Cold Eggplant Appetizer Government Restaurant Hit

Hundreds of cars were parked at the huge shopping centre in Paramus, New Jersey. In the evening dark, the beautiful buildings sparkled with lights.

Up the broad steps we stroled into the first gourmet restaurant to be opened in any such centre. We walked through the hospitable lounge of "The Continental" lovely with plantings, over a curved Oriental-like bridge, a bubbling brook beneath, into the spacious dining room.

Serene white walls and Venetian drapes of white silk are relieved by Italian brick in Etruscan red. Attractive plantings against the brick and table linen in palest coral combine a type of decor that could beautify any home dining room.

THE MENU FEATURED FOODS AND BEVERAGES OF THREE CONTINENTS.

For the hors d'oeuvre, we enjoyed eggplant a la Bohemienne, nestled on lettuce. With this, a thin loaf of sliced oven-hot yeast bread.

The soup was creme-Forestiere (mushroom); the entree, beef tournedos (filets mignon) a la Rossini, each topped with a thin slice of pate de foie gras with truffle decoration. The vegetable was a new version of Brussels sprouts.

For dessert, the Chef chose "Le Flottant au Chocolate," a rich floating island which is a favorite French dessert. We'll give you the recipe soon.

GOOD CHOICE. As a New Englander, I chose apple pie, which proved exceptional, made with a very flaky crust. The apple for the filling was evidently steamed first, concentrated apple cider then added for moisture along with the usual sugar, nutmeg, butter and a little flour.

Afterwards we visited the stainless steel kitchens. There, above a high shelf containing apple pies, glowed infra-red bulbs

keeping them warm and delicious.

Warm apple pie, oven-fresh yeast bread, foods on plates that are properly hot or cold are usual in most restaurants and on many home tables for that matter. They were part of the thoughtful hospitality that made this dinner a real pleasure.

MEASUREMENTS ARE LEVEL. Egg plant appetizer Continental: In saucepan combined 1/4 c. olive oil, 2 tbsp. lemon juice, 1/2 tsp. vinegar, 1/2 tsp. salt, one chopped peeled section garlic, 4 paprika, tarragon and thyme, 1 bay leaf, 6 thawed frozen hearts of artichoke cut in 1/2" dice, 2 stalks celery, cut in 1/2" pieces, 1 c. eggplant in 1/2" cubes, 12 small pitted green olives and six diced medium canned mushrooms.

Cover with boiling water; simmer 25 min. Strain off sauce; boil until half reduced; add to vegetables and chill.

Brush 6 to 8 slices peeled eggplant with French dressing. Bake 12 min. in mod. oven, 350 degrees F., or until tender. Place in bowl,

add French dressing to thoroughly moisten; chill. Serves 6 to 8. To serve: Arrange each eggplant slice on lettuce. Heap with the chilled vegetables; spoon over the vegetable sauce. TOMORROW'S DINNER. Egg plant appetizer, smoked ham slice bake sweet potatoes, Brussels sprouts with walnuts, warm apple pie, coffee tea milk.

TRICK OF THE CHEF. Drain cooked Brussels sprouts, season and heat with chopped walnut meats sauteed in butter.

