THE WELLS CASE.—The counsel for the defence in the graveyard insurance case have applied to the attorney general for a fiat for writ of error. This will be the first writ of error that has ever been issued in this province, so that the proceedings under it are altogether new to the members of the bar here. The writ of error is issued under the signature of the lieutenant governor, with the great seal of the province attached. The object is to avoid the conviction in the case of C. B. Welton and Dr. Randall.—St. John Telegraph.

THE HORSE TRADE.—The Boston correspondent of the St. John Sun says: The horse market continues quiet, although a good many horses are changing hands. There is no saap to trade and buyers are inactive. There are, however, some excellent horses being sold at good prices. The best grade horses sell very low, and western animals are plentiful at \$100 to \$125 each. Ordinary horses sell from \$100 to \$175, and nice horses sell fairly at \$250 to \$300. Good driving horses sell at \$175 to \$250, with a prospect of a better sale after this week.

FARMERS HARD UP.—A letter from Erola, Minn., says: "Most of our farmers put in all the barley they could—about one-third more acres was sown to barley than ever before—very little corn and not much wheat. The outcome is a poor crop of barley and not much money in circulation. A good many are selling off their best draft horses in order to pay local debts. Horses are cheap on that account. They are being picked up by buyers at all the way from \$100 to \$150 per span just now. Outside of this district the same horses are selling at from \$300 to \$400 per span. The grain speculator is not anywhere. Hogs are strong this season; are chickens and eggs. The farmers do not get discouraged after all our drawbacks and poor crops at low prices. They are learning by experience not to put all their eggs in one kind of grain or one kind of stock."
