that they must never marry until they find men of sterling character in whom they can have an implicit faith? Every married woman has learned by experience the secret of how to manage a husband. Why should a mother not reveal this dearly bought wisdom to her daughter? Why should not every mother see to it that her daughter is a first-class cook and manager before marriage? Why should not every mother teach her daughter to be a good sport, to pull her weight in the boat without whining and to take the ups and downs of matrimony with philosophy and good nature? Above all, why shouldn't mothers teach their daughters loyalty to their husbands and that they must stand by a man in hard times and buck him up, instead of running back to mother and leaving him to fight it out alone?

**DEAR DOROTHY DIX:** My problem is what to do with a stingy husband. I am married to a man who is rich for the community in which we live, but I do all my own housework and pinch every penny. My husband refuses to make me an allowance and buys for me himself only the plainest necessities in the way of clothes. In all the years that I have been married I have never had a dollar that I could do with as I pleased. I have never had a pretty dress or hat or any of the little luxuries that women crave.

I do not try to have any women friends or to go anywhere because I am so humiliated by not having the proper clothes and not being able to pay my part of the expenses. What can you do with that kind of a man?

**ANSWER:** Not much. I am afraid, because a man who loves money better than he does his wife always sacrifices her to his cupidity. Any woman who does the cooking and cleaning and baby-tending and sick-nursing and the million other odd jobs that are required to run a home comfortably earns the wages of at least three or four servants in addition to her board.

If her husband refuses to recognize the value of her services and to give her a penny of her own to do with as she pleases, she is foolish not to walk out and refuse to do another day of work until she can get a satisfactory adjustment of the money question. It wouldn't take long to bring a man to terms if he had to wrestle with the problem of cooking dinner for a lot of howling, hungry children when he got home from his work.

But the only sure way to deal with a tight-fisted husband is to avoid getting him, and I urge every girl who is thinking about marriage to have a definite financial agreement before she marries as to what percentage of the family income is to be hers.

**DEAR MISS DIX:** My wife died when I was 23 years old, leaving me with two small children. She exacted a promise from me that I would never marry again. I have kept this promise. Now both girls are married and have left me. Do you think I should keep this promise to my wife?

**ANSWER:** No one has a right to try to reach back a hand from the grave and control a living person, and a deathbed promise not to marry is better broken than kept. Certainly it cannot make a saint in heaven happier to know that the one left behind is living a lonely, starved life because of a promise exacted by earthly jealousy. If you marry a woman of suitable age and who has the same interests and background that you have and whom you know to be of a kindly disposition, there is no reason why you should not be happy.

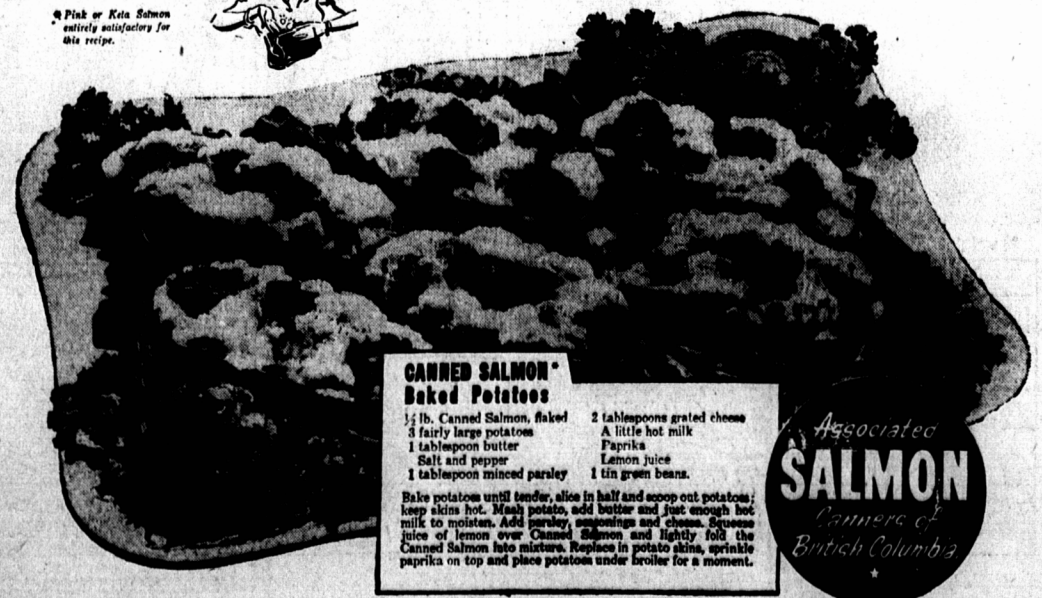

**CANNED SALMON Baked Potatoes**

- 1/2 lb. Canned Salmon, flaked
- 3 fairly large potatoes
- 1 tablespoon butter
- Salt and pepper
- 1 tablespoon minced parsley
- 2 tablespoons grated cheese
- A little hot milk
- Paprika
- Lemon juice
- 1 tin green beans.

Bake potatoes until tender, slice in half and scoop out potatoes; keep skins hot. Mash potato, add butter and just enough hot milk to moisten. Add parsley, seasonings and cheese. Spoon juice of lemon over Canned Salmon and lightly fold the Canned Salmon into mixture. Replace in potato skins, sprinkle paprika on top and place potatoes under broiler for a moment.
