some delay to the trains. Stewart Lites house, two barns and outbuildings at Lutes Mountains, six miles from here, were burned with all their contents, including three horses, and threshing, mowing and cultivating machines. The fire spread so rapidly that the family had to escape through the window. The loss is heavy. No insurance.

The Longley Case.

NORWICH, Ont., June 7. Nearly the whole of to-day's session of the Niagara Methodist Conference was occupied with the case of Rev. Mr. Longley. After a long discussion, a motion for his expulsion from the ministry was followed by an amendment that he be reprimanded and his resignation accepted. Finally discussion was postponed till to-morrow morning.

The Gleggery Election Case.

OTTAWA, June 7. Hon. Mr. Master has gone to England seeking to obtain the consent of the Privy Council to appeal in the Gleggery election case. This will, if successful, secure a final decision on the strength of the six months limitation plea.

Acquitted.

HALIFAX, June 7. Judge Prowse, of Newfoundland, yesterday acquitted Higgins, captain of the American banker Boothbay, arrested for selling bait at St. Pierre, but he was re-arrested to-day on fresh evidence.

Another Fire.

MONTREAL, June 7. One of the stables of the Montreal Street Railway was burned this morning with 134 horses. A man lurking near the stables was arrested.

HALIFAX, June 7. Rev. D. Moore, of Stellarton, was elected Grand Master of the Masons for Nova Scotia, P. E. I. and Newfoundland.

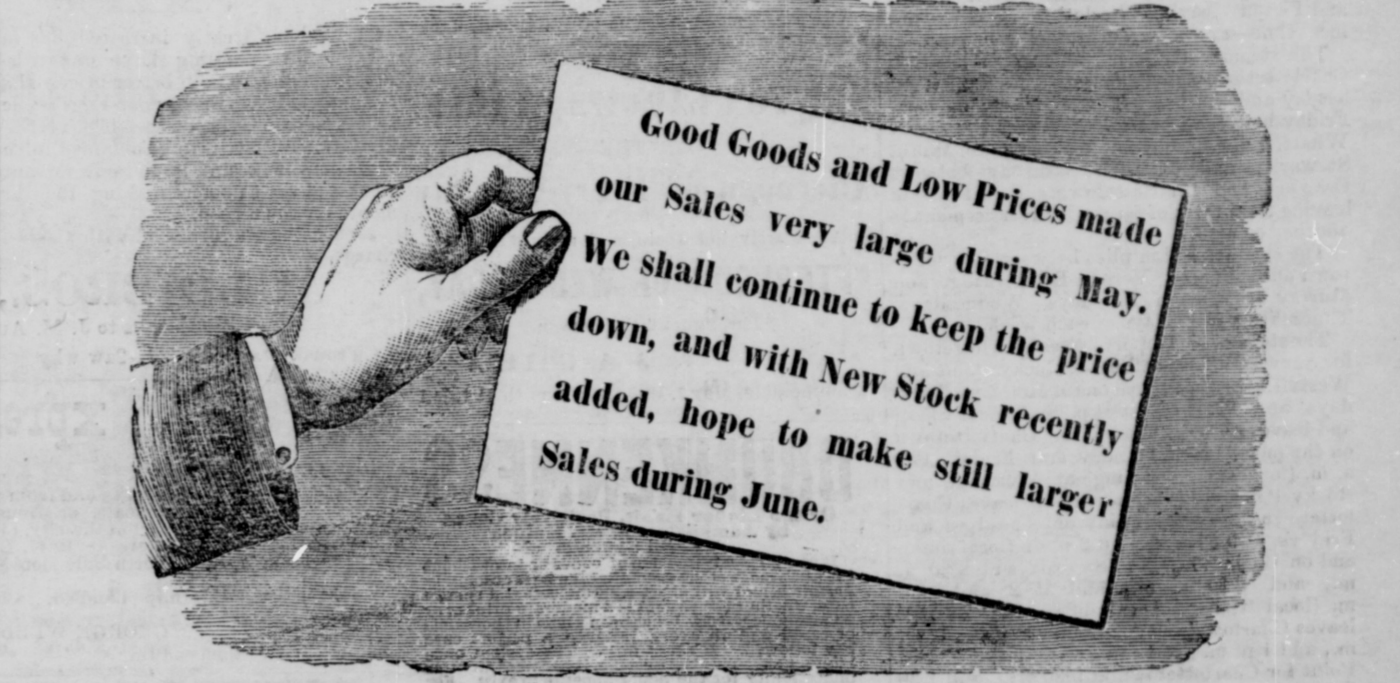
