AN ISLANDER INJURED.—The Moncton Times of the 14th inst., says that Mr. Wm. Knight, baker, formerly of Charlottetown, had his hands and arms quite badly burned on Tuesday, while putting out a fire caused by burning grease in a neighbor's kitchen. He will be unable to do very much work for some little time.

SCALDED TO DEATH.—A five year old child named Edward R. Lade, whose parents reside on Kaye street, Halifax, met with a fatal accident on Saturday evening. The child was playing round the stove when a pot of boiling water fell over, the contents going on the child and scalding it in a frightful manner. The little one suffered much pain for two hours when death ended its sufferings.

DISGUSTED WORD COMPETITORS.—The Halifax Recorder says: The Upper Province mails last week brought a large collection of butter knives and pickle forks (similar to those accompanying bottles of glass and coffee tins) for many persons in the city who had compiled several thousand words in a word competition, and sending therewith \$1 for subscription to a periodical they would not likely otherwise subscribe for, and afterwards 25 cents to pay for "packing and postage" for them.

FARMERS ON THEIR MUSCLE.—A Wichita, Kan., despatch of the 11th inst., says: Sheriff Dobson, of Harper County, and a lawyer representing a loan and trust company, of Arkansas City, tried the other day to sell at auction some farms in the western part of country on which the loan company held judgments. Twenty farmers attacked them, tore up their papers and drove them away. The Farmers' Alliance intends, it is said, to prevent by force all foreclosures on farms. Sheriff Dobson will return with a larger force and, if possible make the sales.

THE DEADLY CIGARETTE.—Willie Bird, a lad of 18, died at Government Hospital, New York, a few days ago, from the excessive use of cigarettes. The cause of death was officially given as nicotine poisoning by Dr. Johnson of the hospital staff, who had the case in charge. The boy's body was terribly emaciated, his features were drawn and haggard; a maniac tied to his bed, the wreck of what might have been a man. His father says he began to smoke when only 10 years of age, and the habit constantly grew upon him until now, at the age of 18, he has smoked as many as three or four packages of cigarettes a day.

VERY MUCH "ABROAD."—A commercial traveller—a P. E. Islander—staying in this city gives a deplorable view of the state of affairs in that bright little island of which he is a native. The question of the adoption of the temperance Act has thrown the Islanders into a great state of excitement, and its recent rejection by a majority of 14 at Charlottetown shows how closely the affair was run. He says it is impossible to walk through the woods in some districts without encountering the rendezvous of a private still. These places when found by the police are invariably burned, but the liquor business has up to the present, in most cases, evaded the arm of the law. The revenue of course suffers through this illicit distilling, and the state of affairs in the island is not very promising.—Fredericton Herald.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

Trade Relations.

OTTAWA, Jan. 15. The Toronto Mail is authority for the statement that the Imperial Government has suggested to Canada to secure a settlement of the question pending between Canada and the United States, on the basis of Reciprocity. It is learned here that the statement is absolutely incorrect, and on the contrary it is intimated that the American Government recently made overtures for the consideration of enlarged trade relations with Canada, and that the Canadian Government promptly referred the proposal to the Imperial Government for action.

Had a Big Talk.

PINE RIDGE AGENCY, S. D., Jan. 16. This afternoon a second delegation of the hostile chiefs arrived from camp and had a "big talk" with General Miles. It was acted that the hostiles would leave their present camp and pitch their tents on the west side of White Clay Creek, immediately opposite and less than half a mile from the agency. The Indians are to surrender their farms to their respective chiefs. The weapons will be sold and the proceeds returned to the Indians. General Miles is pleased with the friendly disposition manifested by the chiefs, and proposed to allow them several days in which to redeem their promise. The chiefs are equally pleased with the kindly treatment received at the hands of General Miles.

Imperial Federation.

TORONTO, Jan. 15. The Imperial Federation League meet on the 30th inst. to discuss the following resolution, "that this League respectfully recommends the resolution unanimously adopted by the Council on 4th October, 1889, to the consideration of the parent League, and trusts that the latter will see fit to call a convention of delegates from all the branches at an early date to decide upon what suggestions for closer British union should be made for the consideration of Her Majesty's Government in accordance with Lord Salisbury's invitation. Principal Grant, and Dalton McCarthy are to deliver addresses.

Irish Affairs.

DUBLIN, Jan. 15. Members of both sections of the Irish party attended a council of the Tenants' Defence Association in the Mansion House to-day. T. D. Sullivan presided. It was voted to donate £25,000 for the relief of evicted tenants, and on motion of Healy, seconded by Harrington, it was unanimously resolved to invite the treasurers of associations throughout Ireland to remit the sums which they have in hand. In an interview Redmond dwelt on the significance of this action as showing that the people who had been evicted from their homes would not suffer on account of party discussion over the leadership.

The Liberal Convention.

TORONTO, Jan. 15. Great discontent is manifested here in Liberal circles over Laurier's decision to hold a convention in February. The faithful are afraid that the present differences in the party on trade and other questions will become more apparent at the gathering in question and jeopardize the prospects of the party at the coming election.

A Bucket Shop Suspends.

MONTREAL, Jan. 15. There was great excitement here to-day amongst those who still put faith in bucket shops, when a despatch reached the city that J. C. Allen & Co., of Buffalo, had suspended. Montrealers will lose heavily through Allen's agents here.

An Analysis of Pepper.

OTTAWA, Jan. 15. An analysis of pepper by the Inland Revenue Department, shows that of a hundred samples collected in various parts of Canada only twenty-seven were genuine. Those dealers retailing the impure article are subject to penalties, but it is not proposed to enforce the penalties at present.

Engineering Examinations.

OTTAWA, Jan. 15. An endeavor will shortly be made to have examinations in Engineering at the Kingston Military College recognized by the British Institute of Civil Engineers.

Weather Bulletin.

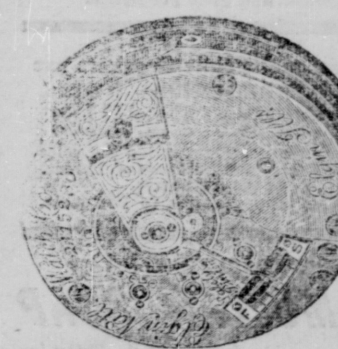
