NEWS FROM SOUTH AFRICA.

**Mrs. McRae Receives Another Letter
From Her Friend.**

The following letter has been received
by Mrs. McRae, of Pownal, from her lady
friend in South Africa:—

BANK COTTAGE,
Wellington,
March 20th, 1900.

MY DEAR MRS. McRAE,—on the 16th.
(last Wednesday) I went to the station to
meet an ambulance train I always inquire
if there are any Canadians, and on
putting the usual question one of
the invalids answered that he was a
Canadian. I then enquired for your son.
He answered, "Know Fred McRae, of
course I do. We were in the same com-
pany." He was quite well, and had gone
further north with the others, and no
doubt was one of those to enter Blenheim.

As you can imagine, the train does not
wait very long, and now I am so vexed
with myself that I did not think to ask
him his name; however, I wrote to one of
the assistant men nurses, who is well
known to me, and he saw me talking to
the invalid, so perhaps he will be able to
supply the name; then I will inform you.
You have certainly heard of Lord
Roberts' entry into Blenheim where
ex-President Steyn lived. I only hope
and pray the entry into Pretoria will
be achieved with as little bloodshed.

We have a number of the Imperial
Yeomery stationed at Wellington now;
and we serve out tea and bread and butter
to any who like to come from 4 p. m. to
9.30. There is a little hall belonging to
the W. C. T. U. and there they write
their letters, look at books and get a
little change from the hot dusty
camps. Their officers, the Earl of
Scarborough and Col. Meyrick,
each gave us a donation; they say they
are very pleased to have such a place for
their men. On Sunday evening the small
building could not contain all who wished
to attend Divine service, so they adjourned
outside with the bare veldt for a seat and
the glorious full moon for a light. It was
most impressive; the singing was grand,
the splendid volume of sound from the
many voices being heard at a long dis-
tance singing the grand old hymns.
They also sang "God be with you till we
meet again." This letter will not be a
long one; I have promised three or four
that I will write to their people, and the
mail closes tonight.

Dear Mrs. McRae, I am sure if I only
suggest the matter to you, you and kind
friends in Canada will help our poor boys
who are sick and wounded in hospital as
willingly as you have helped us, by send-
ing your best and dearest to our aid.
There is an urgent appeal from the wife of
Major Creswell Clarke for different things
in the hospital. If I can get a paper I
will send it that you can see it in detail.
If I can't get a paper, the things that are
most needed are: warm pyjama suits,
warm underwear, particularly pants and
grey flannel shirts, socks, caps, belts,
bandanaer dark handkerchiefs, fillings for
housewives needles, thread and trowsers
buttons, packets of paper, envelopes and
pencils; dark soft towels, soaps. I would
willingly, thankfully receive any quantity
from the very smallest to any size and
forward wherever most needed. If you
do send a box, one addressed to me, same
as the letters and to the care of Divine &
Co., shipping and forwarding agents, Cape
Town, will find me. You know so many
of the men are just brought to the hospi-
tal in what they have on, oftentimes losing
all besides.

The cold weather is coming on and
these comforts, absolute necessities in
fact, will be much needed.

With very kind regards to yourself and
family, hoping soon to hear from you
again, with my earnest prayer for the
speedy ending to the war.
