

Open R.C.M.P. Barracks At Souris On Wednesday

Construction of a new Royal Canadian Mounted Police Barracks at Souris has been completed by M.F. Schurman and Co. Ltd. The official opening takes place Wednesday afternoon at 3 p.m. The new building is situated on Church St. a short distance from Main St. in the centre of town. It is built of frame with wood shingles on the body and a fire-proof roof. The basement is all cement partition and contains a cell block, a shower, and bathroom for prisoners. A furnace room, that is fire-proofed, the hot water heating system and plumbing were installed by Douglas Bros. and Jones. Adjoining the furnace room is a fuel supply room with storage for five hundred gallons of oil which will be supplied by Irving Oil Co. There is a supply storage room and also a special room for exhibits that the police may have evidence. The floor of the basement is constructed with slight graduation and drains that a hose can be used in cleaning same. All the cement in the basement has received the required coats of waterproofing paint. The ground floor contains the Detachment office, living quarters for single men of the force stationed here and is made up of three bedrooms, laundry room and bathroom and showers, each room has a spacious closet, and at the end of the hall in these quarters is a large linen closet. The floors are covered with inlaid linoleum. At the rear of this floor is a two garage and workshop. The living quarters for the Cpl. in charge of the detachment are situated on the second floor. Entrance to this floor may be made from either an outside side entrance or from the inside from the first floor. The living quarters consist of kitchen with built in cupboards and counter along one side, set tubs on the other side of the kitchen, it had as equipment a new refrigerator and electric stove. A dining room, living room, three bedrooms, bathroom and suitable closets. All the floors in this section are of polished hardwood. The building has a fire escape at the rear. The electrical wiring was installed by Burke Electric. A gravel driveway runs from the street to the garage and a walkway extends from the sidewalk to the main entrance. Grading and seeding of the property surrounding the building has been completed.
