ELECTROSHOCK TREATMENT IN AGITATED ELDERLY PERSONS

Several years ago research workers in mental diseases estimated that at the rate mental diseases were increasing, within 50 years one-half the world's inhabitants would be engaged in looking after the other half.

The results of the electroshock treatments were gratifying in that all but slight were at least temporarily helped. Nine often more than one series of treatments of these eight patients, four did not return for further treatments and were not followed.
