

Airmen Win Second Game In Island Softball Finals

The R.C.A.F. Royals jumped into a two game lead in the playoff series for the Prince Edward Island softball championship when they defeated Canada Packers 8-1 yesterday afternoon in a game played on Memorial Field.

The third game in the best of five series is scheduled to be played at Summerside this evening at 7:30.

Ross Armstrong who makes it an annual habit of pitching the airmen to the Provincial softball championship was on the mound for the airmen yesterday and held the Packers to eight hits.

A mistake was made with men on base and although he allowed eleven batters to reach first he only allowed one man to cross the plate.

The Packers led the base through the second inning. An arm swing got out of the joint without a runner scoring. Again in the sixth inning the Packers hit the airmen but Armstrong bore down to strike out the next batter and force the first batter to ground out.

The Summerside pitcher struck out 10 and did not issue a walk.

Billy Wright started on the mound for the Packers and was relieved in the third inning by Henry Hartinger with the visitors ahead 5-0. Wright gave up four runs and walked two.

Hartinger pitched good ball for the airmen. He gave up eight singles in the last six and two-thirds innings while striking out two. He did not issue a walk.

The airmen went into a 1-0 lead in the first inning as Jerry Allard scored base on an error and scored on Armstrong's sacrifice fly.

They scored four more in the third on a single by Allard, a double by Jones, a single by Gibson, a walk and an error.

British Win In Unique Race With Americans

GOODWOOD, England (Reuters)—Twenty American and British horseless carriages of grandma's day snorted and coughed into the end of an 850-mile road race here Saturday.

The British team beat the American enthusiasts but nobody seemed to notice. The point was, they all made it—850 miles over hill and dale from Edinburgh to this south English town covered in a week of steady bone-battling.

The 10 American cars—average age 38—and the 10 British entrants—average age 36—whizzed around a 2.4-mile race car circuit here to finish the rally with fenders quivering, radiators steaming and exhausts roaring.

The scoring was on a points basis with deductions for failure to stay on schedules and other errors. The final tally was 8,376 for the British team and 7,001 for the Americans.

Each of the competing teams had five cars built between 1904 and 1914 and five vintage machines built between 1920 and 1930. Most of the American makes—Lozier, Mercer, Simplex, Biddle and Kissel—have long been extinct.

Final decisions were made Saturday on a parking test, a "bending face" involving swerving between posts at moderate speeds, and 40 minutes lapping the circuit at as fast as possible—about 50 m. p. h.

If they do, a meeting will be held at Amherst Sept. 25 and a league formed. The MHL dropped the "major" from its name last

month when it decided that it would not operate on a major basis this season.

Indians Almost In; Dodgers Gaining On Fading Giants

Cleveland's rampaging Indians all but ended the New York Yankees' dynasty Sunday.

Al Lopez' inspired warriors overwhelmed the Yankees in both ends of a crucial doubleheader 4-1 and 3-2 to stretch their American League lead to 8½ games over the weary defending champions.

A crowd of 86,563, largest ever to see a baseball game, saw the Yankee humiliation. Of these, 84,587 paid to set a record for a regular season game.

An Oct. 10, 1948 world series game in Cleveland drew 86,288, all paid. That was more than the total attendance.

Only by a major miracle can the Yankees gain their sixth straight flag. Even if the Yankees win all their remaining 11 games, all Cleveland has to do is win only three of its 10 and the Indians will have their first flag in six years.

NATIONAL IN DOUBT

The National League pennant race, however, remained very much in doubt as the league leading New York Giants had their margin trimmed to only three games over Brooklyn. The Dodgers picked up a game and a half on the slow moving Giants, sweeping a doubleheader from Chicago 4-2 and 4-3 while the St. Louis Cardinals were vanquishing the Giants 4-3.

Milwaukee's third place Braves advanced to within 4½ of the top, splitting a doubleheader with Philadelphia. The Braves came back as Lew Nardette nipped Bob Roberts in a 2-1 pitching duel after the Phillies had ended Warren Spahn's 11-game winning streak 5-2.

Cincinnati walloped hapless Pittsburgh twice 11-5 and 13-2 as Ted Kluszewski rapped homers Nos. 47 and 48 and knocked in nine runs to boost his leading runs batted in total to 132.

The Chicago White Sox whipped the Boston Red Sox twice, 5-3 and 7-5 as they passed the 90 victory mark for the first time since 1920. Nellie Fox produced three hits, including a two-run double, and stole three bases. Minnie Miñoso, ejected from the first game by umpire Larry Napp, drove in four runs in the nightcap with a home run and double.

Detroit took two from Washington 5-0 and 8-3 as Steve Gromek pitched a six-hit shutout and soredamed Ted Gray won his first game since May 12.