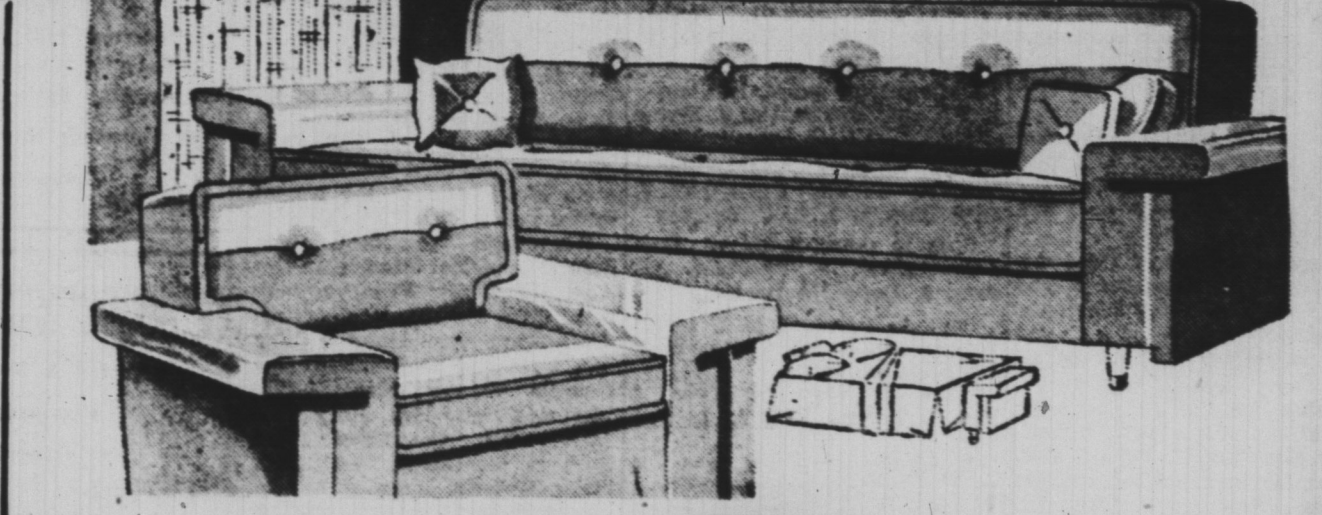

