MacNaught Tells Liberal Ass'n Federal Gov't Accomplished Much

The Solicitor General of Canada, J. Watson MacNaught, Saturday night told the annual meeting of the East Prince Liberal Association that despite all the time-consuming tactics the federal government had been subjected to by the opposition in the past two years, it had accomplished much.

Mr. MacNaught, who flew in from Ottawa for the meeting, stated the economy of Canada was buoyant and that the federal government expected to almost "end up in the black" this year. He added that these were two very important things.

Enumerating the accomplishments of the federal government, the solicitor general first mentioned the Farm Machinery Assistance Credit Act, which he stated "I don't know where it will benefit more than P.E.I."

This bill, which ran into opposition from prairie members, can and should put an end to a lamentable state of affairs in the agricultural industry, Mr.

MacNaught said. Under the bill three or more farmers can unite into a syndicate for the purpose of purchasing expensive machinery and the federal government will advance 80 per cent of the actual cost. The loans are repayable over a period of seven years at an interest rate of six per cent.

The federal member for Prince County felt this was one of the most beneficial acts in the statute books.

STUDENTS LOANS
Commenting on the student loan bill, Mr. MacNaught said "I don't know what other bit of legislation has received more universal approbation than this bill". The provinces taking advantage of these loans most, he said, were Ontario and Prince Edward Island.

Through this bill, students can borrow up to \$1,000 per year from the federal government over a period of five years to complete their education and they are not required to start repayment until after they have been employed for six months.

On the employment situation, Mr. MacNaught said that employment was the highest in years and that in 1964 only 3.7 of Canada's labor force was unemployed. He compared this figure to the 11 per cent unemployed in 1958 when the Diefenbaker government was in power.

Mr. MacNaught referred to the work which will be done on the runway at the local airport and said when the Liberal government took over two years ago it had found the runways at the airport in deplorable condition. He stated that his government, with this work on the runways, will return the airport to the high position it held a few years ago.

COLOSSAL BLUNDER
The minister mentioned the new ferry for the Northumberland Strait crossing which will cost in the neighborhood of \$17 million, and pointed out that the ferry Confederation was a "colossal blunder", completely inadequate for transportation except on the fairest of summer days.

Speaking on behalf of Alex Campbell, the Liberal candidate in the 5th Prince by-election Tuesday, Mr. MacNaught said "I think when the ballots are counted Tuesday night we will have elected two good Liberals". This was also in reference to the by-election in 1st Kings.

The minister said when he heard the candidate speak it reminded him so much of "Alexander's father", (Chief Justice Thane A. Campbell) when he first entered the political scene in the early 1930's. The voices of both father and son, he added, had a ring of honesty and sincerity.

Mr. MacNaught was of the opinion that the present provincial government is in financial difficulty, and that if this situation continues the province is "not far from a commission government".

MORE MONEY
Addressing the meeting, Alex Campbell said the provincial government is spending more money in parties to elect Claude Ives than they did to elect 35 members to the legislative assembly in the last election.

Technician Degrading Protested

ALBERTON — The annual meeting of the board of directors of the Western Hospital was held in the hospital lounge recently with the president, Very Rev. M. J. Rooney in the chair.

One of the most crucial issues at the meeting was the contemplated down grading of the position and salary of the x-ray technician. It was felt by the board that this showed a disregard for the quality of x-ray service to the people of West Prince County, not to mention the expensive equipment in use valued at some \$25,000.

The board passed a motion strongly protesting the fact that the hospital commission proposes to reduce the x-ray technician's salary in the hospital to that of an assistant.

A nominating committee to bring in a slate of directors at

the next meeting was appointed. Members are Harvey Hutt, Merritt Callaghan, and the administrator. It was suggested that in future two directors be appointed, one to represent the Roman Catholic faith and the other the Protestant faith.

Rev. David MacDonald, reporting for the by-laws committee, suggested that there will be a presentation of the constitution with suggested revisions at the next regular meeting.

Campbellton Resident Dies From Illness

ALBERTON — William MacKendrick of Campbellton, a prominent citizen of West Prince County, died in O'Leary Community Hospital Saturday following an illness which extended over a period of seven years. Death came the day after his 82nd birthday.

A son of the late James and Clara MacKendrick, he lived all his life in Campbellton where he was a successful farmer.

He was a longtime member of the church in Campbellton, first of the Presbyterian Church and after 1925 of the United Church. He was senior elder in the congregation.

Actively interested in politics, he served a number of years as president of the West Prince Liberal Association. In June, 1907, he was married to Mary Webb who survives him. She, too, has been seriously ill over a period of years and is at present in a patient in O'Leary Hospital.

A daughter, Mrs. Harold Howe, of Berthoud, Minn., and a son, Kenneth, at home, 12 grandchildren and two great-grandchildren also survive.

There are three sisters and one brother remaining of the family of seven. They are Mrs. John Gordon (Myrtle) of Charlottetown; Mrs. Wilfred MacLeod (Florence) of Charlottetown; Mrs. Marion Mitchell in Saskatchewan and Howard in Glasgow, Scotland.

The funeral will be held in Campbellton United Church this afternoon at 2 o'clock. Interment will be in the church cemetery.
