Abbie Juniors Go One Up On C. and B. In Series For Baseball Ch'ship

The Abbie Juniors went one up last evening in their best-of-seven series with the Curran and Briggs Juniors for the Provincial Junior Baseball championship, defeating Curran and Briggs by the score of 7-4. Both Jack Kearns and Benny Carson pitched a good game, but Curran and Briggs' base-running in the first and third innings, and a shaky fielding display on the part of the Curranites enabled the Abbies to emerge the victors, though they had only two earned runs to Curran and Briggs' three. Kearns was touched for 10 hits, three of them when he weakened in the ninth inning. He walked three and struck out 13. Carson gave up eight hits, walked nine, and struck out nine.

Grant Grady opened the first inning with a double to left, but took too long a lead off the sack and was picked off by Carson. Whalen's single would probably have scored him in the third if the Curranites had the bases loaded with one out, and Schurman hit a high pop which Grady dropped. The runners, not hearing the umpire's call, and apparently not knowing the "infield fly" rule, dashed for the next bases, and Whalen was cut down at third, ending the inning.

The C. and B. team made eight errors to the Abbies' two, and five visitors reached first on miscues while only one Curranite got a life through an Abbie boot.

Hood, Ready and Don MacLeod led the Abbie attack. Hood and MacLeod getting two for four, and Ready two for five. Grant Grady, Johnny Whalen and Joe Dalton each got a brace of bingles for the losers.

Warren Hood made two spectacular plays in the fifth inning, robbing Coke Grady and Paul Schurman of what looked like sure base hits.

Four double plays were executed during the game, each team

getting two. The second game will be played at Memorial Field in Charlottetown this evening.

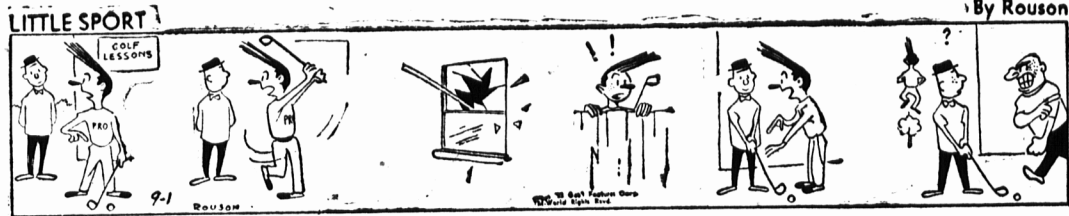

IN THIS CORNER

The Islanders Hockey Club have not yet signed Bucko Trainor as playing coach but it is expected that Trainor will link his name to a contract some time later this week. There is nothing standing in the way of the signing such as contract terms as both Trainor and the Club officials are in agreement about all conditions. Trainor is already working on players for next season and club officials have tendered contracts to all of last year's Islanders. All have acknowledged the contracts with Gus Gustavson having the honor of making the first reply. According to reports Marcel Clements is showing interest in returning to the club and if Clements comes this way Beaudry may also have another whirl at Maritime hockey.

The Islanders go to Montague today to sell holding seats. The seat sale went over fairly well in Charlottetown, in fact better than last season. Today Forrest E. Clow, the Islanders vice president will sell seats at Jameson's Drug Store in Montague from nine o'clock until eight this evening. On Thursday Mr. Clow will sell seats in Summerside.

Walter Lawlor, the President of the Maritime Amateur Hockey Association for the past two years, will resign as head of that hockey body at the annual meeting of the M.A.H.A. late this month. He will automatically hold a position on the executive as past president during his term of office. Walter has had quite a number of tough problems to handle and has handled most of them well and to nearly everyone's satisfaction. The most controversial dispute he had to handle arose last year during the Islanders-Glace Bay play-offs.

That dispute concerned the case of Erwin Grosse who came to the Islanders from the Shawinigan Falls Cataracts late in the season. The Islanders defeated Glace Bay with Grosse playing but at the conclusion of the series he was ruled ineligible. The M.M.H.L. ruled that Glace Bay and Charlottetown play a home and home series to decide a winner but the M.A.H.A. stepped in and over-ruled the M.M.H.L. When the M.M.H.L. by-passed the Islanders and ordered Glace Bay and Halifax to meet in the finals the M.A.H.A. threatened the Nova Scotia teams with suspension. This prevented a Halifax-Glace Bay series and Hanson Dowell, a former President of the M.A.H.A. was called in to settle the dispute.

Happy Emms, the famous coach of the Barrie Flyers, has written Forbes Kennedy regarding his plans for next year. Kennedy has been signed to a contract by the Montreal Junior Canadiens. Emms, who had Kennedy in Barrie for several weeks at the beginning of the last hockey season, is interested in making a trade with the Canadiens for the young Charlottetown player. Emms would also like to line up Orrin Carver with a good senior team in Ontario. Orrin played with the Memorial Cup champions a year ago and is now a free agent. He could be quite a help to the Islanders if he chose to remain here.

It is almost a certainty that stock car racing will be inaugurated at the Charlottetown Driving Park this fall. It was learned from one of the directors over the week-end that work on the construction of a stock car track would commence shortly. This track will be the regulation quarter-mile length, and will be built inside the horse racing track.

What is being billed as the highlight of the stock car racing meet in the Maritimes is to be held in Summerside next Monday. This meet will bring together the leading drivers and stock cars in the Maritimes and they will race for \$1500 in purses as well as beautiful trophies. Cars from Moncton, Sydney, Saint John and this Province have already been entered in the meet.
