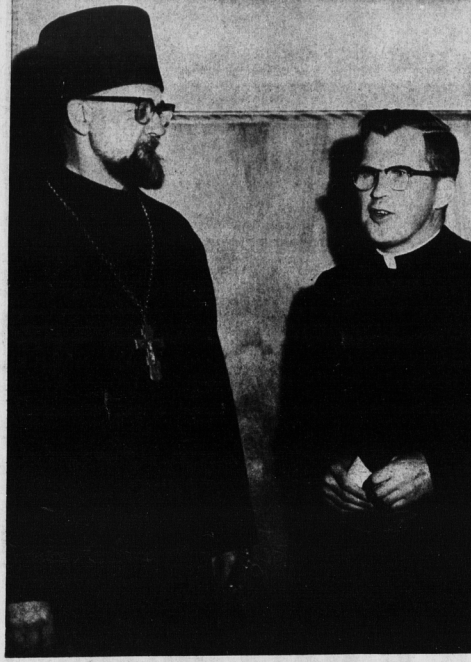

Hurricane Sets To Sweep Across Island In 3 Days

MIAMI, Fla. (AP) — Killer hurricane, with more than 60 persons dead in her wake, threatened Sunday night to bludge once more across hard-hats and regain advance on the Bahama Islands.

Throughout Sunday the hurricane lay just south of the Cuban coast, battering Fidel Castro's island for the third straight day.

Mac Seen Pondering Issue Of Leadership

LONDON (Reuters)—Amid a fresh buildup of a "Mac must go" campaign and counter moves by the Conservative prime minister's supporters, Harold Macmillan met Sunday for a heart-to-heart talk with Lord Howe, his foreign secretary.

Official purpose of the meeting in the quiet of Chequer, Macmillan's official country residence, was for Howe to report on his trip to the United Nations General Assembly meeting and to see President Kennedy in Washington.

N.Y. PIGEONS CALLED KILLERS

NEW YORK (AP) — The city's estimated 5,000,000 pigeons long regarded as the harmless, feathered vagabonds of the public parks, have taken on a dreaded new public image—wrecking messengers of death.

The status of the pigeon took its turn for the worst last week when a medical expert directly attributed two human deaths in recent months to a brain fever caused by a fungus contained in pigeon droppings.

Settlement Hoped For In St. Lawrence

By GEORGE FRAIKOR MONTREAL (CP) — Striking Quebec longshoremen gave their union leaders a mandate Sunday to negotiate a settlement with the ship owners on the basis of what a union lawyer described as "new proposals."

The decision came at a mass cloud-door meeting in Atwater Market that drew almost 2,000 of the 3,800 members of the International Longshoremen's Association (ILA) on strike in Montreal, Quebec City, Trois-Rivières and Sorel.

They walked off the job Friday. A union lawyer Phil Culler said after the meeting the new proposals were "far from our original demands."