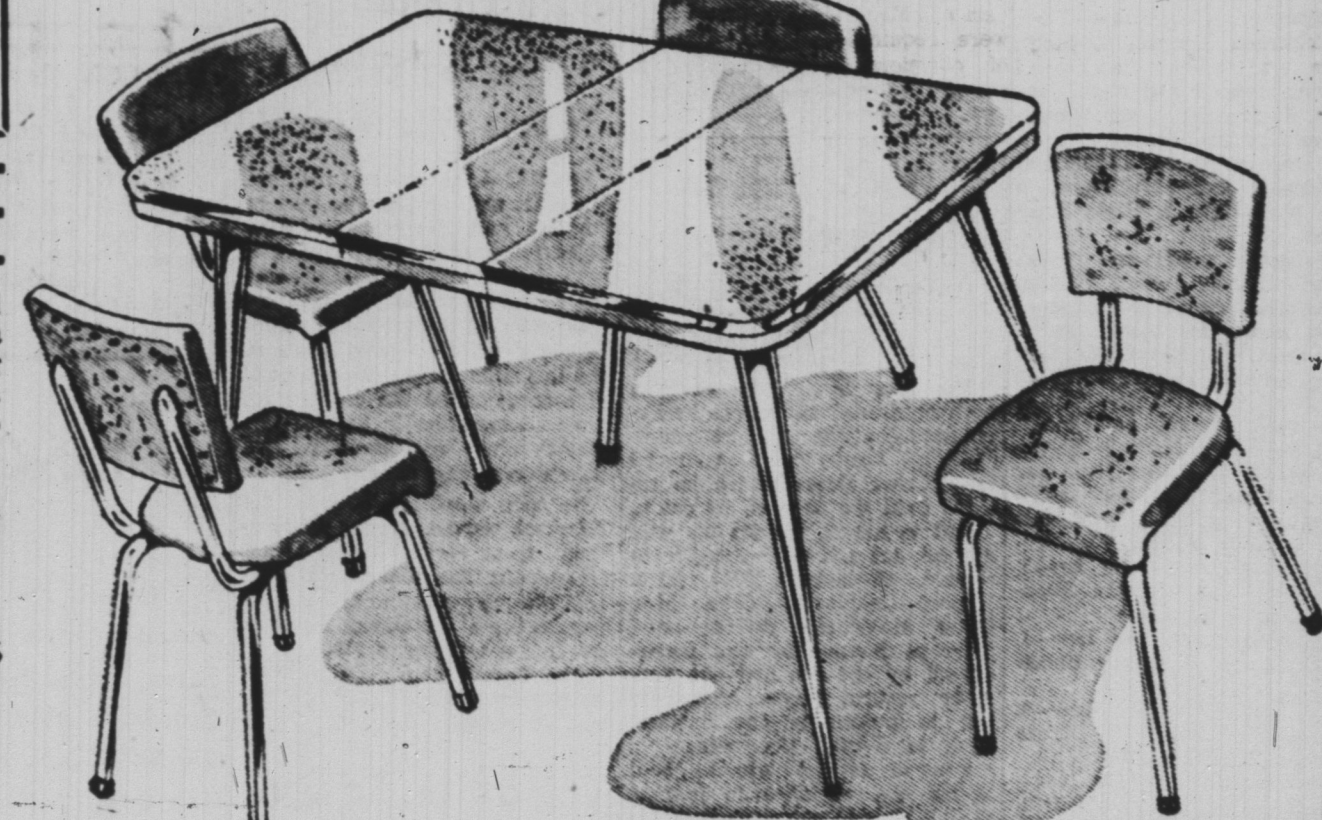

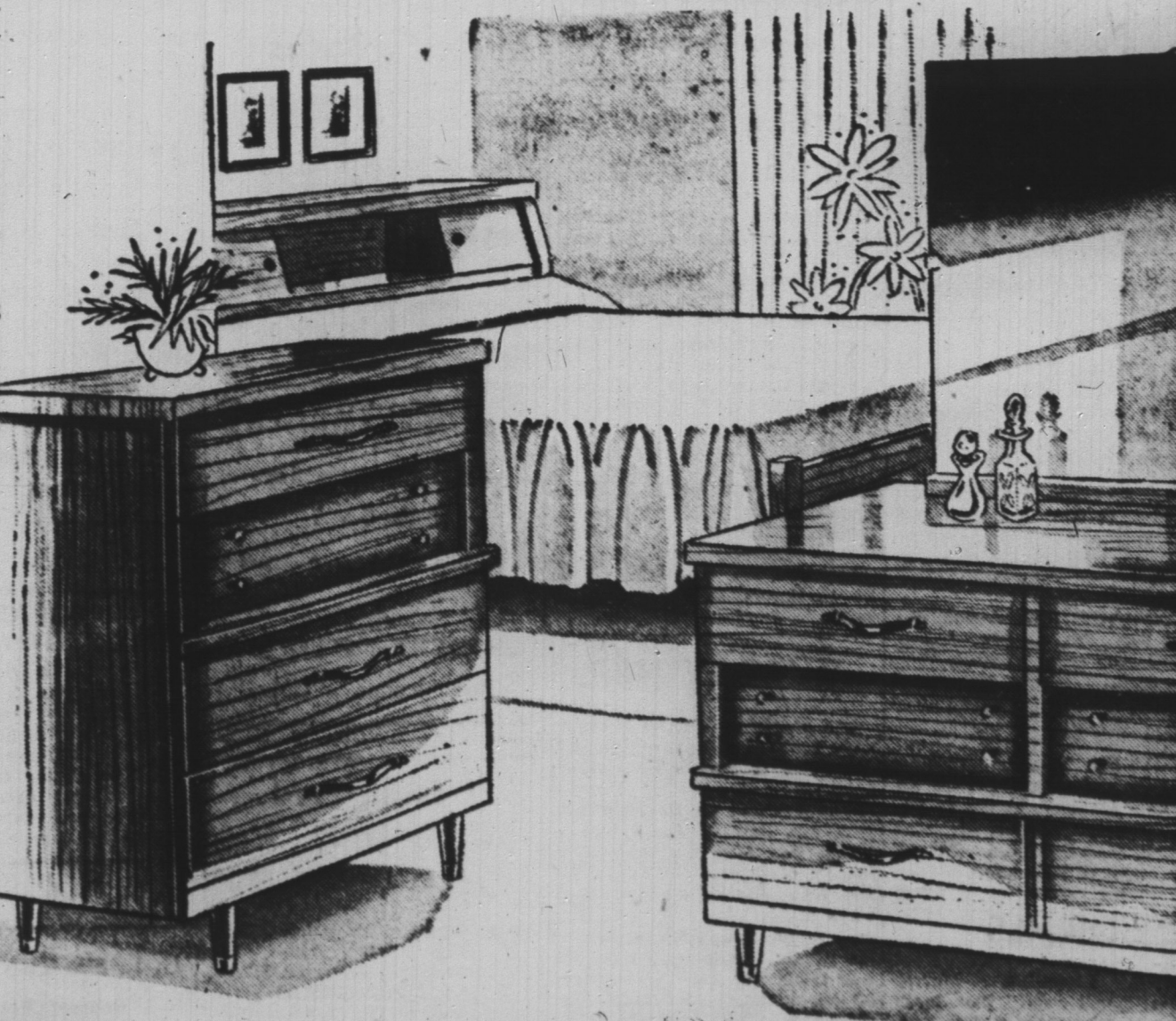
