Northerner Rumped To Finish Big Race At Woodbine

By JACK SULLIVAN Canadian Press Sports Editor TORONTO (CP) — Northern Dancer rumped to a 7 1/2-length victory in the 106th running of the Queen's Plate Saturday, pushed his earnings close to \$600,000 and added another claim to horse-of-the-year honors in North America. Now he's going to loaf for a while as multi-millionaire owner E.P. Taylor counts his money.

"It was very easy," jockey Bill Hartack murmured as he is dismounted in the winner's enclosure at Woodbine track. "I didn't draw my whip once. Langstret ran as hard as the mile of the 1 1/4-mile classic—but there were a few anxious seconds early in the race for the 31,228 crowd and thousands of others watching on television. It appeared that the can-close three-year-old, sent to the post at 14-9 odds, would lead just that as he trailed the field of eight at the half-mile pole. Then he started to gallop, opened up a big lead and won as he pleased to give Taylor his ninth straight triumph in the last 16 years.

LONGSHOT PLACES Langstret, a 50-1 shot owned by S. James Langill of Montreal, was second and Sherman of Hamilton, a third return trip, from the Max Bell Golden West Farms of Calgary was fourth, two lengths in front of favorite Pierlou, owned by J. Louis Levesque of Montreal.

and \$5,000 gold cup from Hon. Earl Rowe, Ontario's lieutenant-governor, indicated he was a trifle concerned about his colt's race. He told reporters he was "glad to see" the colt make his move.

TRAINER CONCERNED Trainer Horatio Laro certainly had some misgivings in the early stages of the Plate. He said he was "concerned at the first turn" when the Dancer dropped back to last. "Probably the only person at the track who didn't have a worry was Hartack. Northern Dancer was seventh at the quarter, dropped back to eighth at the half, picked up a couple of horses at the three-quarter pole and then went on top to stay. The race was all over at the mile with the Dancer in front of Langstret by one-half length.

IGNORED BY BUYERS It was the same old story with Taylor. No one wanted Northern Dancer as a \$25,000 yearling at Taylor's take-or-leave-it sale in 1962 and the sire of Windfields Farm in Toronto was stuck with this son of Neartic out of Naitama. It marked the sixth time since 1957 that Taylor has won the Ontario 3-year-old stakes. The other jockeys were Lyford Cay in 1957, New Providence in 1959, Victoria Park in 1960, the fifth Flamingo in 1962 and Canebara last year.

Bunning Fires Perfect Game

NEW YORK (AP)—"I know this was something special. I sensed it from the fifth inning on." Those were among the first words spoken by Jim Bunning, the tall Philadelphia Phillies pitcher, after he made baseball history Sunday pitching a perfect game against the New York Mets, first in regular season play in 42 years.

Flanked by his wife, Mary, and 12-year-old Barbara, the oldest of seven children, who had come from Philadelphia to see him pitch on Father's Day, Bunning gave credit to Tony Trivette, Philadelphia second baseman, for protecting his perfect game. "What a play that Taylor made," Jim shouted. "What a play."

ROBBERS "MAKE SMOKE" LONDON (AP)—Five masked robbers using a smoke-screen technique netted jewelry worth \$112,000 Thursday from a shop in suburban Guilders Green. The men, armed with blackjacks, threatened three clerks and a salesman and made off with diamonds, rings and bracelets.
